CITY SEEKS PROPOSALS TO ACTIVATE NEIGHBORHOOD PLAZAS

Plan to Enliven Public Spaces to Reflect the Unique and Dynamic Cultures of Chicago's Communities

The Chicago Department of Transportation (CDOT) announced today that it is seeking proposals to improve and enliven public plazas to become active spaces that reflect the unique and dynamic cultures of Chicago's neighborhoods.

"One of Mayor Rahm Emanuel's strategies for improving Chicago's neighborhoods is to create public spaces that cultivate community activities and cultural events in Chicago's neighborhoods through placemaking," said CDOT Commissioner Gabe Klein. "We are seeking creative proposals that demonstrate innovate ways to program and enliven these public spaces."

Chicago currently owns nearly 50 plazas, many of which are underutilized. They range in size from 200 to 14,000 square feet. The City intends that its plazas be beautified and activated to reflect the unique and dynamic cultures of the various neighborhoods.

The plan to activate these plazas also furthers the goals of the Chicago Cultural Plan. Released in October 2012 by Mayor Emanuel and the Department of Cultural Affairs and Special Events (DCASE), the Chicago Cultural Plan created a framework to guide the city's future cultural and economic growth, and to further elevate the city as a global destination for creativity, innovation and excellence in

Through a Request for Proposals (RFP), CDOT is looking for innovative plans from entities with experience in placemaking, community engagement and programming, vendor selection and management, and experiential marketing to provide a unique solution for the City's plazas.





Presence Our Lady of the Resurrection Medical Center, 5645 W. Addison St., Chicago, will offer the following health events in September.

Influenza is a contagious respiratory illness caused by different influenza viruses. Older people, young children and people with certain chronic health conditions are at high risk for serious flu complications.

The best way to prevent flu is by getting vaccinated each fall and following these sensible precautions:

- Clean your hands frequently.
- Cover your coughs and sneezes.
- Stay home from work or school if you are sick.

- Historic, architectural, or neighborhood significance
- Recent renovations or additions
- Large enough in size to accommodate several visitors at once inside the house (greeters limit guests to 25 to 50 people at a time, depending on the home's size)
- Availability Saturday, Dec. 7, 11 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The Holiday House Tour benefits homeowners and the community by increasing awareness of Norwood Park, and typically contributes to residential sales. It may also influence more homeowners to renovate and restore their older houses.





Want Privacy? Use a Trust

Do you like your nosy neighbors keeping tabs of your business? Do you want them knowing how much money you left to your kids? Do you want Aunt Fern knowing that you left money to your favorite uncle but not to her? If you leave only a will, it will all be a matter of public record. Your neighbors, your relatives, your co-workers, telemarketers, and even more nefarious individuals can just walk right into your local court house and ask to see your file after you have died. By doing so they can see your will and all the wishes you have expressed in it. In addition, in most states, all the assets controlled by the will must be inventoried and set forth in the file.

A better alternative is to leave your assets in a trust.

The assets in the trust are not technically titled in your individual name and avoid probate and, therefore, the public scrutiny of prying eyes.

Here are some examples of what you can discover just from a trip to the court house, all of it public information:

- Musician Jerry Garcia left his guitars to their maker, Douglas Erwin. He left 10% of his estate to his brother, Clifford. The assets he left to his daughters were in trust until they reached age 21.
- Former Supreme Court Chief Justice Warren Burger left a short handwritten will that left 1/3 to his daughter and 2/3 to his son.
- Benjamin Franklin left his lands in Nova Scotia to his son and his houses in Philadelphia to his daughter. He gave his picture of the King of France to his daughter, Sarah, asking that she not remove the jewels from the frame. He left money to facilitate the freeing of his son-in-law's slave.
- Marilyn Monroe left her clothing and personal effects and a significant portion of her estate to Lee Strasberg, the founder of the famous acting school in Hollywood.
- President Calvin Coolidge disinherited his son.
- John F. Kennedy, Jr. gave the carved whale ivory scrimshaw set he inherited from his father to his nephew, John Schlossberg.
- David Packard, co-founder of Hewlett-Packard, left almost everything he had left at his death to a charitable foundation.
- President Richard Nixon left his "personal diaries" including tapes, notes, etc., to his daughters. If his daughters did not survive him, he left explicit instructions that everything should be destroyed.

There are many reasons to keep your wishes and your affairs private after your death. Information about your wealth and to whom you are leaving it could leave the recipients vulnerable to unscrupulous people, from benign salespeople trying to sell a product to con artists trying to prey on the grieving. Revelations of whom you have chosen to benefit may offend others who were not preferred.

Your wishes do not have to become common knowledge. An estate planning attorney can help you keep your private life just that: private.

Village Cooking Corner

In October of last year, my husband Frank and I were assigned to serve refreshments to the members of the Austrian Mixed Chorus after the rehearsal. I started going through my cake file to determine what I could bake and came across a leaflet from the Cranberry Festival which took place in September of 1991 in Warrens, Wisconsin. There I found a recipe for MOIST CRANBERRY BREAD, and after reading the list of ingredients and preparation, I decided to give it a try, and it turned out great. Friends have already asked me for the recipe, so I would like to share it with our readers as well.

MOIST CRANBERRY BREAD

Ingredients: 2 cups flour, ¾ tsp. salt, ½ tsp. cinnamon, 1-1/4 tsp. baking soda, ½ tsp. baking powder, ¾ cup sugar, 2 tbsp. melted shortening or oil, 1 beaten egg, 1/3 cup orange juice, ¼ tsp. lemon juice and one 1-lb. can of whole cranberry sauce. Shake the can well before opening it.

Method: Mix together in order given. Put into two small or one large loaf pan (no dimensions were given) that has been greased or sprayed with PAM or other no-stick spray. Let stand for 20 minutes before baking in a preheated 350 degree oven for 45 minutes. I followed the directions to the letter except I did not add the ¼ tsp. lemon juice. Since this is a small batch, I used my 10-3/4" x 7" aluminum baking pan. I baked the bread in the morning and allowed it to cool until a couple of hours before going to the rehearsal, then cut it into about 1-1/2" squares. I found them to be very tasty. Fall Beautiful Fall - Time To Prepare For Winter

The chill of the first cool nights of fall serves as a warning that the growing season is coming to an end. By all means, enjoy your flowers for as long as the weather permits. We can even stubbornly try to protect and cover animals from the onset of cooler temperatures. However, hard frosts will eventually take their toll. At this time I strongly urge gardeners to clean up all dead flowers and vegetable plants. This is the first step towards having a great garden next year.

Then I would suggest adding a two to three inch layer of an organic material to the soil. If you have a compost pile, this would be a GREENHOUSES good time to work in this material.

Another option is to work the leaves from your yard into the soil. Adding these materials will have several benefits. First, the organic matter will have a chance to further decompose during the long, wet fall and winter. As the organic material naturally breaks down, this will add nutrients to the soil for next years plants.

Second, really digging and working up the soil in the fall aerates and loosens it and prevents the ground from becoming too hard. This is very important because a loose soil allows plants to develop healthy roots systems.

None of this work is very glamourous, however conditioning and preparing soil is one of the most important keys to having success as a gardener. Next spring your flower and vegetable plants will benefit from growing in a nutrient rich, loose soil.
