Memorial Day Remembrances

Leon Panetta, former Secretary of Defense and Director of the Central Intelligence Agency will lead this year's Memorial Day Parade as its Grand Marshal and participate in the Wreath Laying Ceremony preceding the parade on Saturday, May 25. The Wreath Laying Ceremony will begin at 11 a.m. at the Eternal Flame on Daley Plaza (Dearborn and Washington Streets). The parade will step off at noon and proceed south on State Street from Lake Street to Van Buren Street.

Co-founder of the Panetta Institute for Public Policy, Leon E. Panetta has a long and distinguished public service career beginning as a First Lieutenant in the U.S. Army to serving as a Congressman from California. He has also served two Presidents as Director of the Office of Management and Budget and Chief of Staff to President Bill Clinton and most recent as Director of the Central Intelligence Agency and Secretary of Defense for President Barack Obama.

The City of Chicago will honor our fallen heroes at its annual Wreath Laying Ceremony and Memorial Day Parade with special recognition of the Illinois Gold Star. The Chicago parade is considered one of the largest Memorial Day parades in the nation. Participants in the parade include area high school marching bands, drum and bugle corps as well as many veterans' groups, 6,000 JROTC cadets and the military.

Bronze Star Medal recipient LCDR James P. Gennari of the United States Navy will also be acknowledged at the ceremony and parade for his heroic life-saving action at the risk of his own life while serving in Afghanistan as a Trauma Critical Care Nurse. In January 2012, LCDR Gennari distinguished himself by selflessly remaining with a severely injured Marine, impaled in the thigh by an unexploded rocket-propelled grenade. LCDR Gennari stayed with the Marine until the weapon was removed and the Marine was stabilized.

Additionally, as this is the 150th anniversary of President Abraham Lincoln's Gettysburg Address, the City of Chicago will commemorate the occasion with a special reading of the speech at the Wreath Laying Ceremony. The day's events will also include an observance of the 60th anniversary of the end of the Korean conflict.

Memorial Day has a rich history. It began shortly after the Civil War ended when General John Logan proclaimed that the 30th day of May be designated for the purpose of decorating the graves of soldiers who died; the day was called Decoration Day. It was first observed on May 30, 1868. The modern day event is similar, but the original idea has been expanded and now honors all fallen soldiers.

Free hearing screenings will be offered Wednesday, June 5, from 9 a.m. to noon. Audiologists Steven Wolinsky, Au.D., and Marie Vetter, Au.D., will provide this screening to check for hearing loss. Advance registration is required by calling 877.737.INFO (4636).

A free Healthy Aging Program will be held Friday, June 14, from 1 p.m. to 2:30 p.m. This program for individuals aged 55 and older consists of social time, health topics and guest lectures. A clinical dietitian will discuss how diet can affect your health. Registration is not required.

Free blood pressure screenings will be offered Thursday, June 20, from 9 a.m. to 10 a.m., in the hospital's main lobby. A health care professional will perform screenings and answer questions about blood pressure readings. Registration is not required.

Thyroid screenings will be given Monday, June 24, from 8 a.m. to 9 a.m. This blood draw tests TSH (thyroid stimulating hormone) to indicate if the thyroid is functioning properly. Neither fasting nor other preparation for the test is needed. Test results will be mailed. There is a \$10 fee payable at the screening. Federal Funding Available for Eligible Flood-related Damages For Evanston, Skokie and Lincolnwood

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) announced that federal disaster aid in the form of individual assistance has been made available for a number of Illinois counties, including Cook County, due to the severe storms and flooding. Residents (homeowners and renters) and business owners who sustained losses from these storms may be eligible for disaster aid.

The level of assistance will be assessed and determined by FEMA and covers basic needs only. Assistance will not normally compensate for the entire loss. One of the frequently asked questions is what specific items are covered by FEMA's "housing needs" assistance. FEMA will make the determination, but housing assistance from FEMA generally repairs structural components of the home, security aspects such as windows and doors and essential utility components including electrical, plumbing, heating, ventilating, air conditioning and gas systems subject to assessment by FEMA. If you have insurance, FEMA assistance may help cover needs not covered by your homeowner's policy. Some disaster aid does not have to be paid back, while other assistance may come in the form of loans.

Any information already provided to the Village is not part of the assistance application process. To begin applying for FEMA funds, you will need to register directly with FEMA by submitting an application. There are three ways to begin applying for assistance:

- 1. Register online at http://www.DisasterAssistance.gov; or
- 2. Register with a web-enabled mobile device (such as a smart phone) at m.fema.gov; or
- 3. Call 1-800-621-FEMA (3362) or call TTY 1-800-462-7585; or for those who use Video Relay Service (VRS) or 711, call 1-800-621-3362. The toll-free telephone numbers will operate from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. (Eastern Time) seven days a week until further notice by FEMA.

FEMA advises that you have the following information available when applying for assistance: social security number, daytime telephone number, current mailing address, address of damaged property, directions to the damaged home or property and private insurance information, if available.

Applicants are encouraged to take the next step and file your claim directly with FEMA. Only applications made directly to FEMA will be considered.

RESURRECTION SELECTED FOR BLUE RIBBON AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE IN HEALTH EDUCATION

Resurrection College Prep High School has been selected to receive its second Blue Ribbon Award for Excellence in Health Education. The award recognizes the best health programs in the state based upon recommendation of the Illinois Association for Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance (IAHPERD) and the Illinois School Health Association (ISHA).

The designation followed a review of the health education program at Resurrection, a visit to the school, interviews with staff, students and parents, and consideration by a state-level panel. During the review process, the health education curriculum was measured against state and national professional standards and those of Illinois States Board of Education. The Blue Ribbon Award will be presented at award ceremonies during both the IAH-PERD and ISHA annual conferences.

Container Gardening

Even if you live in a condo and only have a confined space like a balcony or
a small deck, you can still experience a bit of nature with a container garden. A
container garden is a collection of plants grown in a container or planter.

Whether you choose to buy a container which is already planted, or you decide to plant your own, there are a few things to remember.

First, realize that the size of the container will impact how frequently you will have to water. There is an old saying that "container gardening is container watering" implying that in a container, unlike the soil in the ground, you must supply all the water. I think larger containers are easier to care for over a long season.

Second, determine how much sun and shade your area has. This is very important because it will impact how your plants perform. If you put a sun loving plant in the shade it will not bloom as well as it should. Conversely shade loving plants may not be able to take the heat generated by the sun, and will struggle to live. You must determine the level of light over the course of a whole day from sun-up to sun down. With the information you will be able to select the right plants for your space.

Third, try to come up with a theme for your container. Your theme could be simple, symmetrical and elegant with a combination of something like geraniums and petunias or it could be more sophisticated with an asymmetrical blend of many different plants. Many people are copying the natural look best demonstrated by the public planters seen around the City of Chicago. On higher balconies, I would limit the use of really tall plants as one must consider the effect of the wind.

Fourth, you must maintain the planter. Any spent blooms should be discarded along with yellow leaves. Water the container when you see wilt in the plants or when the soil mix feels dry to the touch. Observe the weather - hot windy periods will always require more watering than rainy cooler periods.

The easiest way to keep your planter looking good is to fertilize the plants every two weeks with a well balance fertilize. There are many brands to choose from and they all get the job done. Follow the directions - don't fall in the trap of thinking if it says 1 scoop per gallon, then I'll really make my planter beautiful by using 2 scoops. This is wrong because too much fertilizer could make your planter perform as poorly as neglecting it would.

Fifth, enjoy your little slice of nature both visually and sensually with the various fragrances the plants give off.

Private Elm Insurance Deadline is May 31

The City of Evanston once again is offering private insurance to cover elm trees on private property. The deadline to apply for the program is May 31, 2013.

The City of Evanston Public Works Department's Forestry Division cares for the thousands of trees in parks, public areas and on the miles and miles of beautiful parkways. The city regularly performs pruning and other preventative maintenance measures, tests for Dutch elm disease, and removes trees which have become too diseased to save. However, the city does not remove or treat trees on private property. Instead, the city encourages residents to participate in its Private Elm Tree Insurance Program.

Once an elm tree is diagnosed with Dutch elm disease, the city requires removal of the tree within 30 days. If the diseased tree is located on private property, the property owner must bear the cost of removal. This cost can range from approximately \$1,000 for medium-sized trees, to over \$4,000 for very large trees.

In order to avoid these unexpected costs, the Forestry Division offers Dutch elm disease insurance to all Evanston property owners. This annual insurance covers only the tree removal costs if the tree becomes infected with Dutch elm disease, and is only for a one-year period. An insurance application and payment must be submitted to the City of Evanston's Forestry Division no later than Friday, May 31, 2013. Insurance ranges from \$60 to \$140 per tree per year.

SOCIAL SECURITY HONORS ALL WHO SERVE

Memorial Day is a day when we all come together to honor those who have given their lives in the defense of freedom and the principles we hold dear in this country.

May is also National Military Appreciation Month. As we observe Memorial Day and Military Appreciation Month, we would like to let members of our military know how much we value what they do for our nation.

At Social Security, we offer a wide range of services for our service members. Families of fallen military heroes may be eligible for Social Security survivors benefits. Learn more about Social Security survivors benefits at www.socialsecurity.gov/pgm/survivors.htm.

For service members who return home with injuries, Social Security is here to help. Visit our Wounded Warriors website. You can find it at www.socialsecurity.gov/woundedwarriors. We use an expedited process for military service members who become disabled while on active military service, regardless of where the disability occurs.

The Wounded Warriors website answers a number of commonly asked questions, and shares other useful information about disability benefits, including how veterans can receive expedited processing of disability claims. It is important to note that benefits available through Social Security are different than those from the Department of Veterans Affairs and require a separate application.

Even active duty military who continue to receive pay while in a hospital or on medical leave should consider applying for disability benefits if they are unable to work due to a disabling condition. Active duty status and receipt of military pay does not necessarily prevent payment of Social Security disability benefits. Receipt of military payments should never stop someone from applying for disability benefits from Social Security.



SCHOOL IN PRAGUE TO BE NAMED IN HONOR OF FORMER CHICAGO MAYOR ANTON CERMAK

Chicago's Sister City of Prague Honors Late Mayor

Mayor Rahm Emanuel announced today that a school in the Czech Republic will be named in honor of the late Chicago Mayor Anton Cermak today on the 140th anniversary of his birth. The Anton Cermak School is located in Prague, which has been a Sister City of Chicago since 1990. Mayor Emanuel sits at the desk that Mayor Cermak used during his tenure as mayor eighty years ago.

"This tribute to Mayor Cermak is a true honor for Chicago and symbolizes the strong ties between our two great cities," said Mayor Rahm Emanuel. "Having little formal education of his own, he nonetheless worked tirelessly to provide opportunities for Chicago's students. The naming of this school for Mayor Cermak is a fitting tribute to his life's work."

Mayor Cermak immigrated to the United States from what is now the Czech Republic in 1874. He served as an Illinois State Representative as well as president of the Cook County Board of Commissioners before being elected as Mayor in 1931, a position he served until his assassination in 1933. Shortly after his assassination, the City Council renamed 22nd Street to Cermak Road.

Michael Weber is the genius behind the Porchlight Music Theatre and if all goes well as does his current production of "Pal Joey," he is giving Chicago audiences top musicals of the past. Top talent is on display in this show from the 1940's. "Pal Joel" is a Chicago musical featuring the songs of Lorenz Hart and Richard Rodgers before Rodgers became associated with Oscar Hammerstein, Jr. The story has a book by John O'Hara.

Weber has assembled a strong talented cast. You'll come out talking about his direction and the hiring of Doug Peck as musical director and Brenda Didier as the show's strong choreographer.

Two knockouts in the show are Adrian Aguilar as Joey Evans who loves and sways his woman to get ahead as a performer. Susan McMonagle as Vera Simpson is a rich society woman who, though older, uses Joey and does so to perfection.

It is great to see Matt Orlando as Ludlow Lowell back on stage after taking a few years' hiatus. You cannot help but come out singing the songs that include "I Could Write a Book," and "Bewitched" among the many others.

Weber has staged the show as it was originally written and not like other Chicago productions from years past. Others you'll talk about are Callie Johnson as Melba and Sharriese Hamilton as Glady Bumps.

Like all musicals a new face is discovered in Laura Savage as Laura, who meets and falls for Joey.


