Residents of the neighborhood today cultivate their yards with great pleasure and creativity. Rain gardens, koi ponds, English cottage style, and unique specimens abound in this extremely walkable and charming

neighborhood. Attendees will find each garden to hold a delightful surprise from carousel horses to lawns transformed into fairy prairies to a family of goats.

Home to a number of master gardeners, Forest Glen is an area of 550 homes bordered by the newly extended North Branch Bike Trail. Forest Glen has a long history of stewarding its outdoor spaces, from its beginnings as part of the Indian Boundary Line, to its time as a cherry orchard, to its vigorous response to Dutch Elm disease, resulting in 600 replaced trees. Mayor Lightfoot and CPD Launch New Partnership Initiative with **Local Businesses Across Chicago**

All 22 Districts To Have Designated Business Liaison Officers To Strengthen The Ties Between Entrepreneurs And Their Communities

Mayor Lori E. Lightfoot today joined Chicago Police Department (CPD) Superintendent Eddie T. Johnson and Department of Business Affairs and Consumer Protection (BACP) Commissioner Rosa Escareno to launch a new community policing initiative designed to build and foster a collaborative partnership with local businesses in communities across Chicago. As part of the initiative, all 22 police districts will have a designated Business Liaison Officer to work closely with the District Commander and BACP to provide positive engagement opportunities for entrepreneurs, address chronic problems or concerns of business owners and improve overall public safety through collaboration with the community.

"Small businesses are the lifeblood of our economy, and if we want our neighborhoods to thrive and grow, then we have to ensure we're supporting our local entrepreneurs while rooting out any bad actors," said Mayor Lightfoot. "This initiative is not only about building partnerships and nurturing trust between small businesses, it represents a new era of collaboration between the Chicago Police Department and our communities."

Each Business Liaison Officer will work directly with businesses in their district to establish engagement strategies to encourage positive community interactions and relationships. Districts will hold monthly community meetings with all local business owners

to strengthen the ties between entrepreneurs and their communities by notifying residents of available neighborhood workforce opportunities and ensuring all businesses are connected to city network services and resources. These new meetings specifically focus on local business concerns and opportunities versus the broader community public safety issues discussed at CAPS

This new initiative is part of the Chicago Police Department's community policing strategies and its ongoing efforts to improve the communication and cooperation between police officers and the communities they serve.

Mayor Lightfoot And DCASE Announce \$1.3 Million In Direct Support To The **Local Theatre Community During The 2019 Year Of Chicago Theatre**

Mayor Lori E. Lightfoot and the Department of Cultural Affairs and Special Events (DCASE) today announced more than \$835,750 in financial grants to 116 theatre and dance artists, nonprofit theatres and other community organizations as part of the 2019 Year of Chicago Theatre - with a special focus on organizations located on the South, Southwest and West Sides. In addition to these cultural program grants, DCASE will also provide more than \$448,650 to 157 theatres, theatremakers and dance-makers to cover artist performance fees and commissions so these organizations can maintain their free public programs.

Constituents can contact Com. Suffredin's office at 847-864-1209 to schedule a personal meeting to discuss specific property tax concerns before the presentations. Com. Suffredin's office is available to help residents Monday to Friday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. at 820 Davis St. in Evanston. Suffredin's staff can also assist residents who aren't able to make it to the office by phone and e-mail.

The deadline to appeal to the Board of Review is Tuesday, July 30, 2019.



Pappas: \$24.6 Million In Cook County Property Tax Refunds Going To 25,000 Homeowners Whose Bills Show No Balance Due

Nearly 25,000 homeowners are receiving a Second Installment tax bill that shows a zero balance due on August 1 and are set to receive \$24.6 million in refunds, Cook County Treasurer Maria Pappas said today.

"Nearly 90 percent of the refunds will be issued without an application," Pappas said. "To see if you are receiving a refund, visit cookcountytreasurer.com and select the purple box labeled 'Your Property Overview.' Just put in your address."

Most of the refunds go to homeowners receiving property tax exemptions, which are always applied to the Second Installment tax bill. The exemptions include: Homeowner's, Senior Citizen or Senior Assessment Freeze, Disabled Persons and Disabled Veterans.

Here is the refund schedule:


- 10,100 homeowners who earlier this year paid by check or online will receive a credit to their bank or credit card accounts starting July 1 through July 26, 2019.
- 11,300 homeowners who paid through a bank/mortgage escrow account will be mailed a refund check by August 23, 2019.
- In addition, 3,400 homeowners whose taxes were paid in cash will be mailed a refund application by July 26, 2019, to ensure the proper party receives the refund.

Printed bills, with a due date of August 1, will be mailed today, Monday, July 1.

Chicago's Norwood Park community will celebrate its 145th birthday as a village on the grounds of the Noble-Seymour-Crippen House, on Sat., July 20, 2019, and the public is invited to participate in the many free festivities. The event, which includes a book sale, will take place from 10 a.m. – 4 p.m., on the Noble-Seymour-Crippen House grounds, 5624 N. Newark Ave., in Chicago.

A highlight of the day will be a three-four tent encampment of the 10th Illinois Infantry Regiment (Civil War re-enactors) that will include musket firing demonstrations and women crafting. Soldiers will also explain weaponry, clothing, meals, and medical care of the Civil War.

There will be numerous children's activities, including the presence from noon - 2 p.m. of Clayson, the official mascot of the Palatine Historical Society, and children are encouraged to have their photos taken with him.

During the event, the Noble-Seymour-Crippen House will be open for tours. The book sale, which includes more than 500 fiction and non-fiction reasonably priced books, will be held from 9 a.m. – 4 p.m. inside the house. Hot dogs and chips will be available. The birthday cake cutting will take place at 1 p.m. Families are encouraged to attend this fun event, visit the oldest house in Chicago and participate in Norwood Park's birthday observance.



- Swimming: Kids can play and swim, and families can relax all summer long at one of three aquatic centers. The aquatic center management team, Swim Chicago Southland, offers a swim school, aquatic fitness programs and water rehabilitation, as well as the expected 100,000 gallons of water fun.
- Boating: On ten of the Preserves' lakes and rivers, individuals and families can spend a day recreational boating, paddling and exploring the waterways of Cook County. Bring your own, or rent boats, canoes and kayaks at Busse Reservoir, Maple Lake, Tampier Lake and Skokie
- Fitness: The Forest Preserves are a healthy hotspot in Cook County, the premier location for outdoor fitness activities, including running, biking and walking on more than 300 miles of trails. Trail users can enjoy everything from mountain biking on miles of single track trail in the Palos Preserves, to the historic climbing stairs at Swallow Cliff Woods and the newly opened stairs in Dan Ryan Woods.
- Fishing: Anglers of all ages can drop a line from the shore or from a boat at more than 40 Forest Preserves waterbodies for recreational sport fishing. - Zip-lining: In Bemis Woods in Western Springs, the Forest Preserves and Go Ape offer treetop adventure and zip line courses. The site is seven-acres, and includes the Treetop Adventure Course, which offers participants a two- to three-hour trek using rope ladders, Tarzan swings, five zip lines, and more than 40 other obstacles situated more than 40 feet in the air; and the Treetop Journey Course, a one-hour trek completing more than 18 obstacles and two zip lines 20 feet above the ground.



Sour Cream and Onion Potato Salad

Let's be real: This recipe was an excuse to mash-up our favorite chip flavor and summer's best creamy, salty "salad"—and then top it with those same chips. We love to eat this warm, we love to eat this cold, we love to eat this while wearing jorts in the park, and we love to eat this while wearing pajamas on the couch.

gredients:

2 lb. baby Yukon Gold potatoes

3/4 cup sour cream

1 Tbsp. onion powder

1 tsp. freshly ground black pepper

1/2 cup sour cream and onion potato chips

1 cup kosher salt, plus more 1/4 cup mayonnaise 2 tsp. Dijon mustard

1 garlic clove 1/4 small red onion

Place 2 lb. baby Yukon Gold potatoes in a large pot, cover with 3 qt. water, then 1 cup kosher salt, and bring to a boil over medium-high heat. (Yes, this is a lot of salt, but it's the right amount for the job. Potatoes are big and dense—so it takes highly concentrated water to ensure they're seasoned through and through, Plus, think about how much of that gets left behind in the water you pour out!) Once water comes to a boil, reduce heat, adjusting as needed to maintain a simmer, and cook potatoes until fork tender, 15–20 minutes.

- 1. Meanwhile, make your dressing. Combine ¾ cup sour cream, ¼ cup mayonnaise, 1 Tbsp. onion powder, 2 tsp. Dijon mustard, and 1 tsp. black pepper in a large bowl. Finely grate 1 garlic clove into dressing and stir to combine. Thinly slice 1 bunch chives. Transfer half of chives to dressing; set remaining aside for serving. Slice ¼ small red onion as thinly as possible through root end. (This might not be the way you usually cut an onion, but we're going for shallow arcs rather than chunky quarter-moons.) Transfer to a fine-mesh sieve and rinse for several seconds (this eliminates some of that astringent raw onion flavor). Pat dry with paper towels. Add half of onion to bowl with dressing; reserve remaining onion for serving.
- 2. When potatoes are tender, scoop out ½ cup potato cooking liquid—we're going to use this later to thicken the sauce, warm up the cold dairy, and flavor the potatoes. Drain potatoes in a colander and let cool 10 minutes or until cool enough to handle. Crush each potato slightly with your hands (it's easiest to do this if you transfer them to a baking sheet or big plate first) and add to bowl with dressing.
- 3. Toss potatoes with dressing and ¼ cup potato cooking liquid. You want to do this while the potatoes are still warm so that they'll better absorb all of the seasoning. Don't worry if the dressing looks a little loose and watery at the beginning—it will all get absorbed and be nice and creamy. Taste and add more salt or, if your dressing looks too thick, a splash of potato cooking liquid.
- 4. Top potatoes with reserved chives and onion. Crumble ½ cup sour cream and onion potato chips over—in big pieces if you really just want to be eating a bag of chips or in small pieces if you'd like more of a bread crumb effect.


