presented in an open dress rehearsal and final public performance. Recommended for families with children ages 7 to 17.



Mayor Lightfoot, City Officials Provide Resources, Tips To Beat Extreme Heat And Urge Residents To Take Extra Precaution

Mayor Lori E. Lightfoot, along with officials from the Office of Emergency Management and Communications (OEMC), Department of Family & Support Services (DFSS), Chicago Department of Public Health (CDPH) and other departments and sister agencies, urge residents to take extra precautions as the Summer progresses and high temperatures occur.

All residents of Chicago have a role to play in this effort, which is why we're asking everyone to check on their neighbors during extreme temperatures and to call for assistance when necessary.

Residents in need of relief from the heat may visit City facilities that are also serving as cooling centers including Chicago Public Library locations, Chicago Police Department stations, Chicago Park District field houses, DFSS Community Service Centers and DFSS Senior Centers. To locate a cooling center, residents can call 3-1-1..

To assist some of Chicago's most vulnerable populations, such as homeless individuals, seniors and people with disabilities, the Chicago Police Department, the Chicago Fire Department and DFSS and its delegate agencies will conduct wellness checks and outreach to ensure residents are aware of the City's designated cooling centers.

Residents are also encouraged to check on relatives, neighbors and friends. If you are unable to make contact, you can request a wellbeing check by downloading the CHI311 app, visiting 311. chicago.gov, or calling 3-1-1. "Residents can call 3-1-1 to request wellbeing checks for their family and friends, as well as to request rides to cooling centers across the city."

Heat exhaustion is a milder form of heat-related illness that can develop after several days of exposure to high temperatures and inadequate or unbalanced replacement of fluids. A heatstroke is more serious and occurs when the body starts to lose its ability to regulate itself.

- The telltale signs of a heatstroke are:
- An extremely high body temperature, such as 103 degrees or above
- Dizziness and nausea
- A throbbing headache and a pulse that is rapid and strong
- Skin that is red, hot and dry

If you see someone suffering from heatstroke, call 9-1-1 immediately and then try to move the person into a cool place and cool the person with water.

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Mayor Lightfoot And The Department Of Water Management Announce The City Will Pause Water Meter Installation

Drinking Water Remains Safe And City Encourages Residents With Water Meters To Opt For Free In-Home Water Testing And Free Filters Pending Further Study

Mayor Lori E. Lightfoot, Randy Conner, Commissioner of the Department of Water Management, and Dr. Allison Arwady, Acting Commissioner of the Department of Public Health, today announced the City has paused the installation of water meters in homes with lead service lines after new data from an ongoing study found an increase in lead levels in a limited number of homes with water meters

"The City of Chicago provides clean, safe drinking water that meets or exceeds EPA guidelines," said Mayor Lightfoot. "To ensure that continues to be the case, I have directed the Water Department to stop installing water meters until further notice. Everything that we do as a city must be focused on the health and safety of residents, especially children. We are actively working to determine the cause of the increase seen in the latest data, and evaluating our options for reducing water lead levels in impacted homes.²

In 2016 the City commissioned the largest study ever to explore the possible impact of water main construction and meter installation on residential lead levels in single-family and two-flat homes.

Recent 2019 study data indicates that lead levels rose in 22 percent of homes with new water meters and 7.1 percent of homes increased above federal guidelines for drinking water. The vast majority of the 510 homes studied have either experienced no increase or a decrease in lead levels following the installation of a meter, however, the program is paused while the City identifies solutions and determines the cause of the increase.

No one who lives at any of the addresses with elevated water lead levels in this study has been found to have an elevated blood lead level. CDPH automatically receives all human lead testing results from local doctors and laboratories.

"We want to reassure everyone that our drinking water is clean and safe. We are making this decision to ensure that our water continues to meet EPA standards," said Conner.

Chicago water meets standards set by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), the Illinois EPA, and the drinking water industry. There is no detectable lead in water when it leaves DWM's treatment plants and travels through water mains. DWM tests water quality 24 hours a day seven days a week.

"In residences with water meters, and especially those with young children or women who are pregnant or may become pregnant, we definitely recommend having your water tested and using the free water filter," said Dr. Arwady. "We want to keep this issue in context. Lead-based paint remains the overwhelming cause of high blood lead levels in Chicago children.'

Residents with meters in their homes are encouraged to take the following steps:

• Register for a free filter set—a water pitcher and six cartridges NSF-certified to remove lead being offered to metered customers by the City. Registration information will be mailed in the coming weeks or call 311.

• Get their water tested by calling 311, or visiting www.chicagowaterquality.org to request a free test.

• Flush or run water continuously for five minutes after it has been stagnant for six hours or more. Flushing, which includes bathing, washing clothes and/or dishes, is an effective approach to lowering lead levels and exposure.

Civic Consulting Alliance Releases Study On 2018 Residential Assessments In Chicago Regressivity Found In Review Of Berrios Administration's Assessments

The Civic Consulting Alliance (CCA) released a study today of the 2018 assessments from the Cook County Assessor's Office under the administration of former Assessor Joe Berrios.

The CCA's report, titled Cook County Assessor's Office: 2018 Chicago Triad Assessment, Residential Sales Ratio Study states that in February 2018, the Cook County Board and the Assessor's Office (along with the Board of Review) agreed on four goals for Cook County's assessment process: uniformity, timeliness, compliance and transparency. This report is concerned only with the Assessor's Office's portion of the 2018 reassessment process of the City of Chicago and does not address assessment decisions from the Cook County Board of Review.

As shown in the CCA's report, the 2018 residential assessments for the City of Chicago missed uniformity targets and exhibited regressivity, which indicates homes with a lower market value tended to be over assessed, while homes with higher market values tended to be under assessed.

In addition, this report contains a reevaluation of the sales ratio study results in Hyde Park Township, from 2014-2016. Originally released by the CCA in February of 2018, the original analysis of Hyde Park Township was based on an incomplete sales file provided to the CCA by the Berrios administration; the sales file did not contain any data for home sales valued at less than \$65,000, which amounted to 39% of sales in that township. The current report contains corrected results for Hyde Park Township.

Since beginning the reassessment of the northern suburbs of Cook County in 2019, Assessor Kaegi and his administration have met the uniformity and compliance goals in six out of the eight re-assessed townships, while narrowly missing the target in two others. Complete reports on the assessment work in each township are published at cookcountyassessor.com.

The Cook County Assessor's Office will continue its re-assessment of the northern suburbs through the fall of 2019. The CCAO will re-assess the southern suburbs in 2020 and re-assess the City of Chicago in 2021.

"We will continue to build our ability to model and detect increasingly fine patterns in our assessments as we work to improve the accuracy, timeliness, and granularity of our data," said Chief Data Officer Robert Ross. "If we are able to improve our residential data by the time we reassess Chicago in 2021, we will be much closer to the IAAO's recommendations for uniformity and compliance.

Mayor Lightfoot And Accenture Announce Expansion Of Company's Innovation Hub Creating New Jobs And Opportunity For Chicago

Mayor Lori E. Lightfoot today joined Governor J.B. Pritzker, City Colleges of Chicago and Accenture executives in announcing an expansion of the global company, which will create 600 new tech jobs and create additional economic opportunity for Chicago. As part of its investment in Chicago, Accenture will expand its workforce by bringing together its 6,200 people to the newly named Accenture Tower at 500 W. Madison and will create new pathways for aspiring talent by growing its apprenticeship program to 180 students completing the program by the end of 2022.

Created in partnership with the City Colleges of Chicago, Accenture's professional apprentice program unlocks career opportunities for individuals who haven't had the opportunity to work in the technology industry as well as those returning to the workforce, or whose jobs have been disrupted by technology. Pappas: Senior citizens owed as much as \$45 million in unclaimed Cook County property tax exemptions

As many as 26,500 senior citizens could save a total of \$45 million on their Cook County property tax bills due August 1, 2019, by applying now for exemptions they received last year, Cook County Treasurer Maria Pappas said today.

Those homeowners received the Senior Citizen Homestead Exemption last year but have not reapplied, according to an estimate by the Treasurer's Office. Of those seniors, roughly 19,200 received the Senior Freeze Exemption last year but also have not reapplied.

"It takes a little time to apply, but the

exemptions reduce your tax bill by hundreds of dollars," Pappas said.

To verify tax exemptions going back four years, visit cookcountytreasurer.com and: · Select the purple box labeled "Your Property

Tax Overview

· Enter your address or Property Index Number (PIN)

· Check the results under "Have You Received Your Exemptions in These Tax Years?"

· If you believe you are entitled to an exemption you have not received, select "Apply for a missing exemption."

State law requires that senior citizens reapply every year for these exemptions, which are available to homeowners who are 65 years of age or older. The Senior Freeze, which prevents

increases in the taxable value of a home, is limited to seniors with annual household incomes of \$65,000 or less. Some of the homes may no longer be eligible for the exemptions.



Mayor Lightfoot Announces Next Steps Forward In The Creation Of A New Chicago Casino

Mayor Lori E. Lightfoot today announced the first steps toward the development of a new casino for the City of Chicago with consent on the selection of an independent consultant to perform an economic feasibility study. This study is required under the recently enacted legislation prior to developing, commissioning and operating a new casino in Chicago. Chicago's first-ever casino will create a dedicated new revenue stream for the City of Chicago

"While a Chicago casino had been talked about for more than 30 years, today we are moving forward to ensure the new casino is viable for Chicago and all of its communities," said Mayor Lightfoot. "Thanks to our partnership with Governor Pritzker, Speaker Madigan, President Cullerton and other state leaders, together we are advancing a shared vision for new revenues that will benefit Chicago's severely underfunded pension funds, while generating new jobs and economic opportunity for communities across the city."

Before a permanent site for the location is selected, the City will facilitate an open and thorough community engagement process to solicit meaningful feedback on preferred areas throughout the city. This community engagement process will start with an online survey, followed by a series of community town hall-style meetings to be scheduled at a later date.

The passage of state law to authorize expanded gambling provisions statewide makes way for a City-driven process that will grant Chicago authority to determine what type of casino will be built and to partner with the Illinois Gaming Board to ensure it is operated and regulated appropriately. City Council approval of a casino is also required by ordinance.

A Chicago casino has been anticipated for several years, and only under Mayor Lightfoot's leadership has it received the requisite legislative approvals to go forward. Under the state law, new revenues from a Chicago casino will be directed to shore up Chicago's underfunded police and fire pensions. Roadside History of Illinois

This is the thirtieth in a series of monthly short articles about places in Chicago, nearby suburbs and elsewhere in the state that can be visited by those who seek to learn more about local history. The articles are partial excerpts from the book, Roadside History of Illinois (Mountain Press, 2013), by Chicago author and Illinois native Stan Banash.



Highwood and Fort Sheridan

The Highwood area along the North Shore of Lake Michigan was only sparsely occupied by European immigrant farmers and settlers until the construction of the Chicago & Milwaukee Railroad in the early 1850s, which attracted an influx of laborers to the vicinity. In 1868 Baptist minister William Wallace Everts and attorney Elisha Ashley Mears partnered to plat a village, but it was not until the building of nearby Fort Sheridan in 1887 that Highwood really developed.

The stories of Highwood and Fort Sheridan are intertwined, and even their names, for a time, were interchangeable. The village of Highwood was incorporated in 1887, and Fort Sheridan opened the same year as Camp Highwood. The following year, however, both the village and the army post were renamed Fort Sheridan, after Lt. Gen. Philip H. Sheridan, who had close ties to Chicago. The community was incorporated in 1902 as the City of Fort Sheridan, but two years later it was reincorporated as the City of Highwood

Before the post of Fort Sheridan was established, the closest military installation to Chicago was Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, In 1886 a small group of wealthy Chicagoans donated a 632.5-acre parcel 25 miles north of the city for the construction of an army

post. The first troops arrived in November 1887, living in tents until funding for permanent buildings was approved. Upon its completion in 1889, Fort Sheridan housed six companies of infantry and four of cavalry. Shortly after the Wounded Knee massacre of December 29, 1890, 19 Sioux prisoners were transported from the Pine Ridge Reservation in South Dakota and held there for a few weeks: most of the Indians were released after agreeing to join buffalo Bill's Wild West Show.

The village took advantage of the fort's proximity to make a few bucks, establishing a plethora of saloons and gambling houses, plus a brothel or two, to serve restless soldiers. During most of the 1890s, Fort Sheridan was the only "wet" town on the railroad line between Chicago and the Wisconsin border, earning it the nickname "Whiskey Junction." In 1899 the Chicago & Milwaukee Electric Railroad created Fort Sheridan Park, a summer recreation area that featured not only picnic area and playgrounds but also vaudeville shows and concerts at which wine was served. All this activity drew disapproval from the sober residents of neighboring communities, but efforts to clean up Highwood mostly failed until Prohibition was enacted in 1919.

Asparagus Salad (Sparga Salata) Recipe from "The Hungarian Cookbook" by Susan Derecskey

2 lbs. asparagus, cooked and cooled

1-1/2 Tablespoons chopped scallions 1/2 Cup French sauce vinaigrette (see below)

1 Tablespoon finely chopped parsley 1 hard boiled egg yolk

Arrange the asparagus stalks in an oblong glass dish. Mix the scallions and parsley into the sauce vinaigrette, and pour it over the asparagus. Refrigerate for at least 30 minutes. Crumble the egg yolk rather coarsely so that it resembles blossoms of mimosa or golden rod. Just before serving, baste the asparagus with the sauce and sprinkle the crumbled egg yolk on top.

French Sauce Vinaigrette

The following recipe makes 1/2 cup of sauce, enough for 2 medium heads of Boston lettuce. A larger quantity may be made at one time and stored in the refrigerator for several days.

1/2 teaspoon dry mustardPinch of black pepper6 to 8 Tablespoons olive oil or cooking oil

1/4 teaspoon salt2 Tablespoons wine vinegar

Blend the mustard, salt, and pepper, add the vinegar, and mix thoroughly with a fork. Add the oil and stir or shake vigorously. Just before serving, mix the sauce thoroughly again and pour it over the salad or vegetables. If using lettuce or other vegetables than asparagus, turn them quickly and carefully until all of the pieces are coated. Serve in individual plates or bowls.

D'Amico Urges Governor to Sign Bill Raising Minimum Salary for Teachers

State Rep. John D'Amico, D-Chicago, is urging Gov. J.B. Pritzker to sign a measure raising the minimum salary for teachers in Illinois.

"Teachers are some of our most important and most selfless public servants, working hard each and every day to ensure that our children have a safe and vibrant learning environment," D'Amico said. "All across our state, teachers deserve a minimum salary that reflects the hard work they do to educate kids and help prepare them for the workforce."

D'Amico sponsored House Bill 2078, which gradually raises the minimum salary for teachers to \$40,000 per year by the 2023-2024 school year. Currently, the minimum salary for teachers in Illinois is just \$10,000 per year for teachers with a bachelor's degree, which is below federal poverty level. An analysis of Illinois State Board of Education data performed by the Illinois Education Association demonstrated that this measure will help raise salaries for nearly 8,000 teachers in Illinois.

"More than ever, it is important that we recognize the professionalism of teachers and do everything we can in order to demonstrate to them how much we value the service they provide by educating our children," D'Amico said. "I thank my colleagues in the House and Senate who supported this bill and I urge Governor Pritzker to sign this measure without delay so that we can show our teachers how much we value them."





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
