We Celebrate Columbus Day With All Of Our **Italian-American Friends and Neighbors**



Columbus Day first became an official state holiday in Colorado in 1906, and became a federal holiday in 1937. However, people have celebrated Columbus's voyage since the colonial period. During the four hundredth anniversary, in 1892, teachers, preachers, poets and politicians used Columbus Day rituals to teach ideals of patriotism. The first official, regular Columbus Day holiday was proclaimed by Colorado governor Jesse F. McDonald in 1905 and

made a statutory holiday in 1907. In April 1934, as a result of lobbying by the Knights of Columbus, Congress and President Franklin Delano Roosevelt made October 12 a federal holiday under the name Columbus Day.



Danish Duo Announces Opening Of Living Exhibit Composed Of 10,000 Cabbages At The Garfield Park Conservatory

The Cabbage Patch' Installation Is Part Of The Chicago Architecture Biennial, Which Runs From September 19 To January 5

The Chicago Park District, the Garfield Park Conservatory Alliance, the Danish Architecture Center, the Danish Arts Foundation and the Danish Arts in Chicago announce the installation of 'Cabbage Patch,' a one-of-a-kind, living architectural exhibit that pays homage to one of society's ancient forms of technology, agriculture, and one of its most sustainable crops.

The grand opening of the 'Cabbage Patch' was Saturday, September 21. This is also the 8th annual celebration of Harvest Day, a family-friendly event that invites visitors to embrace the fall season by meeting urban goats, chickens, and bees; playing veggie bingo, lawn games; tasting fresh local foods; and learning about worm bin composting. The artists will give tours of the exhibit and invite visitors to harvest cabbages, and chef demonstrations will feature Chef Bill Kim from Urban Belly.

"'Cabbage Patch' is a beautiful addition to Chicago and we are excited to host Danish architects Karen Gamborg Knudsen and Kasper Magnussen for the Chicago Architectural Biennial 2019," said Chicago Park District Superintendent and CEO, Michael P. Kelly. "Just like the Garfield Park Conservatory, architecture and public works like 'Cabbage Patch' have the power to transform public spaces and inspire a renewed sense of community and culture for all residents to enjoy."

This transformative display marks the first official Danish contribution to the Chicago Architecture Biennial. The Danish Arts Foundation selected Royal Danish Academy of Fine Arts educated architects Karen Gamborg Knudsen and Kasper Magnussen from among 42 applicants for the site-specific project, which runs through January 5, 2020; the last day of the Chicago Architectural Biennial. The cabbages will live out their stay until spring of 2020.

An agricultural field with about 10,000 cabbages and an outdoor kitchen will be installed in one of Garfield Park Conservatory's outdoor gardens, an appropriate site bearing in mind that the 111 year old greenhouse was originally designed by Danish landscape architect, Jens Jensen.

As architects from across the world showcase their creations in Chicago, the 'Cabbage Patch' spotlights Chicago's West Side, the historic greenhouse, and topics of accessibility to affordable, healthy and nutritious food sources and greenspaces. The cabbage is a staple crop grown in many cultures throughout history, and an ideal catalyst for conversations about culture, social equity and climate challenges.

"Denmark is thrilled to support this important engagement through the Danish Arts in Chicago initiative," added Consul General Riggelsen. "And we're equally excited that the Cabbage Patch can be hosted by an illustrious institution such as the Garfield Park Conservatory during this year's exceptional Chicago Architectural Biennial."

The Garfield Park Conservatory will work with community partners on the West Side and throughout the city to deliver culturally rich, educational and interactive programming inspired by the exhibit. Cooking demonstrations led by local chefs will provide Chicago residents and community partners the opportunity to harvest, prepare, and eat locally produced cabbage. Participating partners include the Garfield Park Garden Network, a thriving community garden network that transforms vacant lots into gardens that feed their neighbors; and Inspiration Kitchens, a restaurant training program that provides a pathway for under-employed participants to enter the workforce. Members of the Chicago Cultural Alliance will contribute recipes for the cabbage cookbook.

Garfield Park Conservatory is open Monday through Sunday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. with extended hours on Wednesday-until 8 p.m. Admission is free for all ages.

On Thursday, Oct. 17, the Library features Brazilian artist Roger Mello who will visit the Library's monthly Jammie Time program. Roger will read from his books, show how he creates his unique art, and then lead a craft session. And on Saturday, Oct. 19, Nathalie Gallermo Lopez, an artist and children's book illustrator originally from the Philippines, will read from her book Rain Star Babies, and offer an engaging activity for children.

Roger Mello has won many awards, including the prestigious 2014 Hans Christian Andersen Illustrator Award and a 2018 Batchelder Honor. After reading from his books, Roger will show how he creates his unique art. Then he will lead the group through an engaging craft project. He will answer questions and sign copies of books, including his brand new Charcoal Boys which offers a unique perspective on the life of a young boy working in Brazil's charcoal mines. It will be on sale from Booked,

Evanston's independent children's bookstore.

The author visit with Roger Mello takes place on Thursday, Oct. 17, from 6:30 to 7:30 pm, in the Children's Room at the Main Library. Children of all ages are invited; no registration is required. Children can wear their pajamas to the event; doing so is optional.

Nathalie Gallermo Lopez was born and raised in Bacolod City, Philippines. Attention: 60,000 Homeowners Should Update Their Mailing Address At: cookcountytreasurer.com

About 60,000 property owners in Cook County should use cookcountytreasurer.com to update the name or mailing address on their tax bills, another example of how the internet can make things easier for taxpayers, Treasurer Maria Pappas said today.

The online application replaces thousands of paper forms that the Treasurer's Office processes each year, Pappas said. "We've already eliminated the paper application for most refunds. Now we are changing the most routine request our office receives," she added.

To help homeowners who have mail-delivery problems, cookcountytreasurer.com shows when tax bills have been returned by the U.S. Postal Service. The Treasurer's Office has reduced the number of properties with incorrect mailing addresses by nearly a third, to 60,082.

To see if your bills have been returned or to change the name and address on your bill, visit cookcountytreasurer.com and:

- Select the purple box labeled "Your Property Tax Overview"
- Enter your address or Property Index Number (PIN)
- Look for a red warning box that appears if your bills have been returned

• Select "Update Your Information" to change the taxpayer name or mailing address

To avoid the hassle of the mail, select "eBilling" on the website to receive your tax bill by email. Paper name/address change applications will continue to be accepted

Bat Tests Positive for Rabies in Evanston

The Cook County Department of Animal and Rabies Control has confirmed that a bat has tested positive for rabies in Evanston.

On September 12, a bat was found in the 1400 block of Davis Street and was submitted for rabies examination. After testing, the bat was determined to be rabid by the Illinois State Public Health Laboratory.

An average of approximately 25 rabid bats are found in Cook County each year. This is the first bat to test positive for rabies in Evanston in 2019.

Any resident exposed to or bitten by a bat should contact their doctor immediately. Residents should seek veterinary assistance if their pet is bitten by a wild animal or exposed to a bat. In addition, community members are advised to supervise and leash their dogs, cats and ferrets when outside of their home. Animals without a current rabies vaccination should be inoculated immediately.

"The most significant measure people can take is to ensure that their pet's vaccinations are up to date," said Ike Ogbo, interim director of the City's Health and Human Services Department. "Not only does the vaccine protect the pet, it also serves as a barrier of protection for people."

Residents are reminded to not handle any bats, skunks or other wild animals. If a dead or down bat or skunk is found on their property or in the roadway, residents should call the Cook County Department of Animal Control at 708-974-6140.

HAPPY HALLOWEEN

Halloween is a time of celebration and superstition. It is thought to have originated with the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain, when people would light bonfires and wear costumes to ward off roaming ghosts. In the eighth century, Pope Gregory III designated November 1 as a time to honor all saints and martyrs; the holiday, All Saints' Day, incorporated some of the traditions of Samhain. The evening before was known as All Hallows' Eve and later Halloween. Over time, Halloween evolved into a secular, community-based event characterized by child-friendly activities such as trick-or-treating. In a number of countries around the world, as the days grow shorter and the nights get colder, people continue to usher in the winter season with gatherings, costumes and sweet treats.

NATIONAL GERMAN-AMERICAN DAY



German-American Day (German: Deutsch-Amerikanischer Tag) is a holiday in the United States, observed annually on October 6. The holiday, which celebrates German American heritage, commemorates the date in 1683 when 13 German families from Krefeld, near the Rhine, landed in Philadelphia. These

families subsequently founded Germantown, Pennsylvania, the first German settlement in the original thirteen American colonies, and organized the first petition in the English colonies to abolish slavery in 1688. Originally known under the rubric of "German Day", the holiday was celebrated for the first time in Philadelphia in 1883, on the occasion of the 200th anniversary of the arrival of the settlers from Krefeld; and similar celebrations developed later in other parts of the country. The custom died out during World War I as a result of the anti-German sentiment that prevailed at the time.[1] The holiday was revived in 1983.

In 1983, President Ronald Reagan proclaimed October 6 as German-American Day to celebrate and honor the 300th anniversary of German American immigration and culture to the United States. On August 6, 1987, Congress approved S.J. Resolution 108, designating October 6, 1987, as German-American Day. It became Public Law 100-104 when President Reagan signed it on August 18. A proclamation (#5719) to this effect was issued October 2, 1987, by President Reagan in a formal ceremony in the White House Rose Garden, at which time the President called on Americans to observe the Day with appropriate ceremonies and activities.



D'Amico Effort to Increase Opportunity in Vocational Trades Signed into Law

State Rep. John D'Amico, D-Chicago, is continuing his efforts to increase access to career opportunities in the trades by working to expand vocational job training through his support of a law creating the Training in Building Trades Program, which awards grants to community organizations that offer jobs training classes.

"I have seen firsthand how a career in the trades can offer good-paying reliable jobs for families like mine and countless more in our area," D'Amico said. "Especially as the price of higher education has skyrocketed, going into the trades offers a rewarding career path for young people.'

To create good-paying jobs for middle-class families, D'Amico passed House Bill 2304, which creates the Training in Building Trades Program in the Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity (DCEO). The goal of this program is to provide opportunities for people between 18 and 35 to learn trade skills, especially in construction, electrical trades or plumbing. The bill received strong bipartisan support and was recently signed into law by the governor.

With autumn's arrival, here's a delicious way to enjoy those fresh apples of any type.

Apple Streusel Cake Submitted by Maria Bappert

This recipe comes from Helga, one of the customers of the First Lady Beauty Salon on the NE corner of Western and Sunnyside in Chicago. She brought it along recently on a Thursday when she had her hair done, and I had a chance to enjoy a piece of the cake on Friday, which is when I have my hair done. Helga was kind enough to share her recipe with us.

Ingredients for the dough: 1 cup unsalted butter (2 sticks), 2 eggs and 1/2 cup milk, all at room temperature; 1 cup sugar, 4 cups plus 2 tbsp. flour, 2 tsp. baking powder. Sift flour and baking powder and set aside. Cream the butter with the sugar, and add eggs, one at a time, and beat in the milk. Combine with the flour mixture and spread into a greased 9" x 12" pan and top with the apple sauce. Use one cup of apple sauce for the 9" x 12" pan and at least 1-1/2 cups if you use the 15" x 10-1/2" pan.

Ingredients for the streusel topping: 2 cups plus 2 tbsp. flour, 1-1/2 cups sugar, 1 tsp. vanilla and 1 cup (2 sticks) of unsalted butter at room temperature. In the same bowl which you used for the dough, cream the butter, sugar and vanilla. Add the flour until well combined into a crumbly mixture and sprinkle evenly on top of the applesauce. Bake for 30 to 40 minutes in a 350 degree oven until evenly browned. Allow to cool and sprinkle with some powdered sugar. Cut into desired bars and serve. What a treat!

Apple Storage Techniques

Apples produce a gas that cause other types of fruits and vegetables to soften or spoil more quickly. For this reason, they should always be stored separately. Using thick layers of newspaper, line the bottoms of flat crates or drawers from an old chest-of-drawers, lay out the apples in them, and store them in the basement or garden shed. Check them often. Remove fruit showing brown spots immediately and use them.


