



Casimir Pulaski Day — Monday, March 4th

Casimir Pulaski Day is a holiday observed in Illinois on the first Monday of every March in memory of Casimir Pulaski (March 6, 1745 – October 11, 1779), a Revolutionary War cavalry officer born in Poland as Kazimierz Pułaski. He is praised for his contributions to the U.S. military in the American Revolution and known as "the father of the American cavalry".

The day is celebrated mainly in areas that have large Polish populations, such as Chicago and Bloomington. The focus of official commemorations of Casimir Pulaski Day in Chicago is at the Polish Museum of America where various city and state officials congregate to pay tribute to Chicago's Polish Community.

This is a separate holiday from the federal observance, General Pulaski Memorial Day, which commemorates Pulaski's death from wounds suffered at the Siege of Savannah on October 9, 1779.



Wisconsin public schools also observe Casimir Pulaski Day. Banks in Illinois may close for the holiday.

Section 118.02 of the Wisconsin Statutes provides that, "...when school is held or, if the day falls on a Saturday or Sunday, on a school day immediately preceding or following the respective day, the day shall be appropriately observed...." The use of "shall" denotes this as a mandatory requirement. Each public school in Wisconsin must observe Casimir Pulaski Day on March 4. How the day is observed — "appropriately" — allows for some discretion among the schools.

Buffalo, New York also acknowledges a "Pulaski Day," which is held in the middle of July, and is celebrated with an annual parade.

On November 6, 2009, President Barack Obama signed a joint resolution of the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives making Pulaski an honorary American citizen, 230 years after his death. He is one of eight people to be granted honorary United States citizenship.

Grand Rapids, Michigan hosts a "Pulaski Days" celebration annually on the first full weekend of October in recognition of General Pulaski and the Polish culture in general.

Renewal Applications Mailed for Disabled Veterans and Disabled Persons Exemptions

Cook County Assessor Fritz Kaegi announced that his office has mailed thousands of renewal applications for the disabled persons and disabled veterans exemptions.

These two exemptions were designed to provide additional property tax relief to veterans with service connected disabilities and non-veterans with disabilities. The application deadlines are March 6, 2019.

The Disabled Veterans Exemption reduces the Equalized Assessed Value (EAV) on which property taxes are computed. Recent changes in the law expanded eligibility and increased exemption amounts.

"The disabled veterans exemption is a way in which we can recognize the extraordinary sacrifices made by our nation's veterans," Assessor Kaegi said. "Veterans injured in the line of duty can take advantage of this exemption and get assistance from our office to learn more about the application and eligibility.

To qualify for the disabled veterans exemption (for the previous tax year 2018) taxpayers must:

• be an Illinois resident who served as a member of the United States Armed Forces on active duty or state active duty, a member of the Illinois National Guard or U.S. Reserve Forces and have been honorably discharged

• own and occupy the property as the primary residence in 2018

• have a primary residence with an EAV of less than \$250,000, excluding the EAV of property used for commercial purposes or rented for more than six month and

• have at least a 30% service-connected disability certified by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs.

Applicants must provide a disability certification letter from the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs as well as Form DD 214 or a Certification of Military Service Form.

Disabled Veterans Exemption applications may also be downloaded from the Assessor's website using the following link: http://sub.cookcountyassessor.com/assets/forms/ DisabledVeteransEx.pdf

The Disabled Persons Exemption provides disabled persons with an annual \$2000 reduction in the EAV of the property.

To qualify for the Disabled Persons Exemption this year (tax year 2018) taxpayers must be: • disabled or become disabled during 2018

• own or have a legal or equitable interest in the property or a leasehold interest in a singlefamily residence,

• occupy the property as the principal residence on January 1, 2018, and

• be liable for payment of property taxes.

If a person's home previously received the exemption and he or she now resides in a facility licensed under the Nursing Home Care Act, his or her home is still eligible to receive the exemption provided the property is occupied by that person's spouse, or the property remains unoccupied.

"Our office will work throughout the year to reach Cook County taxpayers through our community outreach programs to make them aware of exemptions our office administers and also help them with the application process," Assessor Kaegi said. "We want to ensure that no taxpayer pays more than his or her fair share of property taxes."

Cook County Assessor's Office Releases Exemption Booklets

Booklets Mailed to Homeowners As Part of Public Awareness Campaign

Cook County Assessor Fritz Kaegi announced today that taxpayer exemption booklets were mailed today to 110,000 homeowners - those whose properties sold in 2017 and those who did not receive an exemption on their properties for the previous two years.

"This exemption booklet guides homeowners through the application process saving them a trip to our office and time on the phone," Assessor Kaegi said. "The mailing is intended to make taxpayers aware of the exemptions available through this office."

The exemption application deadline is March 6, 2019.

The three exemptions that Cook County homeowners may apply for using the exemption booklet include:

• Homeowner Exemption – This exemption is available to all homeowners whose properties were occupied by the homeowner or the previous homeowner and used as a primary residence as of January 1, 2018.

• Senior Citizen Exemption - This exemption is available to all Cook County homeowners who were born prior to, or in, the year 1953 and use their home as their primary residence. This exemption entitles a senior to a reduction in the value of his or her property. Taxpayers receiving the Senior Exemption will automatically receive the Homeowner Exemption.

• Senior Freeze Exemption is available to all homeowners who were born prior to, or in, the year 1953 and have total household incomes of \$65,000 a year or less for the income tax year 2017. Requirements also state that eligible seniors must have used their home as their primary residence and resided there January 1st of 2017 and 2018. This valuable exemption protects limited-income senior citizen homeowners from increases in the value of their property.

The Senior Citizen and Senior Freeze Exemptions must be applied for annually. Homeowners who received the Homeowner Exemption last year and did not sell their homes in 2017 do not need to reapply and will continue to receive the exemption each year.

Taxpayers who wish to apply for any of the exemptions for the first time may download the taxpayer exemption application from the Assessor's website at cookcountyassessor.com or contact the Assessor's Office at 312-443-7550 to have an application mailed to them.

Pappas: 1,000 Senior Citizen Homes Being **Offered At Tax Sale**

About 1,000 homeowners in Cook County who have not paid last year's taxes could avoid the Annual Tax Sale by reapplying for senior citizen property tax exemptions they did not receive last year, Cook County Treasurer Maria Pappas said today.

Lists of all properties with delinquent taxes, broken down by Chicago ward and suburb, are posted daily to cookcountytreasurer.com. The Treasurer's Office also is sending lists of these senior citizens to elected officials countywide, asking the officials to encourage their constituents to apply for the missing exemptions to avoid the Tax Sale.

To see if your taxes are delinquent-and to make a payment-go to cookcountytreasurer.com and follow these steps:

Select "Avoid the Tax Sale"

Search by address or by Property Index Number (PIN)

Delinquent taxes for Tax Year 2017 (which were due in 2018) will be offered for sale to investors at the Annual Tax Sale that starts May 3, 2019.

Niles Food Pantry' Campaign Unveiled to Identify Specific Needs for Niles Township Food Pantry in 2019

A new year brings new challenges to more than a thousand families living right here in our community. There are also portable shelves on wheels, allowing the pantry to be easily and quickly restocked with the shipments from the Greater Chicago Food Depository. Three times a week, the pantry participates in a program called Food Rescue, where trucks visit grocery stores around the area, filling their trucks with meat, baked goods, produce

Roadside History of Illinois

This is the twenty-sixth in a series of monthly short articles about places in Chicago, nearby suburbs and elsewhere in the state that can be visited by those who seek to learn more about local history. The articles are partial excerpts from the book, Roadside History of Illinois (Mountain Press, 2013), by Chicago author and Illinois native Stan Banash.



Thirty years after the village of Glenview was incorporated in 1899, Curtiss Flying Service opened a large airfield, Curtiss-Reynolds Field, southwest of town. The 400-plus acre airfield was originally intended as an alternative to Chicago's Midway Airport, but when the stock market crashed in 1929, those plans were shelved and the halffinished facility was used as a flight-training school. Air races were held there in 1930 and again in 1933, the latter in conjunction with the Chicago Century of Progress. Shortly after that, Curtiss Flying Service merged with Wright Aeronautical to become the Curtiss-Wright Corporation.

In 1937 the U.S. Navy, in need of more space, leased part of the Curtiss-Wright facility, calling their half the Naval Reserve Aviation Base Glenview. During World War II, the Navy purchased the entire airfield and expanded it extensively. Renamed Naval Air Station Glenview, the base became the primary training facility for aircraft-carrier pilots, including Ens. George H. W. Bush, later to become the 41st president of the United States. Bush was stationed there for three days in 1943 while he completed the Carrier Qualification Training Unit program, which included ground school the first day, practice landings in nearby fields on the second day and finally exhibiting training proficiency by successfully completing eight successful carrier takeoffs and landings on the USS Sable or USS Wolverine. Both ships were Great Lakes side-wheel paddle steamers that were converted into mock aircraft carriers. The planes flew from Glenview out over Lake



Michigan for the final day of training. With training successfully completed, Bush was assigned to Torpedo Squadron 51 aboard the independence-class light aircraft carrier USS San Jacinto and flew a Grumman TBM Avenger bomber during World War II.

Other prominent individuals assigned to the Naval Air Station at various times were: former President Gerald R. Ford, who served on a surface ship during World War II, but was stationed at Naval Air Station Glenview from April 1945 – January 1946; astronaut Neil Armstrong, first man to set foot on the moon; Lt. Cmdr. Edward H. "Butch" O'Hare, the navy's first World War II ace and a Medal of Honor recipient for whom O'Hare International Airport is named; and Rear Adm. Dan Gallery, who led a task group to capture the German submarine U-505, currently displayed at the Museum of Science and Industry in Chicago.

Naval Air Station Glenview was later used by the Army and Navy Reserves and the Coast Guard. The final air show at the base took place in 1993. After the base was closed in 1995, the village of Glenview oversaw the property's redevelopment into homes, golf courses, public parks, offices, and commercial space. The revamped 1.5 square-mile district was dubbed The Glen, which also included Hangar One. It includes the control tower that was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1998. Naval Air Station Museum Glenview originally occupied space at The Glen, but moved into a new building nearby in 2006 at 2040 Lehigh Avenue in Glenview.

Garfield Park Conservatory Agave Plant Flourishes Around-the-clock A Plant Hailing From Desert Like Regions That Exceed 100°F Thrives In Chicago's Temperature Controlled Shangri-La

The Garfield Park Conservatory, located at 300 N. Central Park Ave., is home to 12 acres of indoor and outdoor gardens and over 2,000 varieties of plants, one of which has been growing insatiably for the last week. The Agave Americana plant, which normally grows 6 feet tall and up to 8 feet wide, is sending up a flower stalk that is nearly 2 feet tall.

In over a period of three weeks, the stalk (or quiote) has grown impressively. Over the weekend, the stalk grew 11 inches, and Conservatory staff set-up a camera only to record how it flourished an additional 7 inches in just 24 hours. Since then the agave plant has continued to reach upward.

This is not normal for this species, especially outside of its native Mexico and in such a restricted space. Conservatory horticulturalists can only speculate what may have contributed to the plant's sudden boost in vitality. It is fairly unusual for this species to reach

maturity and flower in captivity.

"A few slightly longer, warmer and sunny days, or it also could be entirely the plant's own 'decision, ' genetic



disposition to start growing," said Garfield Park Conservatory horticulturalist, Ray Jorgensen. "Quite possibly it was a combination of the two elements. Agave Americanas are not picky about their soil and as long as it has good drainage, they can take a bit of frost, but not below freezing temperatures for a prolonged period of time."

What is more astounding is that the species, native to some of the most hot and arid areas of the world, has been maturing voraciously despite the artic temperatures gripping Chicago. The agave plant's sudden burst of energy occurred as mounds of snow piled up and ice crystals formed on the window panes of the greenhouse last week. In their natural habitat, this plant species normally flowers from summer into late fall. It is even more surprising to witness this sudden growth spurt a week after Chicago's recent bout with subzero temperatures and subsequent bone chilling rain and ice.

There are over 100 different agave species and varieties. The oversized succulent on display at the West Side greenhouse is of the Agave Americana kind and is the first agave to be discovered and named in May 1, 1753.

The plant came to Chicago and has been growing in the Conservatory's Desert House for over 50 years. In the wild, these plants reach maturity in approximately 15 to 25 years. This is just one of 25 agave species that the Conservatory maintains as part of its vast collection of exotic plants that thrive in its Desert House. This plant usually flowers once and then slowly dies because the amount of energy necessary to produce its inflorescence depletes all of its energy.

The long leave succulent plant produces a flower spire with panicles (branches) topped with flowers that extend outward and contain a sap that is fermented into a drink called pulque. This substance is then distilled to make the spirit mezcal. Mezcal is not the only liquor produced from this plant; tequila is made exclusively from blue agave, one of the many varieties of this plant.



Midway: A Lecture by Paul D'Amato

Paul D'Amato's series, Midway, is a project that explores the twilight zones of urbanity which exist between neighborhoods that are geographically, ethnically and socio-economically distinct. The heart of it is Chicago's Midway Airport, one of the few airports in the United States that is embedded within a residential area of a city. It is a rock thrown into the middle of a pond of humanity, with economic and cultural ripples extending for miles in every direction.

Though working class, the Midway community is difficult to define and routinely ignored by everyone going to the airport in order to fly to places that are far more exotic. Just about every ethnic group in the city lives there against a backdrop of strip malls, fast food restaurants, light industry, shipping firms and transportation companies. Most of the residents are midway between poverty and middle class. Very few have flown on the jets that make their dishes rattle every ten minutes. It is hard to conceive of anywhere that is less romantic. The challenge that D'Amato faced while shooting this project was to weave all these incoherent pieces together into a body of work that could be from anywhere in the United States; because, it is emphatically midway and distinctly nowhere.

Paul D'Amato (American, 1956-) was born in Boston where he attended Boston Latin School at the height of racial unrest, civil rights and busing. He moved to Oregon to attend Reed College and claims to have learned as much from traveling cross-country four times a year – often by hitch-hiking and hopping freight trains – as he did in class. After receiving an MFA from Yale School of Art, he moved to Chicago where he discovered the communities of Pilsen and Little Village. The pictures and writing D'Amato produced there over the next fourteen years were made into the book, "Barrio." His most recent book of images made in the African-American community on the West Side, entitled "Here/Still/Now," was awarded the Lucie Foundation Book Prize in 2018. He has been awarded numerous grants and fellowships including a Guggenheim Fellowship, a Pollock-Krasner Grant and a Rockefeller Foundation Grant to Bellagio, Italy. His work is in the collections of the Museum of Modern Art, The Metropolitan Museum of Art and The Art Institute of Chicago among many others.

Mayor Emanuel Announces A Record 57.6 Million Visitiors To Chicago In 2018

Mayor Rahm Emanuel recently announced Chicago welcomed over 57.6 million visitors in 2018 - a growth of 4.3% over the previous year, resulting in a new tourism record.

The increases in 2018 were also reflected in major meetings and trade shows hosted in Chicago. Of the 50 largest events convening at McCormick Place in 2018, 40% (20 conventions) broke either attendance for exhibitor participation records, with 15 of these meetings setting new all-time attendance records, including 11 setting new exhibition space sales records and 8 that reported record-breaking number of exhibitors.

Help Birds Create a Nest in Your Yard

Now is the time to start thinking about nesting boxes for birds. Many cavity nesting birds scout out and select nest sites starting in late February through May. It is time to begin making preparations. Register your yard or garden as a Certified Wildlife Habitat®, and you'll be entered to win a hanging nest box for your yard. Check out these tips for nest box success.

Choose your tenant. Different bird species have different nesting needs, so it is important to tailor the nest box to the species you want.

Location is key. Place your box so that birds have a clear flight path to the entrance and avoid placing your box in direct sunlight, the best position provides morning sunlight and shade in the afternoon. Different species prefer nest boxes at different heights, but make sure that it is at least 6 feet above ground to deter predators.

Provide security. Predators like raccoons, snakes, domestic cats, or non-native birds can destroy your nest. To prevent this, don't include a perch on your box which allows predators a place to grab onto to, choose a nest box with the right sized entry hole for the species you're attracting, and use a predator guard around the entrance hole or around the mounting post.

Don't forget to clean! Removing old nesting material can help minimize a build-up of nest parasites in the box.

By providing food, water, cover and places for wildlife to raise their young you are eligible to have your yard recognized as a Certified Wildlife Habitat. When you certify, you'll join over 225,000 gardeners across America who provide safe places for wildlife like birds to thrive. Creating a wildlife habitat garden not only helps wildlife, it gives you a beautiful place to experience nature every day.

Favorite Recipes from the Kitchen of Maria P. Bappert

BEEF ROLLADEN

This is one of the most well-known and great favorite beef dishes of Germany. Each cook adds his or her own touches, and this method of preparation comes from Hildegard Christophersen of DeBary, Florida, and from Richard Bappert of Deltona, Florida, who worked for years at Nick's Meat Market in Chicago.

Use thinly-sliced sirloin tip (from full tip) or London broil cuts of beef about 8" x 4" or 6" x 4". Have the butcher slice it real thin or cut it with the meat slicer when meat is frozen. You can also pound the slices with a meat mallet, which will tenderize the meat even more. Spread with a brown mustard. Place a slice or two of lean bacon and thinly sliced onions lengthwise on the meat. You can also use 4" long slices of celery or carrot, both cut in half lengthwise, and a quarter of gherkin the same width as the meat. Roll up tightly lengthwise and secure with two toothpicks. Dust with flour on all sides and brown a few at a time in olive oil. Set aside.

Oven method: After all pieces of rolladen are browned, place them side-by-side in an ovenproof baking dish and add any leftover celery, carrots and onion.

Stovetop method: Place rolladen in a pan with tight fitting cover. Add vegetables as above. Deglaze frying pan with water, add one or two beef bouillon cubes for flavoring or some brown Maggi seasoning, and add to rolladen. Cover tightly and simmer or bake in a 350 degree Fahrenheit oven for about half an hour. Turn rolladen, cover pan again, and simmer or bake for another half hour. To prepare the gravy, remove rolladen from pan so that only the juices and extra cooked vegetables remain. Dissolve some corn starch in cold water, slowly add to the pan juices and stir and heat until the gravy is nice and smooth.

Favorite side dishes to serve with Beef Rolladen are bread dumplings, homemade spaetzle, or cooked store-bought noodles, along with your favorite vegetable or salad. Bon appetit!

Your "Tante Mitzi" Bappert

SPAETZLE

Ingredients: 2 eggs, 1/2 cup milk, 1-1/2 cups flour, 1/2 tsp. salt, 2-3 tbsp. butter

Fill large pot 2/3 full with water and add about 1 tsp. salt, and bring to a boil. Reduce heat to low or medium so you have a gentle boil. Beat eggs and milk with a fork. Combine flour and salt and add to egg-milk mixture; stir with a wooden spoon until flour is blended

in and dough is smooth. With a tablespoon, spoon almost-sized portions into the water by first dipping the spoon into the water and then taking dough from the edge of the bowl. Dip spoon into the water with each spaetzle. This will help them to fall off the spoon easily. Cook until spaetzle rise to the top of the pot. Test a large one by cutting it in half to be sure the center is not raw. Pour into colander and drain thoroughly, then quickly rinse with cold water and shake as dry as possible. Melt the butter in a saucepan and add the spaetzle and fry until lightly browned. Use a spatula or wooden spoon to stir. If you have a spaetzle press, use a heavy stainless steel or cast aluminum pan to place the press on the edge. Fill the press with dough, and when the water is boiling, press the dough into it. Since the noodles are thinner than when made by hand, when they hit the boiling water they bounce back up almost immediately, that's how quickly they cook, but test one for doneness.


BAVARIAN RED CABBAGE

Ingredients; 4 slices of bacon; 1 medium onion (1/2 cup), chopped; 4 cups shredded red cabbage; 1 tart apple, pared, quartered and chopped; 1 tbsp. sugar; ½ tsp. salt; 1/8 tsp. pepper; ¹/₄ tsp. caraway seeds and 3 tbsp. cider vinegar.

Fry bacon until crisp. Drain, reserving 2 tbsp. of the drippings. Saute onion in the drippings until soft. Add the cabbage, apple, sugar, salt, pepper and caraway seeds. Stir, cover and cook over low heat for 10 minutes. Add vinegar and cook for 15 more minutes.
