
#### 21st Chicago Kids and Kites Festival



## AMITA Health Resurrection Medical Center Chicago and Resilience Team Up, Provide More Support to Survivors of Sexual Assault

Resilience, the Chicago metro area's largest rape crisis organization, and AMITA Health Resurrection Medical Center Chicago, are collaborating to expand support to survivors of sexual violence.

When survivors receive care in the emergency department at AMITA Health Resurrection Medical Center, 7435 W. Talcott Ave., Chicago, Resilience, originally called Rape Victim Advocates, sends one of 257 trained volunteers to serve as that patient's advocate to offer emotional and practical help during and after a survivor's ED visit.

"We're thankful to work with Resilience to best meet the needs of sexual assault survivors in our community," said Valerie Sentowski, nursing director of the emergency department at AMITA Health Resurrection Medical Center. "Partnering to care for the full needs of these patients is a privilege and an honor and fits well with our mission to treat the most vulnerable."

AMITA Health Resurrection Medical Center is the sixteenth Chicago-area hospital to rely on Resilience to augment support for sexual assault survivors. Services for survivors, available in English or Spanish, are always offered free of charge. During 2018, more than 2,300 survivors benefitted from crisis intervention, advocacy and trauma therapy services provided by Resilience.

"Sadly, sexual violence happens in every demographic group," says Sarah Layden, Resilience's

director of programs and public policy. "Even the most comfortable and tightly knit neighborhoods are not immune. Our volunteers offer services that complement the extraordinary care of emergency room professionals. Working with AMITA Resurrection's ED staff members, our volunteers make a powerful difference in the lives of survivors during and after their hospital stay."

Resilience advocates serve as liaisons with healthcare professionals. They are trained to offer emotional support, share information about medical concerns and assist survivors by facilitating communication with hospital staff and police.

Resilience advocates provide continuity for survivors after their ER visit by providing immediate, practical support, such as arranging transportation to home or offering referrals to a shelter. Volunteers also bring new clothing, because survivors' clothing is often taken as evidence. They provide information about counseling, as well as accessing future medical treatment, resolving hospital bills or helping with potentially stressful tasks when survivors file a police report, meet with law enforcement officers and prepare for legal proceedings.

#### Cook County Assessor's Office Publicly Releases Residential Assessment Code And Models Groundbreaking Effort Puts Cook County At The Forefront Of Open Government And Technology

Cook County Assessor Fritz Kaegi and Chief Data Officer (CDO) Rob Ross announced the public release of the Cook County Assessor's Office's (CCAO) residential assessment and modeling code as well as its underlying datasets. In doing so, the Assessor's Office broke new ground in transparency for both its own office and assessing offices around the country.

In front of a packed, sold-out crowd at Chi Hack Night—the city's monthly gathering of coders journalists, academics, and civic technologists—Assessor Kaegi and CDO Ross pushed the code live by selecting an audience member at random to join them and hit the publish button, symbolically demonstrating the nature of its work as by, for, and of the citizens of Cook County.

"This is unprecedented for our office and also puts us in a leading position among our peers in other metro areas," said Assessor Kaegi. "We have some long-term technological challenges to overcome in our office, but we haven't let them stop us from innovating wherever we can, particularly when it comes to transparency."

In the past, the CCAO only released its models and code when compelled to do so through freedom of information requests or court order. Assessor Kaegi's administration promised to voluntarily make

Free public access to quality legal advice will be offered and attorneys from all areas of Chicago's legal community will come together to support efforts to strengthen the American system of freedom and justice as the Chicago Bar Association and its Young Lawyers Section celebrate Law Week 2019.

The Law Week program, held in conjunction with the American Bar Association's celebration of national Law Day, will take place April 27 to May 3. The week will include a series of events that recognize and promote the role of law in society and promote a deeper understanding of the legal profession. The theme for the law week events this year is "Free Speech, Free Press, Free Society."

Law week will kick off on April 27 with an important offering for members of the public who are in need of legal advice from a qualified attorney. Lawyers with the CBA's Call-A-Lawyer Program will be available to take calls and offer brief legal advice on Saturday, April 27, from 9 a.m. to noon at (312) 554-2001.

Citizens can call in and briefly explain their situation to an attorney who will then work to suggest self-help strategies or provide advice to help resolve their issues. If callers need further legal services, or have questions beyond the scope of the attorney's practice area, they will be advised to contact the CBA Lawyer Referral Service for a referral to an attorney in the appropriate area of law.

The remaining Law Week events include the following:

#### Thursday, May 2 – Meet the Judges Reception and Liberty Bell Award Presentation

The Young Lawyers Section will host a meet and greet with judges from the Illinois Appellate Court, Federal Court and the Circuit Court of Cook County in recognition of Law Day.

The YLS will also present the annual Liberty Bell Award to an individual (non-lawyer) who works within the legal system to advocate for the disadvantaged and help increase access to the justice system for citizens who need it most.

### Friday, May 3 – Law Day Public Celebration

Members of Chicago's legal community will provide personal reflections on Law Week and its theme at a public ceremony at Noon at the Richard J. Daley Center, 50 W. Washington. The CBA's Symphony Orchestra will also perform musical selections.

its code, models, and data available to the public to let journalists and technologists verify that the CCAO's models were delivering on its promise of fairness and equity.

The CCAO published its code and data on GitLab, an open-source online platform for software development, as well as the Cook County Open Data Portal. Publishing the code on the Data Portal is part of the CCAO's ongoing partnership with the Cook County Board of Technology.

"Transparency in civic technology is a two-way street. We expect journalists, academics, and coders to use this data in a way that not only lets them check our work, but also improve it," said CDO Ross.

The release of the code and underlying data follows the publication of new township-level reporting on the Office's assessment methodology and modeling. Approximately 40 pages of residential and commercial reporting has been and will continue to be released on each re-assessed township for the northern suburbs of Cook County. As part of its triennial system, the south suburbs will be re-assessed next year and the city of Chicago in 2021.

Assessor Kaegi will discuss the code release and the CCAO's re-assessment process as part of his ongoing countywide listening tour. The next stop on the tour will be this Saturday, April 20th at 1pm. Cook County Commissioner Luis Arroyo Jr. will join Assessor Kaegi for the event at Mary Lyon Public School (2941 N. McVicker Ave., Chicago), featuring a Q&A session with Vanessa Valentin of the Northwest Side Housing Center and members of the public. Spanish language translation will be available. #### The City Logical: Edward P. Brennan Makes Sense of the Grid

Northwestern University Professor of Instruction in English, Bill Savage, a life-long Rogers Park resident, will relate the story of another figure from Rogers Park history. Edward P. Brennan lived for many years on the 6400 block of North Wayne and is buried in Calvary Cemetery. In 1909, he was the freelance urban planner whose idea to make State and Madison Streets the East-West and North-South axes of our grid simplified our city's street addresses. His effort to make Chicago a "City Logical" means old-timers and newcomers alike can make their way around town without the aid of street maps or GPS, while exceptions to his rules of the Chicago grid remind us of important historical lessons.

This talk back was initiated as a result of Schurz students wanting media to understand that recent coverage of a fatal shooting near the school presents a distorted picture of their neighborhood.

#### "Operation Prom" Presented At Resurrection College Prep High School

In preparation for prom season, Resurrection College Prep High School hosted the Anne Bleicher Operation Prom program on April 17, 2019. Operation Prom is a dramatic educational program that demonstrates the tragic effects of driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs. Junior and senior students at Resurrection witnessed a simulated fatal car crash in the parking lot at Resurrection College Prep, complete with emergency response vehicles, paramedics and student actors playing the roles of injured and emotional teens. The actors included Resurrection students Stacey Coakley, Isabella Clifford and



Mary Hobson and Notre Dame College Prep students Jack O'Brien and Sebastia Rivera. Operation Prom is hosted every two years at Resurrection to educate students about making responsible driving decisions and all juniors and seniors have seen this presentation since 1999.

Following the crash simulation, the students gathered in the Resurrection College Prep Little Theater to hear guest speakers address the real-life impact of driving under the influence or while distracted. #### New Illinois Lottery Digital Platform Delivers Increased Player Engagement

Improved website and mobile app make it easier to play games and scan tickets

The Illinois Lottery's new digital platform is now fully operational and delivering encouraging signs of early engagement. The website (IllinoisLottery.com) and mobile app are designed to make gameplay easier and more convenient for players.

The modernized digital platform already is bringing new players to the Illinois Lottery, with 35,000 new accounts registered in March. The Lottery also continues to see an increase in website traffic, with more than 1.9 million visitors since the soft launch in February. Mobile app downloads have increased 277% when compared to the same six-week period last year.

"Our mission is to grow the Lottery and attract new players in a socially responsible way," Illinois Lottery Acting Director Harold Mays said. "The new digital platform helps support that mission by providing a solid foundation for future revenue growth for the State of Illinois."

The new digital platform features a dynamic home page that displays the next jackpot and most recent game results, quick registration and a state-of-the art data platform to provide a personalized experience for each player. The new mobile app allows players who buy draw-based game tickets at retail locations to check whether they have winning tickets by scanning them directly through the mobile app.

The new mobile app is available for iOS and Android users. The iOS app can be found in the Apple App Store, and Android users can download the app from the Illinois Lottery's website. Players also can play via their mobile device or computer at IllinoisLottery.com.

"The Illinois Lottery's digital platform offers players an engaging, streamlined experience," Camelot Illinois General Manager Colin Hadden said. "By employing best practices to create an environment for responsible gaming, our goal is to attract lots of people to play a little, rather than a few playing a lot."

The new website and mobile app have built-in responsible play protections. With mandatory age and identity checks, only those 18 years old or older who reside in Illinois are able to play online. Other player protections include a weekly deposit limit that a player may set to a lower limit that fits with their budget, preventing players from adding more funds once the limit is reached, and a session timer that displays how long a player has been active on the site.

The new digital platform is one part of a complete technology and retail transformation for the Illinois Lottery, with significant retail improvements being delivered in the coming months. These improvements are intended to make it quicker for retailers to check tickets and improve the in-store experience for players and other customers.

An \$86 million investment will see new retail terminals, vending machines, signage and ticket dispensers transform the Illinois Lottery's presence in more than 7,200 retail locations. The transformation is one of the biggest retail and technology transformations undertaken by any lottery in the U.S.

Last year, the Illinois Lottery provided more than \$700 million to the State's Common School Fund to support K-12 education throughout Illinois. With Camelot Illinois on board, Illinois Lottery funding for education is expected to grow by 40 percent to more than \$1 billion annually in 2027.

#### Chicago's Adler Planetarium to Become First Planetarium in Space with ThinSat Mission Aboard Antares Rocket

On Wednesday, April 17, the Adler Planetarium's Far Horizons program will be sending its first mission to space aboard the Antares Rocket used to resupply the International Space Station. The team will be traveling to Virginia Space as part of the ThinSat Program. With this mission, the Adler Planetarium will become the first planetarium in space!

The Adler is one of the lead institutions (the only museum/non-traditional education facility) among 60+ selected to participate from around the world in the opportunity to engage students in space exploration via the ThinSat program. The brainchild of nanosatellite pioneer Professor Bob Twiggs, ThinSats are very tiny satellites. They resemble thin slices of bread (many can be sent together in a loaf). They are launched into space at a low altitude, and usually come down in about a week. In that week, they will travel millions of miles around the Earth and experience the hard vacuum and high radiation of outer space.

The ThinSats will launch as a secondary payload on Northrop Grumman's Antares 230 launch vehicle from Wallops Island, Virginia, on an International Space Station resupply mission. They will deploy on the second stage of the rocket that will be left in extremely low Earth orbit (ELEO) so that it will burn up quickly. Once the ThinSats have been deployed in ELEO, the remaining cargo will travel on the Cygnus spacecraft towards the ISS.

The Adler's Far Horizons program is collaborating with teens from the ITW David Speer Academy, with an aim to increase participation of underrepresented minorities in STEM fields. Students enjoy a real mentorship experience as they face the challenges involved in space-driven missions. Working alongside Adler professional engineers and scientists over the course of 20 weeks, the students acquired the necessary skill sets in electronic hardware, soldering, programming, and data analysis to aid in the development of our ThinSat.

The Adler's first ThinSat mission will be a test to measure the changing colors of light as seen by the satellite as it passes over different regions of the Earth. With these measurements, students will learn how to recognize different features of land and water by studying the wavelengths of light they reflect. This is the first step to identifying similar features on surfaces of exoplanets!

#### Private Elm Tree Insurance Program

The City of Evanston is once again offering community members the opportunity to enroll in its Private Elm Tree Insurance Program, which covers the removal of elm trees on private property lost due to Dutch elm disease (DED). The deadline to enroll in the 2019 program is Friday, May 31.

Participants re-enrolling in the program may do so online; first-time participants must complete a paper application. Both the online re-enrollment form and paper application are available at cityofevanston.org/ elminsurance. Application and payment must be received no later than May 31 in order for trees to qualify for insurance.

When DED infects a tree on private property, the homeowner bears the costs for removal, which can range from approximately \$1,000 to \$6,000. The City's Private Elm Tree Insurance Program covers the cost of removing infected elm trees, and also provides free testing of insured elms if DED symptoms appear. The insurance is for a one-year period, June 1, 2019 through May 31, 2020, and must be renewed annually prior to the Dutch elm disease season.



1 tsp vinegar for each color you are using You can use any food dye to dye these eggs Paas Neon Dye is what is used in the picture. (Wilton icing colors or concentrated gels work great but use sparingly. If you want a more

pastel color. And use boiling water instead of cold water) If you are trying to do the pastel shown in the picture you don't want to leave them in the dye for very long. Because the egg is very porous, they will take the dye very quickly!!! Give them a quick dunk in the water and very quickly pull them out to see if it is the color

you want. Don't let them soak for long!!!!! Remove the shells from the hard boiled eggs and slice each egg in half

Remove the yolks from the egg halves and place in a bowl. Set the yolks aside.

Get enough glasses or mugs for the number of colors you want to use. Fill the mugs or glasses 2/3 of the way full with cold water.

Add 3 drops of desired food coloring along with 1 tsp vinegar to each mug or cup. Place egg whites in the mugs and allow to sit in the food coloring until desired color is

reached. I could fit 3 egg whites in each of my mugs at a tim Remove whites from dye and drain on a plate lined with a couple of paper towels.

Prepare Mashed egg yolks with your favorite recipe.

Pipe or spoon the yolk mix into the colored egg whites.

#### ALSATIAN APPLE TART

With its graceful fan of apple slices enrobed in creamy vanilla custard, this tart is a dessert classic of the small but esteemed region of Alsace, France. Bordering Germany and Switzerland, Alsace is known for its high-quality cuisine that reflects a mix of German and French influences. Try this delicious tart for a small taste of this region.

#### **PASTRY:**

1-1/3C (166 g) flour, plus more for dusting

Pinch salt

7 T (100 g) unsalted butter, cut into small pieces, plus extra for greasing

2 T (24 g) sugar

1 lg egg yolk

3 T (44 ml) ice water

#### FILLING:

2 lb (0.9 kg) McIntosh apples, peeled and quartered

3 T (44 ml) lemon juice

3 lg eggs

1/2 C (96 g) sugar

1/2 C (115 ml) heavy cream

1/2 tsp (2.5 g) vanilla

#### DIRECTIONS

Preheat oven to 400°F (204°C). Grease a 9- or 10-inch tart pan with butter.

Dough: Sift flour and salt into large bowl. Cut in butter until mixture resembles crumbs. With a fork, lightly mix in sugar, egg yolk and enough ice water to make a dough. Press into a ball; wrap in plastic and refrigerate 30 minutes. Then, on a floured surface, roll out dough into a 12-inch circle. Line tart pan with dough and prick bottom with a fork.


Filling: Slice apple quarters thinly into fans; sprinkle with lemon juice. Spread apple fans across dough, filling the bottom. In a medium bowl, beat eggs and sugar until pale and creamy; add cream and vanilla. Pour egg mixture over apples. Bake 20 minutes then reduce heat to 350°F (177°C) and bake 25 minutes more or until filling is firm.

SERVING SUGGESTION

Serve with lightly sweetened whipped cream or vanilla ice cream.
