FLAG DAY ~ JUNE 14

Each year on June 14 we celebrate the birthday of the Stars and Stripes, which came into being on June 14, 1777. At that time, the Second Continental Congress authorized a new flag to symbolize the new Nation, the United States of America.

The Stars and Stripes first flew in a Flag Day celebration in Hartford, Connecticut in 1861, during the first summer of the Civil War. The first national observance of Flag Day occurred June 14, 1877, the centennial of the original flag resolution.

In 1916 President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation calling for a nationwide observance of Flag Day on June 14. It was not until 1949 that Congress made this day a permanent observance by resolving "That the 14th day of June of each year is hereby designated as Flag Day...". The measure was signed into law by President Harry Truman.

Although Flag Day is not celebrated as a Federal holiday, Americans everywhere continue to honor the history and heritage it represents.





City Announces Two Month Nomination Period For 'Chicago's Top Cabbie'

Passengers Encouraged To Vote For Taxicab Drivers Who Have Demonstrated Heroism Or Top-Notch Customer Service

The City of Chicago Department of Business Affairs and Consumer Protection (BACP) today announced the launch of a citywide competition to find 'Chicago's Top Cabbie.' The public can now nominate their favorite taxicab driver through 3-1-1 beginning today through July 20, 2016 and are encouraged to use social media to spread the word using #ChiTopCabbie.

"This contest will encourage exemplary service from taxicab drivers across the city," said BACP Commissioner Maria Guerra Lapacek. "The financial freedom of the top prize – a free medallion - is a game-changer and I look forward to presenting it to Chicago's top cabbie."

The competition is designed to reward a licensed public chauffeur for their heroism and/or top-notch customer service and is open to all 12,000 public chauffeurs licensed by the city.

At the end of the two month nomination process, each nominee's credentials will be verified by the BACP. The top finalists and their stories will be posted online at www. chitopcabbie.com for voting. The voting period will last 14 days and will be open to the public. The first place prize is a free taxicab medallion for life.

BACP is promoting this contest through a handful of municipal digital billboards, through the two CHICABS apps, Curb and Arro, as well as on social media.

An ordinance introduced in City Council earlier this year created the competition

with the top prize of a free taxicab medallion. The contest is looking to build on the success of the Taxicab Driver Excellence Award, which recognizes taxicab drivers who serve the disabled community.

The Emanuel administration has made a number of reforms to increase taxicab driver income, drive industry innovation, and improve taxicab driver experience. The reforms enacted include: offering universal taxi smartphone app service with Arro and Curb; enacting a 15 percent taxi fare increase that will increase average taxi driver income by \$4,000 to \$10,000 annually; requiring that taxicab owners share paid exterior adverting revenue with the taxicab drivers; introducing a \$50 late fee payable to taxi drivers when taxi companies fail to "pay-out" credit card fare payments within one business day; reducing the credit card transaction fee; reducing lease rate caps for taxi drivers; extending vehicle age requirements for fuel efficient vehicles by increasing their allowed life cycle to seven years; and reducing fines for which a taxi driver can be cited.

BACP oversees the licensing of Chicago's public chauffeurs and public vehicles including taxicabs, transportation network providers, liveries, charter and site seeing buses, horse drawn carriages, ambulances, water taxis and tour boats. Mayor Emanuel Helps Break Ground For Albany Park Stormwater Diversion Tunnel Tunnel Will Have Capacity To Divert 2,300 Cubic Feet Of Water Per Second

Mayor Rahm Emanuel was joined today by Senator Dick Durbin, Alderman Margaret Laurino (39th Ward) and other partners in breaking ground for the construction of a new Stormwater Diversion Tunnel to relieve the threat of catastrophic flooding in Albany Park. The joint Chicago Department of Transportation (CDOT)/Metropolitan Water and Reclamation District (MWRD) project will take two years to construct a tunnel 150 feet below ground level to divert stormwater about 1.4 miles from the North Branch of the Chicago River to the North Shore Channel.

Since 2008, Albany Park has experienced two major floods that have affected hundreds of homes in the northwest side community along the North Branch of the Chicago River. After the last round of serious flooding in April 2013, Mayor Emanuel pledged the city would address the problem in a comprehensive way and directed CDOT to move forward with design and engineering of a drainage tunnel. The approximately \$70 million project will produce an estimated 250 construction jobs.

"Working collaboratively to solve neighborhood problems like this one in Albany Park is what government partnerships are all about," said Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago Board of Commissioners President Mariyana Spyropoulos. "We are committed to the success of this project."

Work on the project will be visible at two ground-level locations: the inlet shaft off

Foster east of Pulaski Rd and at the outlet shaft in River Park on the east side of the North Shore Channel.

May and June: mobilize for construction – park closures and relocation of the walking/biking path.

July-December: Excavation and construction of the concrete inlet and outlet shafts; will require use of explosives to remove bedrock, from August through October at the outlet shaft and November through December at the inlet shaft. Community informational meetings will be held before blasting occurs; explosives will be used once per day during weekday, daytime hours, approximately every other day; properties within 500 feet will be surveyed and monitored for impacts from vibrations.

May 2018: Project completion and demobilization of construction sites; River Park will re-open with new ball fields in place.

Improvements at Eugene Field Park at the western end of the tunnel include landscaping, new trees, a new walkway, benches and a water fountain.

River Park, at the east end of the project, will be significantly improved. The City is building a new regulation size baseball field and diamond, complete with backstop fence, batter cage, and also a soccer field. There will also be landscaping and trees planted at River Park.

Crawford Avenue Construction

Beginning June 1, the Village will begin construction of a new water main on Crawford Avenue from Oakton to Dempster Streets. The project is expected to be completed by early November 2016.

The first week of June will involve preparation stages for construction; placement of traffic control signage, sawcutting pavement, mobilization of equipment and materials. The second week of June we anticipate the water main installation will begin.

During construction, traffic on Crawford Avenue will be detoured around the construction zone. Northbound Crawford Avenue 'Thru Traffic' will be detoured east on Oakton Street to McCormick Boulevard, then north to Church Street and then west returning to Crawford Avenue. Southbound Crawford Avenue 'Thru Traffic' will be detoured west on Dempster Street to Skokie Boulevard, then south to Oakton Street and then east returning to Crawford Avenue.

'Local Traffic' on Crawford Avenue will be permitted in both directions except on blocks where construction activities prevent safe movement of vehicles. 'Local Traffic' does not include buses or trucks.

The scope of construction includes work in the intersections of Crawford Avenue at Oakton, Main and Dempster Streets. Traffic delays are expected when intersection work is being completed. The Village anticipates four to five days will be needed to complete work at each intersection.

Statement From Mayor Emanuel On FDA Regulation Of E-Cigarettes

"I applaud the FDA for following Chicago's lead and taking these dangerous, addictive products out of the hands of young people. I called on the FDA to take this action in 2013, and today I'm hopeful this step will lead to reduced tobacco use among youth around the nation just as we have seen happen here in Chicago."

Background: Since taking office, Mayor Emanuel has worked closely with the City Council and the Chicago Department of Public Health to pass a series of reforms aimed at curbing youth tobacco use in Chicago, including raising the purchasing age to 21, banning the sale of menthol products near schools, instituting local regulation of electronic cigarettes and taxing other tobacco products. In 2013, the Mayor called on the FDA to regulate electronic cigarettes and other tobacco products in the same manner as traditional cigarettes, understanding the dangers they pose to young people. Today, following these efforts and others, Chicago's youth smoking rates are at an all-time low.

Phone For Legal Advice At No Cost

Evanston Reminds Residents of Updated Lawn Irrigation Limits

On March 28, the Evanston City Council approved an ordinance updating the City's limits on lawn irrigation to ensure compliance with the new requirements of the Illinois Department of Natural Resources.

Under the ordinance, from May 15 through September 15, lawn irrigation with water supplied from the City's waterworks system is only permitted for odd-numbered addresses on odd-numbered dates and for even-numbered addresses on even-numbered dates. During this time period, no lawn irrigation is permitted between the hours of 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. on any day of the week at any address.

The new ordinance applies only to lawn irrigation; garden watering is exempt from the limits. In addition, an exception to the

limits applies for lawns 90 days after new sod is laid or new lawn seed is sown. Lawn irrigation from September 16 through May 14 is not subject to the limits.

To assist with lawn irrigation, residents are encouraged to participate in the City's free Residential Rain Barrel Program, in partnership with the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District (MWRD). Single-family homeowners and property owners and administrators of multi-family residential properties are eligible to receive up to four free, 55-gallon rain barrels through the program. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE TO THE FLAG

"I Pledge Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands, one Nation under God, Indivisible, with Liberty and Justice for All"

The Pledge of Allegiance received official recognition by Congress in an Act approved on June 22, 1942. However, the pledge was first published in 1892 in the Youth's Companion magazine in Boston, Massachusetts to celebrate the 400th anniversary of the discovery of America, and was first used in public schools to celebrate Columbus Day on October 12, 1892.

In its original version, the pledge read "my flag" instead of "the flag of the United States." The change in the wording was adopted by the National Flag Conference in 1923. The rationale for the change was that it prevented ambiguity among foreign-born children and adults who might have the flag of their native land in mind when reciting the pledge.

The phrase "under God" was added to the pledge by a Congressional Act approved on June 14, 1954. At that time, President Eisenhower said: "in this way we are reaffirming the transcendence of religious faith in America's heritage and future; in this way we shall constantly strengthen those spiritual weapons which forever will be our Country's most powerful resource in peace and war."

How to Fly the United States Flag

(From literature by the VFW National Veterans and Military Services)

- 1. The flag should be hoisted briskly and lowered ceremoniously.
- 2. The flag is never allowed to touch the ground or the floor.
- 3. When hung over a sidewalk on a rope extending from a building to a pole, the union stars are always away from the building.
- 4. When vertically hung over the center of the street, the flag always has the union stars to the north in an east/west street, and to theeast in a north/south street.
- 5. The flag of the United States of America should be at the center and at the highest point of the group when a number of flags of states or localities or pennants of societies are grouped and displayed from staffs.
- 6. The flag should never be festooned, drawn back, nor up, in folds but always allowed to fall free.
- 7. The flag should be displayed at half-staff until noon on Memorial Day then raised to the top of the staff.
- 8. Never fly the flag upside down except as a signal of distress in instances of extreme danger to life or property.
- 9. The flag is never flown in inclement weather except when using an all-weather flag.
- 10. The flag can be flown every day from sunrise to sunset and at night if illuminated properly.

I therefore believe it is my duty to my country to love it, to support its constitution, to obey its laws, to respect its flag, and to defend it against all enemies. (Authorized Version)


The Creed was written in 1918 by William Tyler Page of Friendship Heights, Maryland in the course of a nation wide contest on the subject. Page was a descendent of President Tyler, and Representative John Page, who served in the Congress from 1789-97. William Tyler Page began his government career as a Congressional page in December of 1881. In 1919 he was elected Clerk of the House of Representatives, and held that position until December of 1931. A new post, Emeritus Minority Clerk, was then created for him which he occupied until his death on October 20, 1942.

Mayor Emanuel Announces 2016 Riverwalk Vendor Lineup

Concessions Include Thirteen Entertainment, Beverage And Food Vendors, Including First-Ever Mobile Food Cart

Following the success of the Riverwalk's inaugural 2015 season, Mayor Rahm Emanuel announced an exciting new concession lineup for the 2016 season, featuring returning favorites as well as new additions.

"By investing in neighborhood assets like the Riverwalk, four new boathouses, a pedestrian bridge in Albany Park and a new rails to trails project in Pilsen and Little Village, we are building on Daniel Burnham's vision and are remaking the Chicago River into a multiuse resource for the City and its residents while promoting economic growth," said Mayor Emanuel. "Whether for recreation, entertainment or the pure pleasure of sitting outside and enjoying the waterfront, the Riverwalk is opening up more of the City for residents and visitors to enjoy."

Last summer, huge crowds visited the Riverwalk and vendors were also successful. On high volume days, some Riverwalk restaurants reported 45 minute waits for tables and many of the paddling excursions and bike tours were sold to capacity. Gross revenue generated by Riverwalk vendors was more than \$4.5 million in 2015, nearly four times the gross revenue generated by Riverwalk vendors in 2014, before Phase 2 of the Riverwalk was completed. As a direct result of the positive reaction by Chicago's residents and visitors throughout the summer, the City received a large number of highly competitive proposals for the 2016 season.

Returning vendors include Urban Kayaks; Island Party Hut; Wheel Fun Rentals; Cyrano's Café and Wine Bar; Chicago's First Lady Cruises and Mercury, Chicago's Skyline Cruiseline; O'Brien's Riverwalk Café; City Winery; Downtown Docks; and Chicago Water Taxi. New vendors include Tiny Hatt, Lillies and Dulce in Horto, the Riverwalk's first ever mobile food cart.

Much of the Riverwalk is complete; Phase 3, the City's final phase of construction, will extend the Riverwalk from the west side of LaSalle Street to the north side of Lake Street and will be open by the fall of 2016. The completed portion between LaSalle and Lake Shore Drive will have a wide variety of food, beverage and recreational opportunities to enjoy a natural amenity surrounded by an urban canyon of great architecture.

Construction of Phase 2 and 3 of the Riverwalk was funded by a low interest loan from the federal Transportation Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act (TIFIA) program; revenues generated from concessions and tour boats are pledged toward repayment of that



Chicago Park District Continues to Limit Use of Pesticides in Parks

Each spring, park patrons may see dandelions growing in their neighborhood parks throughout Chicago, signifying a chemical free park safe for play. For the seventh year, the Chicago Park District will partner with the Midwest Pesticide Action Center (MPAC) to limit its use of pesticides and offer park visitors safer and healthier parks.

In an effort to minimize impact on our environment, close to 90 percent of Chicago's parks avoid spraying weed control chemicals.

"The Park District strives to keep our Chicago parks a healthy place for everyone to enjoy," said Mike Kelly, Chicago Park District Superintendent and CEO. "We are encouraging all Chicago residents to follow the Park District's example and use more natural lawn care techniques that keeps your lawn safe and healthy."

The Chicago Park District mows turf grass to keep weeds down. Following natural lawn care basics, the Park District keeps the grass three inches high. This allows the roots to grow strong and access water deep in the ground. As a result, the taller grass naturally shades out some weeds. Even after cut, dandelion flowers persist and sometimes grow back overnight. However, the sight of dandelions indicates a safe space for all park patrons to play on.

"Midwest Pesticide Action Center is thrilled to include the Chicago Park District as part of our Midwest Grows Green network showing the district's commitment to limit the use of pesticides to create healthy places to play," says Ruth Kerzee, Executive Director of MPAC. "Follow these four simple and cost-effective tips, and you too can enjoy a beautiful yard safe for children, pets, and the environment."

Four Natural Lawn Care Tips

- Water Deeply and Infrequently: This encourages deep root growth. One inch per week is ideal. You can easily measure that amount by placing a cup in your yard while watering. When your sprinkler fills it one inch deep, your watering for the week is done. Water early in the morning to minimize disease problems.
- Mow High: Keep you lawn mowed at three inches or higher. This will increase the root strength and naturally shade out weeds. Don't mow your lawn unless needed. This creates healthy grass that can withstand drought and stay green longer.
- Use Organic Fertilizer: Commercial fertilizers easily wash away, polluting nearby lakes and streams. Many contain toxic weed killers. Choose an organic fertilizer to capture and deliver nutrients in the lawn throughout the growing season. Keep grass clippings on the lawn as they are an excellent natural fertilizer.
- Weed Naturally: Proper lawn care maintenance naturally eliminates most weeds. Annual reseeding gives grass an advantage over weeds. Avoid using pesticides, as they can harm other beneficial living things such as bees, birds, and fish. The right tool makes quick work of weeding. After pulling weeds, use grass seed and soil to fill in the hole. Your lawn will be strong and healthy as a result.




