



Rosh Hashanah Message

Dear friends

I am writing this as we commemorate fifteen years since the terrible events of 9/11, when 2,977 innocent men, women, and children lost their lives at the hands of brutal terrorists. That day was a wakeup call, telling us that the world was not as safe as we had thought it to be. Terror was not limited to the Middle East, and no person on the planet is truly secure.

I remember the Rosh Hashanah services just a week later. I was officiating at the only synagogue in Namibia, Africa. People who had not been to synagogue in years, came that year. They were there to connect, to give thanks, and to be inspired. The tragedy had touched them deeply, and they felt a need to become better, more spiritual, inspired, giving, community-minded people.

We need not wait for tragedy to strike. There are so many ways in which we can improve ourselves and the world around us. Here are some ideas:

- Say hello. It sounds simple, but it can make all the difference. Pay attention to the folks you pass in the hallway, in the line at the coffee shop, and in the mall.
- Say thank you. This is a biggie. Whether it is working hard at the office, cooking and cleaning, or even being a constant listening ear, our family members are our biggest assets. Let's make sure to treat them as such. Recognize the kindness they give us and verbalize our appreciation.
- On the subject of appreciation, let us not forget that our very lives are a gift from God. Let's express our thanks to him. No need to get fancy. Just picture yourself standing before the Maker of Heaven and Earth, and say how much you appreciate the gift of life.
- Now do something. Words and feelings are nice, but action is what really counts. We can
 each contribute in different ways. Some of us can volunteer our time, others can give in
 other ways. Pick a charitable cause close to your heart, and make it your own.

It is my hope and prayer that this coming year (5777 since the creation of the world) bring with it peace, contentment, harmony, spiritual enlightenment, and prosperity for all the inhabitants of earth.

Volunteers Needed To Help Maot Chitim Deliver Food To Needy For Jewish New Year

Between 400 and 500 volunteers will be needed Sunday, September 25 to deliver more than 300,000 pounds of food to Jewish needy as Maot Chitim, the Jewish charity that fights hunger, prepares to feed 15,000 people for the upcoming High Holidays of Rosh Hashana, the Jewish New Year.

Deliveries will start at 9:00 a.m. and conclude at 11:00 a.m.

"Volunteers also will come to a warehouse at 8260 N. Austin in Morton Grove a week earlier, Sunday, September 18 and work in shifts from 9:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. packing boxes of food for the needy in our community," says Joellyn Oliff, Executive Director of Maot Chitim. "What we call 'needy' can include Holocaust survivors and other senior citizens as well as college students and many in-between."

These boxes of food will be delivered a week later, Sunday, Sept. 25, to more than 5,000 individual homes as well as to college Hillels, the Ark, Operation Ezra, food pantries, shelters and other funds. Each box will contain kosher chicken, challah, apples, carrots, wine, honey, cake, tea and candles - all the necessities for preparing a holiday meal.

"We believe we are delivering Jewish continuity," Oliff continues. "Because of us, many indigent community members will be able to have a traditional kosher holiday meal."

The Hebrew words "maot chitim" come from the Torah and refers to the centuries old custom of leaving the corners of one's field unharvested - so the poor can gather wheat to provides themselves with sustenance.

Maot Chitim in Chicago is more than 100 years old. Originally, Rabbis set up tables in front of their synagogues and gave money to those in need so they could provide themselves with meals for Passover.

In 1997, Rosh Hashanah, was added.

"Today, we buy 45,000 pounds of kosher chicken, 12,000 dozen eggs and more than 10,000 challahs as well as everything else with money that we get from nearly 5,000 private donors," Oliff says. "Some donations are as small as \$5 and others give more than \$1,000. We also receive a generous grant from the Bank of Highland Park for the Rosh Hashana holiday.

The volunteers come from all over the community, Oliff points out.

"Teens come from youth groups, and others come from clubs, and private agencies. Of course, we have volunteers from synagogues all over the Chicagoland area," she says.

The boxes will be picked up and delivered by volunteers and families with children who will be teaching their kids the value of giving "tzedakah" or charity.

"We are delighted to say that we have second and third generations of families who continue to deliver packages to the Jewish people who need help. This is an opportunity for people to actually see the persons they are helping," Oliff adds.

Oliff concludes by saying, "We help bring community members together from all aspects of Jewish life. No matter what your priorities, the goal is to help those in need celebrate the holiday. Our one purpose is to help others."

Integrated Technology = **Increased Student Engagement**

Resurrection Champions Active Learning

At Resurrection, technology is integrated into learning experiences throughout the curriculum. It can be seen in the classroom from mathematics and sciences, to fine arts and religious studies.

Students at Resurrection use Chromebooks to work on and share documents, access cloud-based apps, and create websites and films. In classrooms and labs they create code, make robots, utilize CAD design, learn graphic design, experiment with Google cardboard and 3D printers, explore virtual reality and create their own apps and multimedia projects such as film creation and podcasting.

Language teachers use interactive tools, religious studies teachers use various apps, English teachers use collaborative documents and technology is embedded into the way that students learn.

During the 2015-16 school year, the Resurrection High Voltage Bandits robotics team took 3rd place in their alliance in the Chicago league robotics championship. In their inaugural year, they finished the season in 5th place out of 18 teams.

At Resurrection, the integrated use of technology has led to greater student engagement. Science Department Chair Dawn Konow is proud of the integration of technology to enhance student learning. "At Resurrection, we have been a champion of girls in science and technology before it was a recognized curriculum approach," said Konow. "Through our Physics First program and the offering of AP science courses, we challenge our students. Now that all Resurrection students are participating in the one-to-one technology initiative, the school's use of technology provides a platform for ever-increasing levels of critical thinking, analysis and problem solving on a daily basis."

Resurrection Educational Technologist Joe Lascon shares the school's approach to technology by saying, "As we continue to help our students evolve into 21st century learners, we have worked toward cultivating an environment and curriculum that promotes moving students from consumers of information to creative producers and owners of knowledge." Resurrection is committed to students' active participation in the learning experience by engaging students in collaborative learning in the classroom, clubs, computer labs, and creative spaces.





Academic Excellence

Resurrection boasts a 100% college acceptance rate and students go on to excel at colleges and universities across the nation. The Class of 2016 included fourteen Illinois State Scholars and graduates were awarded over \$11.3 million in scholarships from various colleges, universities and foundations.

The curriculum at Resurrection is designed to challenge the college-bound student, encourage students to explore new areas of interest and move beyond their comfort zone. Mother Celine Scholars Program





More on How to Handle an Inheritance



In the last issue of Our Village a number of "Dos and Don'ts" were discussed for individuals who are recent heirs. Let's recap these and then go into some other special considerations:

Do understand the nature of your gift- is it cash, real property, personal property, benefits from an IRA, or disbursements from

Don't go it alone—seek qualified professional help.

Plan ahead and don't spend any money before making a plan. Do put away money for a rainy day.

Don't listen to those who steer you toward risky investments. Do invest in your future.

Do allow a "splurge", but don't go overboard.

Now let's take a look at an inheritance that is an IRA. If you should inherit an IRA, and you must take only the "required minimum distributions" or the very minimum amount you are required to take out annually under the Internal Revenue Code, the money you inherited can continue to grow tax-deferred for

as long as possible. By taking the minimum, you would barely empty the IRA by the time you reached your life expectancy. You also need to check the beneficiary designations on the account. If they remain the same, the benefits from the IRA will continue to go to the contingent beneficiaries in the event of your death. On the other hand, you also have the option to fill out a new beneficiary designation if you prefer to have the remaining IRA benefits go to different beneficiaries when you are gone.

If you've followed these suggestions, you should be well on your way to handling the inheritance you've received from another individual's estate plan. But what about your estate plan? How will this inheritance impact your own estate plan? Does the inheritance make a major impact on your net worth?

You really need to consider how your inheritance will affect your own estate plan and then make provisions to include your new found inheritance into your existing estate plan. Because of your inherited wealth, do you need to change any specific bequests in your estate plan? Alternatively, do you need to add gifts to additional beneficiaries and/or change the percentage you leave to existing beneficiaries? Is there a charity that you would like to have share in your new wealth? Let's say your estate was valued at \$200.000 before the inheritance and the inheritance added \$400,000 to your estate—what is going to happen to the additional \$400,000 if something should happen to you in the near future? GERMAN POTATO SALAD WITH BACON

The following recipe is from Alexander in Germany, who in turn has it from his mother. It came to Lincoln Square in Chicago via Rocky at Leland Liquors. He and Alexander are good friends. Alexander writes, "We have more than one authentic German Potato Salad (Kartoffelsalat) recipe. It is a traditional food, but some say that the traditional German Potato Salad should be made with mayonnaise, and others say with vinaigrette. People in Northern Germany prefer the mayonnaise variation, while the ones in the South like to use vinaigrette.

Ingredients

- 10 medium sized potatoes, cooked; 1 or 2-3 tbsp. sunflower oil 2 onions, diced:
- 6 pickled gherkins, sliced
- 2 tbsp. white wine vinegar

and pour over the potatoes.

- 2 tbsp.mustard
- 1 tbsp. liquid from the picked gherkins

• 1 tbsp. cold water;

• several slices of bacon, and salt and coarsely ground pepper to taste.

Don't use too much salt as you can always add more.

Peel the cooked potatoes and slice them into a bowl. Fry the bacon, place on paper towel to drain excess fat, then cut up into small pieces. Pour bacon grease out of

Lastly mix in the bacon bits. Let the salad rest for at least 20 minutes and put into a nice serving bowl. You can modify this recipe to suit your taste. Ingredients that harmonize with this recipe are hard boiled eggs and diced ham.

Fall Beautiful Fall - Time To Prepare For Winter

The chill of the first cool nights of fall serves as a warning that the growing season is coming to an end. By all means, enjoy your flowers for as long as the weather permits. We can even stubbornly try to protect and cover animals from the onset of cooler temperatures. However, hard frosts will eventually take their toll. At this time I strongly urge gardeners to clean up all dead flowers and vegetable plants. This is the first step towards having a great garden next year.

Then I would suggest adding a two to three inch layer of an organic material to the soil. If you have a compost pile, this would be a good time to work in this material.

Another option is to work the leaves from your yard into the soil. Adding these materials will have several benefits. First, the organic matter will have a chance to further decompose during the long, wet fall and winter. As the organic material naturally breaks down, this will add nutrients to the soil for next years plants.

Second, really digging and working up the soil in the fall aerates and loosens it and prevents the ground from becoming too hard. This is very important because a loose soil allows plants to develop healthy roots systems.

None of this work is very glamourous, however conditioning and preparing soil is one of the most important keys to having success as a gardener. Next spring your flower and vegetable plants will benefit from growing in a nutrient rich, loose soil.

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
