

Sessions are part of the hospital's cardiopulmonary rehabilitation program. A cardiac stress test, lipid profile, risk factor analysis and diet counseling may be required to participate. The Diabetes Support Group will meet Tuesday, June 2, from 6:30 p.m. to 8 p.m., in the second floor Community Education Room. These free sessions are tailored for adults who have Type 2 diabetes and focus on the emotional side of diabetes, allowing participants to share coping strategies, feelings and problems in living with diabetes. Free parking is available in the hospital's parking facility on Addison Street.









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


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Wright Swimmers **Perform for Olympic Committee**

Seven members of the Wright College synchronized swimming team, The SeaStars, played a role in Chicago's bid for the 2016 Olympics by performing in the newly renovated Shedd Aquarium Oceanarium pool.

At the invitation of the Chicago 2016 Bid Committee, the swimmers presented two short programs for the International Olympic Committee during the its April tour to decide whether to award the Olympic games to Chicago.

The committee was very impressed, applauding resoundingly after each performance, said SeaStars Coach Cathy Goodwin. The swimmers had a great time to swimming among the rocks and waving to people at the underwater viewing windows. "How many people get the opportunity to do that?" Goodwin added.

The seven swimmers were Amy Goodwin, of Chicago's Sauganash neighborhood, Vera Iwankiw, of Chicago's Norwood Park neighborhood, Liz Kegg, of Downtown Chicago, Lisa Merlin, of Des Plaines, Marci Mies, of Skokie, Agnes Otap, of Chicago's Portage Park neighborhood, and Tess Snyder, of Lincolnwood.

The SeaStars were particularly honored to be presenting this program for the IOC because of the Wright's history as the birthplace of synchronized swimming. A faculty member at the time and originator of the sport, Kay Curtis, and her students wrote the first set of rules for competition. The first recorded competition was held in 1940 in the Chicago area between Wright College and Chicago Teachers College. Wright College's co-ed team won that competition.

One of the compositions presented in the program for the IOC featured original choreography by Curtis' "Modern Mermaids" at the 1934 Century of Progress world's fair. The second composition, choreographed especially for the event, showcased the high-energy precision swimming skills of the SeaStars.

The SeaStars enjoyed their once-in-a-lifetime swim in the new Oceanarium and gave it a "thumbs up" for the soon-to-be returning aquatic life at the scheduled re-opening of the attraction in May 2009.

Remembering Memorial Day

Ten-year-old Jenna George has no idea why Americans celebrate Memorial Day. She admits she does not know what the holiday signifies and has never learned its meaning in school. Her sister Sophia, 8, is just as clueless about this quintessential American holi-

sister Sophia, 8, is just as clueless about this quintessential American holiday. The sisters could not even fathom a guess as to the holiday's meaning. But both know they have the day off of school, something they made sure not to complain about.

Whether this is a growing trend, or just the case of these two children who attend school in Skokie, is unclear. But what is apparent, is that traditional observance of Memorial Day continues to falter year after year, and various long-standing customs are no longer being practiced.

Perhaps more disturbing is that the meaning of Memorial Day is becoming lost among younger generations. Memorial Day is quickly becoming just another day off of work and a marker for the beginning of summer.

But as Americans continue to fight overseas, defending our freedom and sacrificing their lives to protect it, Memorial Day is just as relevant and important now as ever.

So, this Memorial Day take some time to learn the true meaning behind the holiday, and share it with your family.

Even if you don't commemorate the day in the traditional sense, bear in mind that Memorial Day is a day of remembrance for those who have died in our nation's service.

Originally called Decoration Day, Memorial Day was officially proclaimed as such on May 5, 1868 by General John Logan, the national commander of the Grand Army of the Republic. The holiday was first observed on May 30, 1868, when flowers were placed on the graves of Civil War soldiers at Arlington National Cemetery in Virginia.

However, the South did not observe Decoration Day, preferring to honor their dead on separate days until after World War I. In 1882, the holiday's name was changed to Memorial Day, and soldiers who had died in other wars were also honored.

In 1966, under the leadership of President Lyndon Johnson, the federal government declared Waterloo, N.Y. to be the official birthplace of Memorial Day. Waterloo was chosen because it had first celebrated the holiday in 1866, and residents made the day an annual, community-wide event during which businesses closed and residents decorated the graves of soldiers with flags and flowers. However, it is difficult to prove conclusively the origins of the federal holiday.

Memorial Day is now celebrated in almost every state on the last Monday in May, and was declared as such in 1971, to ensure a three-day weekend.

Memorial Day can still be celebrated at Arlington National Cemetery, in which a ceremony occurs and a small American flag is placed on each grave. It is also customary for the president or vice-president to give a speech honoring the contributions of the dead and lay a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier.

In 2000, the National Moment of Remembrance" resolution was passed to help re-inform and remind Americans of the true meaning of Memorial Day. The resolution asks that at 3 p.m. local time, for all Americans "To voluntarily and informally observe in their own way a Moment of remembrance and respect, pausing from whatever they are doing for a moment of silence or listening to 'Taps."

Although moments of silence are customary on Memorial Day, conversely, parades have also remained as a common occurrence to celebrate the holiday. Below you will find several Chicago area-parades that you and your family can attend to honor Memorial Day.

SHERIFF REMINDS RESIDENTS TO BE CAUTIOUS WHEN VISITING CEMETERIES

As the warmer weather and Mothers' Day approaches, Cook County Sheriff Thomas J. Dart reminds residents to be alert when visiting the grave site of a loved one.

In the past few weeks, Sheriff's Police have investigated reports of thefts from vehicles at a local cemetery. These crimes occurred while the victims were away from their vehicles paying their respects.

"At no time has violence or the threat of violence been used in any of the reported incidents," Dart said. "Anyone visiting a cemetery needs to take a few common sense precautions to avoid being the victim of a theft."

Dart recommends that cemetery visitors follow these guidelines:

Lock all car doors and do not leave any valuables in plain view inside your vehicle

Lock purses, bags and any other valuables in the trunk while visiting a grave site

Do not make yourself a target by carrying your purse or bag to the grave site

If possible, avoid visiting the cemetery alone

Note your surroundings before exiting your vehicle. Report any suspicious vehicles or activity to the cemetery attendant or police

PRESBYTERIAN HOMES BRINGS AFFORDABLE HOUSING FOR OLDER ADULTS TO WEST ROGERS PARK

Presbyterian Homes, a nonsectarian provider of retirement living in Evanston, IL, will offer 33 units of affordable housing for older adults in a newly renovated, four-story brick apartment building at 1950 W. Devon Ave (Devon & Ridge). The West Rogers Park building is the latest addition to the organization's Neighborhood Homes program. Occupancy is scheduled for July 2009.

Residents must be 65 years old with income not to exceed \$42,200 a year for a single individual or \$48,250 for two persons (in 2008). Rents are determined on a sliding scale based on 28 percent of adjusted income. Older adults who are interested in residency should contact Donna Musgrave, director of the Neighborhood Homes, at 773-477-4160, regarding applications.

The building offers studio, one and two-bedroom units of up to 885 sq. ft. Other features include reserved parking, sprinklers, smoke detectors and telephone security intercom systems. The units are air-conditioned, have baseboard hot-water heat and are pre-wired for cable television. Each unit has a new full-size kitchen and bath and in-unit laundry hook-ups.

Residents must be independent and able to do their own shopping, cooking and cleaning. The Neighborhood Homes director and a social worker will assist residents in locating social service agencies when needed.

The Neighborhood Homes program has two other apartment buildings in Chicago's Lakeview neighborhood. The program helps older adults with limited financial means to remain in their neighborhoods where gentrification has reduced the availability of affordable housing. The Geneva Foundation, the charitable arm of Presbyterian Homes, funds the Neighborhood Homes. Donations to the foundation provided the means to purchase and renovate the building.

Resident Meta Toerber of the Neighborhood Homes' Lake View Place at 416 W. Barry in Chicago says, "Lake View Place is a gift from heaven. We have weekly computer classes, low-impact exercise classes, and bus service to the grocery store. There is a 24-hour maintenance man and we have a wonderful sense of community, but you still have your privacy. For me, the personal interest Presbyterian Homes takes in you is worth a billion dollars."

Ned Russells, another Lake View Place resident added, "Presbyterian Homes has made my life totally different. I've been here 14 years, and they have enabled me to live with dignity in a building that is safe and well-maintained and in the community where I have lived a great many years."



Walk and Roll to School Day Grant Applications Now Open

Schools are invited to apply for funding to promote Walk and Roll to School Day Oct. 7. Walk and Roll to School is part of International Walk to School Day and celebrates children getting to school in safe and active ways.

Each October, millions of children, parents, teachers and community leaders across the globe walk, bicycle, skate, scooter or roll to school to celebrate Walk to School Day. It is an energizing event, reminding parents and children alike of the simple joy of walking and rolling to school.

In the United States today, 18 percent of kids walk or bike to school, versus 49 percent in 1969, according to the most recent CDC data (2001).

Grant packages include \$500 in cash and a variety of promotional materials and refreshment items. Only individual schools can apply. All public and private schools in Cook, DuPage, Will, Lake, Kane, Kendall and McHenry counties are eligible.

Previous grant winners have staged Walk and Roll to School events, including rallies and breakfasts. Some have used the grant for incentives that encourage students to walk, bike and roll to school year-round.

Fawn Facts

Those of us fortunate to live near our region's last urban forests may happen upon white-tailed deer. Most fawns are born between the middle of May and the end of June. Here are a few "fawn facts" to help you get to know them even better.

The gestation period for white-tailed deer is approximately seven months. Does usually give birth to one to three fawns at a time.

Fawns can stand just 20 minutes after birth, can walk haltingly in an hour, and can outrun a human in just five days!

A doe may nurse her fawn three to four times a day. Deer milk is very rich, with a fat content of around 12% (compared to 4% in whole milk from cows we humans drink).

For safety, a doe will hide her fawns separately from one another. Mother deer may venture as far as a half-mile away (still within hearing distance) of her offspring. If you find a fawn on its own, do not assume it is abandoned. Often, mother is nearby keeping tabs on her young.

The white spots on a fawn's fur helps camouflage it from predators. They lose their spots at around nine months of age.

Yearlings are fawns that are a year old; at that point, they may mate and have fawns of their own.

Diamond Frost is a Gardener's Best Friend





This year "Art" won the Tony Award for Best Play and "The Lion King" won for best musical at the Radio City Music Hall. I was fortunate to be in attendance.

While the producers never sent a touring company to Chicago, the show had a long run at the Royal George Theatre. First with Michael Gross from "Family Ties" heading the cast and later replacing him was Kevin Dobson from the television show "Kojak."

The show deals with three middle age Frenchmen: Serge played by John Procaccino, Marc who is played by Francis Guinan and Yvon played by K. Todd Freeman. Serge is divorced, Marc is married, and Yvon is scheduled to be married.

"Art" is the work of Yasmina Reza and the show is translated by Christopher Hampton.

The show's director Rick Snyder is also an actor who has found a strong cast for the show. Later in the run Guinan will take over the role of Serge and Ian Barford and Joe Dempsey will handle the other roles.

It's a show you'll either like or hate and it definitely is a play for men especially if you're a feminist. The show has its humor but it does have a darker edge. There is tension between the three men and you'll find humor in their bitterness and confrontation.

De Leonardis, Sherlock Holmes: The Man Sir Arthur Conan Doyle Could Not Kill, from May 5 to May 30 in commemoration of the one hundred and fiftieth birthday of Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, born on May 22, 1859. 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

Recognizing Illness in Pet Birds

Watery droppings should be carefully evaluated to determine if they are due to gastrointestinal disturbance or increased urine production (polyuria). A somewhat formed fecal portion with an extremely watery urine portion or excessive urate portion may indicate a kidney problem or metabolic problem such as diabetes.

A more liquid consistency in the fecal portion of the droppings is suggestive of an intestinal tract infection. Occasionally, birds with an intestinal disturbance may have a grayish coating on the fecal portion due to excessive mucous. When a bird has pancreatic disease it has characteristic "popcorn" droppings which are bulky and off white to gray in color. Undigested seed or grit in the droppings are abnormal and could indicate a gizzard malfunction.

Blood in the fecal portion of the droppings is usually from the cloaca or oviduct. Severe inflammation in the cloaca, ulcerations or tumors may be responsible. Blood may also be seen in female birds encountering difficulty passing eggs. In Amazon parrots and macaws, blood in the droppings could be due to cloacal papillomas, which are of viral origin. Other signs of this condition include straining to defecate and the presence of granulation tissue (appears almost like a strawberry) around the vent and in the cloaca.

The urate portion (urine crystals) should be off white in color. If the urates are yellow or neon green it may serve to indicate hepatitis. The neon green urates may be suggestive of psittacosis. Blood in the urine or urates (to be distinguished from blood in the fecal portion) are indicative of a kidney disturbance or toxicoses, particularly heavy metal poisoning such as lead.

Unusual Growths/Enlargements

Birds can develop abscesses, feather cysts and tumors, so any unusual swellings should be properly evaluated. Fat deposits may develop on the chest and/or abdomen and should be considered abnormal. Other abdominal enlargements could indicate the presence of a tumor or an egg. Many times these growths are not detected until they are quite large. Early detection may be accomplished by noting irregular displacement of the feathers. Keep a close watch on your bird as the earlier these problems are treated the greater the success rate.

Conclusion

Develop a sense for what is normal with your bird, deviations from the norm could indicate disease. The more you handle and interact with your bird the greater will be your understanding of the bird as well as your ability to detect potential problems. If you observe any of these signs or have questions about the condition of your bird, do not hesitate to notify your veterinarian for aid. A sick bird that is treated promptly and properly has a much better chance of recovery. Yearly physical examinations including blood testing and fecal analysis are strongly recommended for all birds. New birds should be examined shortly after purchase so that their state of health can be properly evaluated. Early detection is the key.

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
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
