

Niles Township, Illinois to Launch New Prescription Drug Savings Program

In October, Niles Township and Financial Marketing Concepts Inc., (FMC) will launch a new prescription drug discount program at the Niles Township Administration Building, 5255 Main Street in Skokie.

Once launched, the new Coast2Coast Rx card will allow all township residents, regardless of income, age, or health status to participate in the program and save on the cost of their medications. This program has already saved cardholders an average of 45% in 2010 on the cost of prescription drugs. Even pets and family members living outside the township are able to take part in the program. The Rx card will be distributed free of charge and may be used at all pharmacy chains and most independent pharmacies in Niles Township and includes over 60,000 drugs.

"With healthcare costs on the rise, prescription drug discounts will help ease some of the financial burdens township families are facing at a time when they need it the most," said Township Supervisor Lee Tamraz. There are no eligibility requirements, so the Rx card is expected to have a sizeable impact on uninsured residents, residents facing high insurance deductibles and will allow savings for persons in need of prescriptions not covered by their current plans.

Providing savings for residents through the Rx program will come at no expense to the Township. Besides the discounts on prescriptions, the card also provides 50% to 80% discounts for lab and imaging tests, further helping residents save even more money on their healthcare costs for these services.

Edward Rahn, President of Financial Marketing Concepts, Inc., of Ponte Vedra Beach, Florida, the issuer of the Coast2Coast Rx free discount card, says "We are pleased to work with Niles Township to help individuals, their families and pets combat the rising cost of healthcare." Rahn added "We appreciate all that the Township and local pharmacies are doing to help those in need."

The Coast2Coast Rx card will be available for residents at most participating pharmacies, governmental offices, libraries and Township health facilities. Residents will also be able to print the Rx card, check their prescription prices and view the nearest participating locations at www.coast2coastrx.com. At the website, click on the Print Free Card menu button and on the drop down list, click on township to get to the page to print the Niles Township Card.

Construction Begins for the Yellow Line Oakton Street Station

Construction began this week on the CTA Yellow Line Oakton Street Station in Downtown Skokie. Construction of the "Kiss 'n Ride" facility is expected to be complete in late fall 2011, and the Chicago Transit Authority estimates some 1,200 boardings will occur at the stop each day.

The station will cost approximately \$20 million to construct, with the Village of Skokie funding \$6 million and an additional \$14 million coming from federal funds. The new station is adjacent to the Illinois Science + Technology Park (IS+TP) in Downtown Skokie. The new station is anticipated to increase the attractiveness of the IS+TP by directly connecting Downtown Skokie and Chicago.

"I am grateful to officials from CTA, the Illinois Department of Transportation, the Federal Highway Administration, Skokie's state and federal legislators, Commonwealth Edison, The Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning, Forest City Enterprises and, of course, the Village staff who persevered with this project for many years," said Skokie Mayor George Van Dusen. "Their collective vision, hard work and dedication to this important public transportation initiative will benefit the region for decades to come."

Evanston Ecology Center Accepting Holiday Lights for Recycling

Holiday lights can be dropped off for recycling at the Evanston Ecology Center, 2024 McCormick Blvd., and Evanston's Main Library, 1703 Orrington Avenue.

The Holiday Light Recycling Program is offered by Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County (SWANCC) and its member communities. All holiday string lighting and extension cords can be dropped off, but garlands, live greens and wreaths are not accepted in this free program.

At the Ecology Center, lights can be dropped off Monday through Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., and Saturday, 9:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. effective immediately through January 31. They also may be dropped off after-hours as long as they are contained in a paper or tied plastic bag.

The drop-off at the Main Library is available December 1 through January 31. Hours are Monday through Thursday, 10:00 am to 9:00 p.m.; Friday and Saturday, 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.; and Sunday, 12:00 to 6:00 p.m.



Two Honored for Decade of Board **Service at The Youth Campus**

Two area residents, Patricia Conard, MD, of Glenview, and Fred Duda of Park Ridge, were recently honored for their longtime volunteer service as members of The Youth Campus board of directors.

The Park Ridge based non-for-profit organization, which serves abused and neglected children, presented each former board member with a commemorative gift to acknowledge their many contributions.

Dr. Conard, a pediatrician, joined The Youth Campus board in 2000 and served for nearly 10 years. She continues volunteering as a member of the organization's Services Committee, providing expert medical guidance.

Duda, an investment advisor with Christian Brothers Investment Services, was appointed to The Youth Campus board in 1999. Over the past 11 years he has served on various committees and held the offices of Board Chairman and, most recently, Board Secretary. Duda and his wife, Sheila, also co-own Tea Lula, a Park Ridge tea shop.

The Youth Campus, a nonreligious charitable organization, brings help and hope to more than 270 abused and neglected children annually. The historic 100-year-old Park Ridge center provides Residential Treatment for teenage girls who have suffered years of difficulties, giving them a chance to turn their lives around. Through its Chicago office, The Youth Campus also recruits and trains foster parents who provide substitute care for boys and girls of all ages. A third program, Caregiver Support, helps prevent child neglect by providing in-home nursing and other services for families with medically challenged children.

Chicago Winter Parking Ban Now In Effect, 3AM to 7AM, Until April 1, 2011

Chicago's Winter Overnight Parking Ban for 107 miles of the city's most critical arterial streets resumed December 1 at 3AM. This seasonal ban in effect every year between December 1st and April 1st. and between the hours of 3 a.m. to 7 a.m. Yet in spite of permanent signage with posted calendar dates along the impacted streets, two related press conferences and heavy media coverage for the past two weeks warning of the resumption of the ban and the leafleting last weekend of vehicles parked along the ban route, some 215 vehicles still parked in violation of this seasonal ban and were ticketed, towed and impounded.

When motorists violate this ban and leave their cars parked on these routes they prevent the street from getting fully plowed and salted when it snows. This reduces the streets capacity during a storm to handle critical traffic. As heavy snow falls it gets pushed against these vehicles by passing plows causing a buildup that further restricts the street lanes. "These regulations are designed to keep our most critical routes up and running at all times so that emergency vehicles, buses and other vehicles can get to where they need to go," noted Streets & Sanitation Commissioner Thomas G. Byrne.

The permanent signage that marks the 107 miles of the Winter Overnight Parking Ban is often posted next to signs for the 2-inch snow parking ban which can be activated along 500 miles of arterial streets. Both posted restrictions mark Chicago's "Snow Route System," which was created as a result of response to massive snow storms, including the Great Blizzard of '67, which halted traffic citywide."

Ignoring the Winter Overnight Parking Ban can result in a \$150 towing fee (minimum), a \$50 ticket and a daily storage fee of \$10 that increases over time.

The other pertinent ban that can be activated during a heavy snow at any time of the year is the 2" Inch Snow Ban. This restriction is technically in effect all year round, but realistically only a factor in the winter months. The 2" Inch Snow Ban is not activated often, but motorists that violate it when it is active face ticketing and relocation to a nearby site. Motorists need to watch for and obey both restrictions.

Severe winter storms can cause widespread damage and disruption. Heavy snow often results in paralyzed transportation systems, automobile accidents due to slippery roads, and stranded vehicles. Glazing from ice storms topples utility lines and poles and makes travel virtually impossible. These conditions can be a threat to life.

BEFORE A WINTER STORM OR EXTREME COLD

- * Know the terms related to winter storms and extreme cold.
- * Know the names of the counties in which you live, work and travel. County names are used to identify areas at risk.
- * Learn how to protect your family's health during the winter months:

Dress appropriately for the winter.

Learn the physical dangers to your body.

* Gather emergency supplies for work and home:

Create a Family Disaster Kit. Be prepared for at least three days, if not more. Go to www.AlertChicago.com for details. A few important items are listed below:

A battery-powered NOAA Weather Radio.

A battery-powered commercial radio and extra batteries.

Foods that do not require cooking or refrigeration are best.

Extra medications and special items for babies, the disabled or elderly.

Extra water in clean containers.

Flashlights and extra batteries. Do not use candles.

A first-aid kit, non-prescription drugs and personal sanitary items.

* Winterize your home to extend the life of your fuel supply:

Insulate walls and attics.

Caulk and weatherize doors and windows.

Install storm windows or cover windows with plastic.

* Take steps to prevent frozen water pipes:

Locate and insulate pipes most susceptible to freezing.

Wrap pipes with heat tape (UL approved).

Seal any leaks that allow cold air inside where pipes are located.

Disconnect garden hoses.

$\ensuremath{^*}$ Prepare for possible isolation in your home for several days:

Have emergency heating equipment (fireplaces, wood burning stoves or space heaters) Always ensure proper ventilation to avoid carbon monoxide poisoning. NEVER use an outdoor grill to heat your home or to cook food indoors.

Keep fire extinguishers on hand, and know how to use them.

* Prepare your vehicle for the winter:

Winterize your vehicle or have your vehicle serviced by a mechanic.

Check your wipers, tires, lights, and fluid levels regularly. Make sure the brakes and transmission are working properly. Lubricate door and trunk locks.

Prepare a Winter Storm Survival Kit (Go Bag) and carry it in your vehicle.

Changes in Illinois Pedestrian Laws

As of July 22, 2010 Illinois law changed regarding motorist obligations to pedestrians in crosswalks. The new law states that all drivers must come to a complete stop for pedestrians in crosswalk, regardless of whether or not there are traffic signals or stop signs present at the crosswalk.

Changes in the law require motorists and bicyclists to stop for pedestrians in crosswalks to ensure a safe environment for all using the roadways and sidewalks. Previous law required motorist to yield for pedestrians and stop when necessary.

Under the new law, Illinois drivers must come to a complete stop for pedestrians in any crosswalk that is marked, unmarked, signaled and unsignaled.

A marked crosswalk has painted lines on the road that designate the location, such as the crosswalk at Oakton Street and Floral Avenue, by Village Hall. An unmarked crosswalk is present whenever a sidewalk leads into a street. A signaled crosswalk includes those at stop signs and traffic signals. An unsignalized crosswalk does not have a stop sign or traffic signal. They are also referred to as mid-block crosswalks.

This law requires bicyclists to stop for pedestrians as they are required to follow all rules of the road.

The Lakeview East Chamber of Commerce understands the negative impact Walmart will have for small business and neighbors are questioning the choice of location for this higher income residential community. "Studies show when a Walmart opens, commercial districts lose 25% of small businesses within the first year. Creating jobs comes with a price and the price to pay is loss of jobs and closures of small businesses. * The economic impact of Walmart will ultimately negatively affect the fabric of our community, says Maureen Martino, Executive Director of the Lakeview East Chamber of Commerce. We do not need a Walmart for groceries, the community was promised a full scale grocery store at 3030 N. Broadway planned development. It's been over five years of waiting for a grocery store and Walmart should not be a trade off."

Area residents, especially those who live in the immediate footprint of the proposed location are voicing their concerns to their local neighborhood organizations and city officials. Lakeview East resident Bruce Beal states "There are plenty of communities in Chicago where Walmart is needed and would be welcomed ...just not in ours."

The Chamber and residents have formed STOP THE LAKEVIEW/LINCOLN PARK WALMART Facebook page that will be one of the avenues through which the community will make it clear to Walmart and to the Aldermanic candidates of their fierce opposition.

Following are the top 10 online shopping tips for holiday shoppers to help fight deceitful online retailers, scammers and hackers during the season:

- 1. Protect your computer A computer should always have the most recent updates installed for spam filters, anti-virus and anti-spyware software and a secure fire-
- 2. Shop on trustworthy websites Shoppers should start with the BBB to check on the seller's reputation and record for customer satisfaction at www.bbb.org Always

look for the BBB seal and other widely-recognized "trustmarks" on retailer websites and click on the seals to confirm that they are valid.

- 3. Protect your personal information The BBB recommends taking the time to read the site's privacy policy and understand what personal information is being requested and how it will be used. If there isn't one posted, it should be taken as a red flag that personal information may be sold to others without permission.
- 4. Beware of deals that sound too good to be true Offers on websites and in unsolicited e-mails can often sound too good to be true, especially extremely low prices on hard-to-get items. Consumers should always go with their instincts and not be afraid to pass up a "deal" that might cost them dearly in the end, and look up the company at www.bbb.org
- 5. Beware of phishing Legitimate businesses do not send e-mails claiming problems with an order or an account to lure the "buyer" into revealing financial information. If a consumer receives such an e-mail, the BBB recommends picking up the phone and calling the contact number on the website where the purchase was made to confirm that there really is a problem with the transaction.
- 6. Confirm your online purchase is secure Shoppers should always look in the address box for the "s" in https:// and in the lower-right corner for the "lock" symbol before paying. If there are any doubts about a site, the BBB recommends rightclicking anywhere on the page and select "Properties." This will let you see the real URL (website address) and the dialog box will reveal if the site is not encrypted.
- 7. Pay with a credit card It's best to use a credit card, because under federal law, the shopper can dispute the charges if he or she doesn't receive the item. Shoppers also have dispute rights if there are unauthorized charges on their credit card, and many card issuers have "zero liability" policies under which the card holder pays nothing if someone steals the credit card number and uses it. Never wire money and
- 8. Keep documentation of your order After completing the online order process, there may be a final confirmation page or the shopper might receive confirmation by e-mail. The BBB recommends saving a copy of the Web page and any e-mails for future reference and as a record of the purchase.
- 9. Check your credit card statements often Don't wait for paper statements; the BBB recommends consumers check their credit card statements for suspicious activity by either calling credit card companies or by checking statements online.
- 10. Know your rights Federal law requires that orders made by mail, phone or online be shipped by the date promised or, if no delivery time was stated, within 30 days. If the goods aren't shipped on time, the shopper can cancel and demand a refund. There is no general three-day cancellation right, but consumers do have the right to reject merchandise if it's defective or was misrepresented. Otherwise, it's the company's policies that determine if the shopper can cancel the purchase and receive a refund or credit.

The Museum of Science and Industry's 69th annual Christmas Around the World and Holidays of Light opens on Nov. 18, 2010. Holiday Safety Tips Regarding Children and Food Safety

The holidays are an exciting time of year for children and families. To help ensure they have a safe holiday season, here are just a few tips from the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) and the Skokie Fire and Police Departments regarding toy, food and visiting safety:

Toy Safety

- · Select toys to suit the age, abilities, skills and interest level of the intended child. Toys too advanced may pose safety hazards for younger children.
- · Keep batteries and magnets away from young children and call your health care provider immediately if your child swallows one.
- · Children under age eight can choke or suffocate on uninflated or broken balloons. Remove strings and ribbons from toys before giving them to young children.
 - · Watch for pull toys with strings that are more than 12 inches in length.
- · Parents should store toys in a designated location, such as on a shelf or in a toy chest, and keep older kids' toys away from young children.

Food Safety

- $\cdot\,$ Wash your hands frequently, and make sure your children do the same.
- · Bacteria are often present in raw foods. Fully cook meats and poultry, and thoroughly wash raw vegetables and fruits.
- · Be sure to keep hot liquids and foods away from the edges of counters and tables, where they can be easily knocked over by a young child's exploring hands
- · Never put a spoon used to taste food back into food without washing it.
- · Always thaw meat in the refrigerator, never on the countertop.
- · Foods that require refrigeration should never be left at room temperature for more than two hours.

Happy Visiting

- · Remember that the homes you visit may not be childproofed. Keep an eye out for danger spots and clean up immediately after a holiday party.
- · Keep a list with all of the important phone numbers you or a baby-sitter are likely to need in case of an emergency. Include the police and fire department, your pediatrician and the national Poison Help Line, 1-800-222-1222.
- · Stick to your child's usual routines, including sleep schedules and timing of naps, can help you and your child enjoy the holidays and reduce stress.

Past jury member David McFadzean, (Executive producer/Co-Creator of "Home Improvement" and Executive producer of "What Women Want") said, "In the time limit they've been given, the production values are very impressive, everything from the editing to the set design, all of it."

Decisions, Decisions, Decisions . . .

When asked how people want their assets divided after they are gone, some people have definite opinions, while others are less certain. Not only do people differ in the level of their uncertainty concerning how to divvy up their assets, they even differ in what factors are important in making the decision.

In June 2007, *Money* magazine released a reader poll concerning various financial issues. The following percentages of respondents ranked each factor as very important:

Dividing the estate equally among your children: 69% How responsible each child is about money: 37% How helpful each child has been to you: 29% How close you are to each child: 22% How much money each child has: 22% How many children of their own each child has: 19% How much you like each child's spouse: 10% 37% said it can be reasonable to disinherit a child.

Another item of indecision for many people is the choice of decision makers: Trustee, Personal Representative, Guardian, and Agents under powers of attorney. For each of these positions, it is important to name people whose decision-making ability you trust. You may be tempted to name all your children or siblings to avoid hurting anyone's feelings. However, naming a large number of people to serve together in the same role invites family disharmony and chaos. For example, if property in the Trust is to be sold and you have seven Trustees, many of whom may be out of town, it would be a logistical nightmare to route paperwork all around the country. Typically, things work more smoothly if you limit the number of people in any given role. Besides, having a job thrust upon them may be something many would just as soon avoid.

Regardless of what factors are important to you, a qualified estate planning attorney can help you achieve your goals. For example, if you are concerned about your child's ability to manage finances, the money can be left in a Trust which will prevent him or her from accessing the funds without the permission of a person whom you designate, the Trustee. If you do not like your child's spouse and are concerned he or she might divorce your child and take some of the inheritance you leave your child, you can leave your assets in a "Divorce Protection Trust." Such a Trust keeps the assets separate from marital assets. Therefore, it minimizes the risk of the assets ending up in the hands of the child's future ex-spouse.

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

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Canada Geese

The leaves turn red and gold, the air chills, the days grow shorter. But for many Midwesterners, summer's last call is marked by the honking of Canada geese flying in V-formation overhead.

Yet, many of these geese no longer migrate. Many years ago, Canada geese were overhunted to the brink of extinction. A gaggle was found and bred in captivity in an effort to resuscitate the imperiled species. The progeny of these geese, along with others that find plentiful food and lodging, do not to migrate, and endure our long, cold winters, instead. Canada geese are now enjoying a population rebound. Unfortunately, not all urban and suburban dwellers are celebrating; they may find these animals to be nuisance. Here are a few facts about Canada geese, and tips to deter them humanely.

Canada geese mate for life. At times, a goose will neglect its own need for food and safety to remain with an ailing mate. It is not unusual for a Canada goose live 20 years or more.

Mating season is February-March; nesting season is mid-March to May.

These birds have strong family bonds. In fact, when conflicts do arise with humans, it is generally because the animals are trying to protect their young. Geese will try to use the same nesting site year after year.

All geese in a single clutch will hatch on approximately the same day!

Canada geese are attracted to short grasslands, so they flock to manicured lawns and golf courses. Want to deter geese? Leave grass at least four inches high; plant tall grasses along shorelines; and grow trees.

Some people propose killing Canada geese as a way to manage populations. We tried that once before and almost drove them to extinction. Moreover, aside from being an inhumane way to deal with what we may perceive as too many geese (Canada geese sure don't see it that way!), "management culls" are an ineffective quick-fix. Other geese will simply move into the vacated areas and, in fact, neighboring populations may multiply in response to diminished numbers.

THE ANTI-CRUELTY SOCIETY OFFERS TIPS FOR KEEPING YOUR PET SAFE AND HEALTHY IN FRIGID WINTER WEATHER

With temperatures dipping into the single digits, we need to take the following precautions to ensure the safety and well being of our pets.

- * Shelter, Food, and Water: Cats should be kept inside at all times, year-round, to protect from the many life-threatening dangers always present outside. Dogs should also live inside. However, if your dog spends a lot of time outside, you are required by law to provide proper shelter. A proper doghouse must be windproof and watertight, with a floor raised off the ground, and just large enough so that the dog is completely comfortable in any position. Outdoor dogs also need bedding and additional fat in their diets during the winter to help build up natural insulation. Make sure your pet has plenty of fresh, clean water in a secure, non-tip dish at all times.
- * Becoming Lost or Injured: Snow and ice increase your pet's chances of becoming disoriented and lost if roaming the streets. Bad weather conditions make it extra difficult for cars to stop, increasing your animal's chance of getting hit. Keeping your pets indoors and walking your dog on a leash will prevent such tragedies.
- * Ice, Salt, and Snow: Jagged ice and sidewalk salt can injure or irritate your dog's foot pads. After you return home from a walk, check the foot pads and wipe off any salt or ice with a damp towel. Also dry your dog thoroughly whenever he or she comes in from the snow.
- * Frostbite: Even though pets have a fur coat, most cats and dogs cannot endure the cold of winter for more than 10 to 15 minutes. A pet left outdoors can get frostbite and even freeze to death. Signs of frostbite include skin that is pale and cool to the touch, with decreased sensation in the affected area. If you suspect frostbite, gently warm the area with warm, not hot, water and then take the animal to your veterinarian. After thawing, there may be pain or redness on the frostbitten area. Once an area has been frozen it can become cold and frostbitten again more easily.
- *Anti-Freeze: Animals are attracted to this substance by its sweet taste. It can be fatal if ingested, so keep all anti-freeze bottles out of your pet's reach. Also be sure to clean up any spills in your garage or driveway immediately. If your cat or dog should swallow anti-freeze-or any poison-contact your veterinarian immediately.
- * Car Engines: In cold weather, cats allowed outdoors crawl beneath cars and climb up inside the engines seeking warmth and shelter. This can lead to injuries or death when the engines are started. To prevent this, keep your cat indoors. To protect stray cats, knock on your hood or sound the horn before starting the car.
- * Grooming: Animals tend to shed hair less during the cold months, but still require regular brushing. Cats generally do not need a bath-they clean themselves. Dogs should be bathed only if needed and no more than once a month. When bathing any animal, be sure to only use a shampoo that is specifically safe for a cat or dog and follow label directions completely.
- * Holiday Hazards: Mistletoe, Holly and Poinsettias are all poisonous to pets. Make sure your holiday tree is steady so it can't be knocked over. Protect your cat or dog from drinking stagnant Christmas tree water, eating candy, chocolate or potentially injurious ornaments, tinsel and trimming, or nibbling on the cords from decorations. Keep an on your pets to make sure they don't slip out the door as your visitors come and go. Do not give a cat or dog as a gift. Give a gift certificate for a pet adoption from a shelter and allow the recipient to select an animal.

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
