Evanston Public Library Peregrine Falcons to be Named and Banded by Experts from the Field Museum: Wednesday, June 4, 11 AM

What: Mary Hennen and Josh Engel, from the Field Museum, will band falcon chicks born at the Evanston Public Library Peregrine Falcon nesting site. The baby falcons (eyases) will also be named at the event which is free and open to the public. Hennen and Engel will take questions from the press and the public. Limited seating. **When:** Wednesday, June 4, 11 AM

Where: Evanston Public Library, 1703 Orrington Avenue, 3rd Floor, west side **Details:** Once on the Endangered Species list, Peregrine Falcons have made a

dramatic recovery. Today there are about 20 pairs of Peregrines in the Chicago area. The banding process is a critical tactic in supporting the Peregrine population. The baby falcons will be removed from the nest, brought indoors for banding, blood sampling, and viewing, then returned to the nest.

This is the 9th year that Nona, the mother, and Sqauwker, the father have nested together at the Library.

How to Fly the United States Flag

(From literature by the VFW National Veterans and Military Services)

- 1. The flag should be hoisted briskly and lowered ceremoniously.
- 2. The flag is never allowed to touch the ground or the floor.
- 3. When hung over a sidewalk on a rope extending from a building to a pole, the union stars are always away from the building.
- 4. When vertically hung over the center of the street, the flag always has the union stars to the north in an east/west street, and to theeast in a north/south street.
- 5. The flag of the United States of America should be at the center and at the highest point of the group when a number of flags of states or localities or pennants of societies are grouped and displayed from staffs.
- 6. The flag should never be festooned, drawn back, nor up, in folds but always allowed to fall free.
- 7. The flag should be displayed at half-staff until noon on Memorial Day then raised to the top of the staff.
- 8. Never fly the flag upside down except as a signal of distress in instances of extreme danger to life or property.
- 9. The flag is never flown in inclement weather except when using an all-weather flag.
- 10. The flag can be flown every day from sunrise to sunset and at night if illuminated properly.

FLAG DAY

Each year on June 14 we celebrate the birthday of the Stars and Stripes, which came into being on June 14, 1777. At that time, the Second Continental Congress authorized a new flag to symbolize the new Nation, the United States of America.

The Stars and Stripes first flew in a Flag Day celebration in Hartford, Connecticut in 1861, during the first summer of the Civil War. The first national observance of Flag Day occurred June 14, 1877, the centennial of the original flag resolution.

In 1916 President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation calling for a nationwide observance of Flag Day on June 14. It was not until 1949 that Congress made this day a permanent observance by resolving "That the 14th day of June of each year is hereby designated as Flag Day ". The measure was signed into law by President Harry Truman.

Although Flag Day is not celebrated as a Federal holiday, Americans everywhere continue to honor the history and heritage it represents.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE TO THE FLAG

"I Pledge Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands, one Nation under God, Indivisible, with Liberty and Justice for All"

The Pledge of Allegiance received official recognition by Congress in an Act approved on June 22, 1942. However, the pledge was first published in 1892 in the Youth's Companion magazine in Boston, Massachusetts to celebrate the 400th anniversary of the discovery of America, and was first used in public schools to celebrate Columbus Day on October 12, 1892.

In its original version, the pledge read "my flag" instead of "the flag of the United States." The change in the wording was adopted by the National Flag Conference in 1923. The rationale for the change was that it prevented ambiguity among foreign-born children and adults who might have the flag of their native land in mind when reciting the pledge.

The phrase "under God" was added to the pledge by a Congressional Act approved on June 14, 1954. At that time, President Eisenhower said: "in this way we are reaffirming the transcendence of religious faith in America's heritage and future; in this way we shall constantly strengthen those spiritual weapons which forever will be our Country's most powerful resource in peace and war."

The American's Creed

I believe in the United States of America as a government of the people, by the people, for the people; whose just powers are derived from the consent of the governed, a democracy in a republic; a sovereign nation of many sovereign states; a perfect union, one and inseparable; established upon those principles of freedom, equality, justice and humanity for which American patriots sacrificed their lives and fortunes.

I therefore believe it is my duty to my country to love it, to support its constitution, to obey its laws, to respect its flag, and to defend it against all enemies. (Authorized Version)

The Creed was written in 1918 by William Tyler Page of Friendship Heights, Maryland in the course of a nation wide contest on the subject. Page was a descendent of President Tyler, and Representative John Page, who served in the Congress fro 1789-97. William Tyler Page began his government career as a Congressional page in December of 1881. In 1919 he was elected Clerk of the House of Representatives, and held that position until December of 1931. A new post, Emeritus Minority Clerk, was then created for him which he occupied until his death on October 20, 1942.

When people think about estate planning, they typi-cally think of who will get their possessions. Uponfurther thought, they recognize that the most important decisions they make will be the identity of trusted de-cision makers like guardians, executors, trustees, and agents. If the individual has a Will, an executor or personal representative is named in the Will to manage the affairs of the estate. This person has the responsibility of col-lecting all the assets of the person who has died, manag-ing those assets, paying debts of the estate, and then distributing the assets to heirs or other beneficiaries. A trustee is simi-

lar to an executor, except the trusteemanages the assets of the trust rather than of the estate. Because trusts often re-main in existence for many years, the role of trustee may be more important thanthat of executor. An agent is the person you appoint under a power of attorney to make deci-sions for you in the event that you are not able to do so for yourself. The agentunder a power of attorney for property will make decisions regarding the man-agement of your financial affairs. The agent under a health care power of attorney (also known as an advance health care directive or health care proxy) willmake decisions regarding your health care. If you do not have a power of attorney, it may be necessary to appoint aguardian or conservator to make financial and health care decisions for you ifyou are not able to make them for yourself. In some states, a separate guardianor conservator may be appointed for the care of the individual and a different person appointed as the guardian or conservator of the property, or estate, of theindividual during lifetime. You may appoint a guardian or conservator for yourcare in a power of attorney.Guardians of minor children are "nominated" in the Will by the last parent todie. Guardians are "nominated" rather than appointed because the courts willgive preference to the nomination but are not bound by it. If a court determines that the best interests of the child would be served by another choice, they neednot heed your suggestion. An example of this is the tragic case of Stephen and Sara Sherwood. Onlynine days after his return from Iraq, Stephen shot his wife and then himself. This left his daughter an orphan. The authorities in Colorado placed the daugh-ter in the temporary care of Sara's sister, Ginny, and her husband, who thensought to be appointed as guardians. Stephen's mother objected and sought ap-pointment herself. The trial court looked to Stephen's Will, because he was thelast parent to die. Stephen's will nominated his mother and the trial court con-sidered itself constrained by that unless to do otherwise would have caused ac-tual harm or danger. The Colorado Supreme Court reversed that decision and instructed the trial court to determine which choice would be in the best interestsof the child. Many states also allow a child over a certain age, typically aroundage 13 or 14, to overrule the nomination of guardian in the Will. While the nomination of a guardian is not a guarantee, it does allow you to give he court guidance, which it will use to make its determination. If all other things re equal, the court will heed your advice. The nomination or appointment of trusted individuals to be guardians, trustees, orexecutors is the most important decision you can make with regard to your estateplan. These individuals are charged with carrying out your wishes, whether in rais-ing your children, managing your assets, or making distributions. A qualified estateplanning attorney can assist you in making these difficult choices and drafting doc-uments to accomplish your goals.
