Columbus Day Observance, Oct. 10th

Columbus Day first became an official state holiday in Colorado in 1906, and became a federal holiday in 1937. However, people have celebrated Columbus's voyage since the colonial period. In 1792, New York City and other U.S. cities celebrated the 300th anniversary of his landing in the New World. In 1892, President Benjamin Harrison called upon the people of the United States to celebrate Columbus Day on the 400th anniversary of the event. During the four hundredth anniversary, in 1892, teachers, preachers, poets and politicians used Columbus Day rituals to teach ideals of patriotism. These patriotic rituals were framed around themes such as support for war, citizenship boundaries, the importance of loyalty to the nation, and celebrating social progress.

Many Italian-Americans observe Columbus Day as a celebration of their heritage, the first occasion being in New York City on October 12, 1866. Columbus Day was first popularized as a holiday in the United States through the lobbying of Angelo Noce, a first generation Italian, in Denver. The first official, regular Columbus Day holiday was proclaimed by Colorado governor Jesse F. McDonald in 1905 and made a statutory holiday in 1907. In April 1934, as a result of lobbying by the Knights of Columbus, Congress and President Franklin Delano Roosevelt made October 12 a federal holiday under the name Columbus Day.

COMMON SENSE

Debates, if properly conducted, should be a way to help people make a decision on who they feel would make a viable candidate/representative. If the sponsors of these debates would make the necessary adjustments, it would prove to be most valuable to the voters who are listening and/or watching.

Specific questions could be gathered. These questions should then be asked of each person on the panel. The candidates then should be given an adequate amount of time to answer the questions.

The questions to be asked should be released ahead of time to the debaters. In this way they would have time to prepare a meaningful response. The moderators, we assume, are limited in their knowledge of the issues addressed, therefore the limitations put on the candidates to answer in a 30 second or 1 minute period of time might be totally inadequate for them to answer completely and for us, the voters, to get a full picture of what the thoughts and prospective actions of these candidates might be if elected. Perhaps fewer questions, with more substance, is the solution.

It should never be acceptable to be given an answer to a question of "I have a plan" without some sort of explanation as to what the plan is and how that debater plans to carry it through.

Skokie Fire Prevention Week - October 9 to 15

Fire Prevention Week 2011 will emphasize safety at home. National statistics show that eight percent of all fire deaths occur in the home.

From October 9 to 15, 2011, fire and life safety educators from the Skokie Fire Department will focus on prevention and provide Skokie residents with simple ways to protect their families from fire.

Please remember that Illinois law requires all residences to have working smoke detectors installed within 15 feet of all sleeping areas. Properly installed and maintained, a smoke detector can give time to escape a fire without injury or death.

The Skokie Fire Department recommends checking a smoke detector's battery monthly. Replace detectors according to manufacturer's recommendations or a minimum every 10 years. Maintaining working smoke detectors can reduce the chance of fire injury by over 50%.

Illinois House Republicans Announce Jobs Creation Package

Last Monday, Illinois House Republican Leader Tom Cross unveiled a proposal to attract and keep good jobs in Illinois. The measure, filed as House Bill 3811 is supported by the Illinois House Republican Caucus including State Representative Mike McAuliffe (R - Chicago).

"The key to turning our economy around is putting people back to work. Unfortunately, higher taxes and an unfriendly business climate are forcing too many businesses to leave Illinois. To create and keep good jobs in our communities, Illinois needs to make job creation a top priority. The package we introduced last week is a good first step to help us level the playing field with neighboring states and keep us competitive," explained Representative McAuliffe.

House Republican Job Package includes measures to:

- Re-instate the Net Operating Loss deduction.

Many businesses are losing money in this tough economy, this proposal allows them to use their net operating loss as a tax deduction extending the corporate carry forwards from 12 years to 20 years, and allowing a two year carry back.

- Re-enact the Illinois Research & Development tax credit.

This tax credit expired in December 2010 and businesses have utilized it over the years. This would allow businesses that are doing legitimate research and development projects as defined in the law to qualify for a tax credit each year. Our proposal would also add ethanol and biodiesel research as qualified R & D activities.

- Extend the life of existing Enterprise Zones by up to 20 years.

Most designated Enterprise Zones in Illinois are set to expire in the next ten years. Our proposal would allow current municipalities around the state to extend the enterprise zones in their communities to ensure tax incentives to businesses that have located or choose to locate in these underdeveloped areas.

- Reduce the administrative costs and burdens involved with setting up and incorporating a Limited Liability Corporation in Illinois.

In Illinois even the cost to set up a business is much higher. We are proposing to reduce that fee from \$750 to \$100. The highest fee that any of our surrounding states currently charges is in Wisconsin at \$130.

- Increase the estate tax exemption to \$5 million.

Under the current law, when family farms are passed from generation to generation the heirs are hit with a huge estate tax if their assets are worth more than \$2 million. Family farm assets are invested in land and equipment leaving limited available cash flow. Our proposal would raise the estate tax exemption to \$5 million—which mirrors the federal tax code.

State Representative Michael McAuliffe (R-Chicago) who represents Norridge, Harwood Heights and portions of, Niles and Chicago is a co-sponsor to the proposal laid out by House Republican Leader Cross.

The show is a revue that seldom gets a production in Chicago and this production is a show I can say is a ‘do-not-miss show’ under the direction of Fred Anzevino that is being choreographed by Maggie Portman with musical direction by Eugene Dizon, who leads a three-piece orchestra.

Mr. Anzevino founded the theatre in 1997 and every production of this non-equity theatre rarely disappoints.

The music for the show is by David Shire with lyrics by Richard Maltby, Jr. The show features twenty-five songs sung by three talented performers who are Hillary Patingre, Stephanie Herman and newcomer Teddy Boone who is no relation to Daniel. All have big voices and it would be difficult to find fault with their singing.

You may not be familiar with the songs but don’t let that turn you off in seeing the show.

You’ll hear such songs as “I Am In Love,” the title song, “Beautiful,” “I Don’t Remember Christmas,” “Barbara,” “A Girl You Should Know,” “Watching the Big Parade Go By” and “New Life Coming.”

Halloween Pet Tips:

Important Tips to Keep You and Your Pets Safe

Halloween is almost here. The Anti-Cruelty Society offers the following tips to keep your pets healthy and safe while you enjoy this fun-filled holiday.

When the trick or treaters start calling, or your party guests start arriving, make sure your pets are secured in a room where they will be comfortable and safe from slipping out the door or possibly biting or scratching someone. Pets are often stressed by many strangers at their home and will be much happier in their own safe space.

Candy is not appropriate for pets. Give your pets treats that are made especially for them.

Chocolate is not appropriate for pets in any amount and can be potentially poisonous to many animals. Unsweetened baking chocolate contains almost seven times more theobromine (the chemical in chocolate that is hazardous to animals) as milk chocolate.

Candies and some gum contain artificial sweeteners that can be toxic to pets. If ingested, wrappers from candy and gum can cause vomiting or create intestinal blockage.

Pumpkins and other gourds are relatively non-toxic, they could cause gastrointestinal upset or intestinal blockage if large pieces are ingested.

Wires and plugs from electrical lights also pose a threat to your pet. Electrical shock from chewing on cords or injury from plastic or glass bulbs is possible. Make sure they are kept out of your pet's reach.

Glues and other materials used to make decorations and costumes can be toxic to pets. Keep all materials out of your pet's reach.

If your pet is exposed to or ingests any of these or other toxic substance, immediately contact your local veterinarian or the Animal Poison Hotline at 888-232-8870.

Want Privacy? Use a Trust

Do you like your nosy neighbors keeping tabs of your business? Do you want them knowing how much money you left to your kids? Do you want Aunt Fern knowing that you left money to your favorite uncle but not to her? If you leave only a will, it will all be a matter of public record. Your neighbors, your relatives, your co-workers, telemarketers, and even more nefarious individuals can just walk right into your local court house and ask to see your file after you have died. By doing so they can see your will and all the wishes you have expressed in it. In addition, in most states, all the assets controlled

by the will must be inventoried and set forth in the file.

A better alternative is to leave your assets in a trust. The assets in the trust are not technically titled in your individual name and avoid probate and, therefore, the public scrutiny of prying eyes.

Here are some examples of what you can discover just from a trip to the court house, all of it public information:

- Musician Jerry Garcia left his guitars to their maker, Douglas Erwin. He left 10% of his estate to his brother, Clifford. The assets he left to his daughters were in trust until they reached age 21.
- Former Supreme Court Chief Justice Warren Burger left a short handwritten will that left 1/3 to his daughter and 2/3 to his son.
- Benjamin Franklin left his lands in Nova Scotia to his son and his houses in Philadelphia to his daughter. He gave his picture of the King of France to his daughter, Sarah, asking that she not remove the jewels from the frame. He left money to facilitate the freeing of his son-in-law's slave.
- Marilyn Monroe left her clothing and personal effects and a significant portion of her estate to Lee Strasberg, the founder of the famous acting school in Hollywood.
- President Calvin Coolidge disinherited his son.
- John F. Kennedy, Jr. gave the carved whale ivory scrimshaw set he inherited from his father to his nephew, John Schlossberg.
- David Packard, co-founder of Hewlett-Packard, left almost everything he had left at his death to a charitable foundation.
- President Richard Nixon left his "personal diaries" including tapes, notes, etc., to his daughters. If his daughters did not survive him, he left explicit instructions that everything should be destroyed.

There are many reasons to keep your wishes and your affairs private after your death. Information about your wealth and to whom you are leaving it could leave the recipients vulnerable to unscrupulous people, from benign salespeople trying to sell a product to con artists trying to prey on the grieving. Revelations of whom you have chosen to benefit may offend others who were not preferred.

Your wishes do not have to become common knowledge. An estate planning attorney can help you keep your private life just that: private.

NILES WEST STUDENTS TAKE PART IN LIVE NASA WEBCAST

Students in Niles West teacher Ami LeFevre's Honors Chemistry class and members of the Chemistry Club represented one of only three high schools in the country that participated in a live webcast on the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's (NASA) Digital Learning Network. The students took part in the Sept. 22 webcast with scientists from NASA and the American Chemical Society (ACS) as part of the International Year of Chemistry's Global Water Experiment.

The webinar originated at NASA's Johnson Space Center in Houston. Niles West students took part in the session via a live hook-up in the Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) lab. Schools across the country were able to participate by logging on to the NASA website, watching and typing in questions. Niles West students were seen in the broadcast and were able to speak directly to the scientists.

In the global experiment, called "Water: A Chemical Solution," students worldwide are testing local water sources and posting their analysis to an Internet data map where they will be able to view their results and compare them to others. During the webcast, ACS and NASA scientists performed a filtration and purification experiment and discussed how it relates to water purification on earth and on NASA's International Space Station.

The American Chemical Society is a nonprofit organization chartered by the U.S. Congress. With more than 163,000 members, ACS is the world's largest scientific society and a global leader in providing access to chemistry-related research through its multiple databases, peer-reviewed journals and scientific conferences. Its main offices are in Washington, D.C., and Columbus, Ohio.
