Our Lady of the Resurrection Medical Center Ranks in the Top 5% in the Nation for Emergency Medicine

Our Lady of the Resurrection Medical Center ranks in the top five percent of U.S. hospitals for emergency medicine, according to a new study released April 2011 by HealthGrades[®], an independent health care ratings company.

As a result of this ranking, Our Lady of the Resurrection Medical Center received the HealthGrades 2011 Emergency Medicine Excellence AwardTM. The hospital is one of only 268 of the nearly 5,000 non-federal hospitals in the nation, one of only 18 Illinois hospitals and one of only five in Chicago to be recognized with this award.

"It is rewarding to receive recognition as an emergency medicine health care leader in Chicago and the nation," said Martin Judd, executive vice president and chief executive officer, Our Lady of the Resurrection Medical Center. "This achievement confirms our successful approach to treating the individual while providing the highest quality health care. Residents of Chicago's Northwest Side are getting superior care equal to the best in the country right here in their neighborhood."

The HealthGrades 2011 Emergency Medicine in American Hospitals Study analyzed more than seven million Medicare patient records from 2007 to 2009. The study focused on 12 of the most common and life-threatening medical emergencies among that patient population, including heart attack, stroke, pneumonia and chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD).

"Attending to life-threatening conditions such as those in the HealthGrades study requires immediate, competent medical care for successful patient outcomes," said David Bordo, M.D., Medical Director, Emergency Department. "This independent study illustrates our commitment to clinical excellence as physicians, nurses and staff work collaboratively in caring for patients and their families."

On average, Medicare patients treated at hospitals recognized with a Health-Grades Emergency Medicine Excellence Award had a 40 percent lower risk of death compared to patients treated at other hospitals. For the 12 conditions studied, the on average percentage of cases admitted through the emergency department increased 2.64 percent from 2007 to 2009.

"In the case of a medical emergency, patients need to get to the closest emergency room as fast as possible - no exceptions," said Dr. Rick May, study co-author and HealthGrades Vice President of Clinical Quality Services. "That said, we encourage patients to prepare in advance by identifying top-performing hospitals close to home. Our research shows that it's not just the care you receive the moment you arrive that makes the difference between life and death, but the hospital's ability to continue to provide you with the right care at the right time if you need to be admitted."

West Nile Virus Season is Here – Tips & Reminders to Stay Safe

West Nile Virus season begins in May and the Evanston Health Department is asking residents to inspect their yards and homes for any containers holding water for more than three days. These containers include watering cans, pet dishes, Frisbees and plastic cups among others. West Nile Virus mosquitoes are not associated with floods but rather heat and drought.

West Nile virus is transmitted through the bite of a mosquito that has picked up the virus by feeding on an infected bird. Most people with the virus have no clinical symptoms of illness, but some may become ill three to 15 days after the bite of an infected mosquito. The first human case in Illinois is not usually reported until July or later.

Only about two people in ten who are bitten by an infected mosquito will experience any illness. Illness from West Nile is usually mild and includes fever,

headache and body aches, but serious illness, such as encephalitis and meningitis, and death are possible. Persons older than 50 years of age have the highest risk of severe disease.

The best way to prevent West Nile disease or any other mosquito-borne illness is to reduce the number of mosquitoes around your home and to take personal precautions to avoid mosquito bites. Precautions include:

Avoid being outdoors when mosquitoes are most active, especially between dusk and dawn.

When outdoors, wear shoes and socks, long pants and a long-sleeved shirt, and apply insect repellent that includes DEET, picaridin, oil of lemon eucalyptus or IR 3535 according to label instructions. Consult a physician before using repellents on infants.

Make sure doors and windows have tight-fitting screens. Repair or replace screens that have tears or other openings. Try to keep doors and windows shut, especially at night.

Eliminate all sources of standing water that can support mosquito breeding, including water in bird baths, ponds, flowerpots, wading pools, old tires and any other receptacles. In communities where there are organized mosquito control programs, contact your municipal government to report areas of stagnant water in roadside ditches, flooded yards and similar locations that may produce mosquitoes.

Skokie Vehicle Stickers and Pet Licenses

Village of Skokie vehicle stickers are available Wednesday, June 1 and must be displayed on windshields by August 31. The stickers are available for purchase at Village Hall, 5127 Oakton Street.

All vehicles registered with the State of Illinois to an address within the corporate limits of the Village of Skokie must display a valid Village sticker. Even if the vehicle is not physically in Skokie, it must display a Village sticker. The address appearing in the Secretary of State's records for the vehicle is the criterion and the owner of record is responsible for obtaining the sticker.

Passenger vehicle stickers purchased through August 31 cost \$20. After that date, the cost increases to \$30. Other vehicles have different licensing fees. Vehicle sticker renewals may be made online at www.skokie.org through August 31. Payment is accepted from Visa, MasterCard, Discover and debit cards. The Village does not charge an added fee for paying with a credit card.

Pet licenses also are available at Village Hall. With a veterinarian's statement of spay/neutering, the pet license fee is \$6. Without the statement the fee is \$12. A current rabies certificate must be presented at the time of purchase whether purchasing in-person or by mail. Pet licenses cannot be renewed online at this time.

Vehicle stickers and pet licenses can be purchased at Skokie Village Hall, 5127 Oakton Street, from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. For more information, please contact the Finance Department at 847/933-8423.

The Best Ways to Help Injured or Orphaned Animals

Spring and summer are busy baby-making times in the animal kingdom... even the urban animal kingdom here in the city. Sadly, spring and summer also see an increase in injured and orphaned animals. Most of us want to help, but are unprepared and do not know what is the best course of action. Much depends upon the particular animal, time of year, and type of injury, but here are a few tips to use in a pinch. Clip this article to carry in your wallet so the information is handy when you need it most. Want to be prepared and save crucial time? Keep a cardboard box with holes, an old-tee shirt, and gloves in your car.

Be sure the animal is truly injured or orphaned. Often wildlife parents leave young by themselves during the day or may be watching nearby.

Intervene if:

The animal is presented to you by a dog or cat

The animal is bleeding or you see a limb that appears broken

You observe a live bird on the ground with few or no feathers (it is a myth that a mother bird will reject a baby that has been handled by a human)

The animal is shivering

You see a dead parent

Avoid the temptation to give an animal food or drink or try to administer first aid yourself. More of then than not, these attempts actually cause more injury.

Contact a licensed and human animal rehabilitator in your area (below is a list of nearby wildlife rehabilitators trusted by Urban Wildlife Coalition).

Unless the rehabilitator instructs you otherwise, follow these guidelines:

Find a cardboard box or container that closes. Punch holes from the inside out. Place a soft cloth or tee-shirt at the bottom

Wearing gloves, gently scoop the animal up (you may want to use a towel or pillowcase) and place it in the box.

While you wait to transport the animal, store box in a warm, dark, quiet place away from pets, children, and noise.

Keep sound to a minimum. Though you may be tempted to play soft music or talk quietly to the animal, these unusual sounds can frighten it even more.

Do not leave the animal alone.

Diamond Frost is a Gardener's Best Friend

World's Fastest Birds Return to Nest at **Evanston Library - Public Invited to Banding/Naming of Baby Falcons**

Four baby peregrine falcons hatched in early May high above the downtown Evanston streets at the Evanston Public Library. The library has been home to eight consecutive generations of the world's fastest birds hatching over twenty peregrine falcons.

"For the past several years, a pair of peregrine falcons has nested on one of the columns along the south side of the library and at least one eyas (baby falcon) has successfully fledged each year," explained Evanston Public Library Director Mary Johns. "While the nest cannot be viewed directly from either inside or



outside the building, the library has set up a webcam which transmits a streaming live image for all to enjoy."

The public is invited to join staff in naming and banding of this year's brood of baby peregrine falcons, an ongoing tradition of the Evanston Public Library Peregine Falcon Program, on Tuesday, May 31st at 11a.m., on the third floor of the library. Mary Hennen and Matt Gies, representatives from Chicago's Field Museum of Natural History and the Shedd Aquarium, will oversee the delicate operation.

The peregrine falcon is a raptor, or bird of prey. Adults have blue-gray wings, dark brown backs, a buff colored underside with brown spots, and white faces with a black tear stripe on their cheeks. They have a hooked beaks and strong talons. Peregrine falcons are the fastest flying birds in the world – they are able to dive at 200 miles per hour and catch their prey in mid-air. There are an estimated 1,650 breeding pairs in the United States and Canada.

Peregrine Falcons have adapted to living in many cities and make use of tall buildings that provide suitable ledges for nesting and depend on the large populations of pigeons and starlings in cities for food. Peregrine falcons mate for life and breed in the same territory each year.

"Peregrine Falcons nested on the library for the first time in the summer of 2004. That year there were four eggs, but shortly after the eggs hatched the female broke her wing leaving the male to raise the chicks on his own. Only one chick successfully fledged. The female with the broken wing received veterinary treatment and now appears in nature education programs," added Library Director Johns.

In 2010, three library peregrine falcons were banded, sampled and named in May. Their names are: Lorraine (in honor of Lorraine H. Morton, Evanston's first African-American mayor), Hennen (in honor of Mary Hennen, the director of the Chicago Peregrine Program for 19 years), and Perkins (after Dwight Perkins who was known as the "father" of the Cook County Forest Preserve System).

The peregrine falcon, a symbol of the once endangered species, mirrors the rebirth of libraries across the nation. Librarians are as busy as the falcon parents, providing ready access to information, employment assistance for job seekers, bridging the digital divide for the homeless, supporting our beleaguered schools with community outreach programs, homework help, and early childhood through teen programs. While providing books to be sure, libraries are vital to the people of the towns and cities they serve.

"Flag Day", June 14th.

The Stars and Stripes originated as a result of a resolution adopted by the Marine Committee of the Second Continental Congress at Philadelphia on June 14, 1777.

The laws relating to the flag of the United States of America are found in detail in the United States Code. Title 4, Chapter 1 pertains to the flag and seal, seat of Government and the States; Title 18, Chapter 33 pertains to crimes and criminal procedures; Title 36, Chapter 10 pertains to patriotic customs and observances. These laws were supplemented by Executive Orders and Presidential Proclamations.

To quote the writer Henry Ward Beecher (1813-1887), "A thoughtful mind when it sees a nation's flag, sees not the flag, but the nation itself. And whatever may be its symbols, its insignia, he reads chiefly in the flag, the government, the principles, the truths, the history that belongs to the nation that sets it forth. The American flag has been a symbol of Liberty and men rejoiced in it.

"The stars upon it were like the bright morning stars of God, and the stripes upon it were beams of morning light. As at early dawn the stars shine forth even while it grows light, and then as the sun advances that light breaks into banks and streaming lines of color, the glowing red and intense white striving together, and ribbing the horizon with bars effulgent, so, on the American flag, stars and beams of many-colored light shine out together..."

How to Fly the United States Flag -Ten Guidelines:

(From literature by the VFW National Veterans and Military Services)

1. The flag should be hoisted briskly and lowered ceremoniously.

2. The flag is never allowed to touch the ground or the floor.

3. When hung over a sidewalk on a rope extending from a building to a pole, the union stars are always away from the building.

4. When vertically hung over the center of the street, the flag always has the union stars to the north in an east/west street, and to the

east in a north/south street.

5. The flag of the United States of America should be at the center and at the highest point of the group when a number of flags of states or

localities or pennants of societies are grouped and displayed from staffs.

6. The flag should never be festooned, drawn back, nor up, in folds but always allowed to fall free.

7. The flag should be displayed at half-staff until noon on Memorial Day then raised to the top of the staff.

8. Never fly the flag upside down except as a signal of distress in instances of extreme danger to life or property.

9. The flag is never flown in inclement weather except when using an all-weather flag.

10. The flag can be flown every day from sunrise to sunset and at night if illuminated properly.

A HANDSOME GIFT FOR DAD

Father's Day is right around the corner. Perhaps you'll give Dad the usual gift: a necktie, shaving set, leather wallet, or new fishing lure. But there's something he may appreciate even more. People all over the country are helping their dads save nearly \$4,000 a year on the cost of prescription drugs. You can help your dad too — and it won't cost you a dime.

The high cost of prescription medication can be a burden on fathers (or anyone) who have limited income and resources. But there is Extra Help — available through Social Security — that could pay part of his monthly premiums, annual deductibles, and prescription co-payments. That Extra Help is worth an average of almost \$4,000 a year.

To figure out whether your father is eligible, Social Security needs to know his income and the value of his savings, investments, and real estate (other than the home he lives in). To qualify for the Extra Help, he must be enrolled in Medicare and have.

• Annual income limited to \$16,335 for an individual or \$22,065 for a married

Even if his income is higher, he still may be able to get some help with monthly premiums, annual deductibles, and prescription co-payments. Some examples where income may be higher include if he or his spouse:

—Support other family members who live with them;

—Have earnings from work; or

-Live in Alaska or Hawaii; and

• Resources limited to \$12,640 for an individual or \$25,260 for a married couple living together. Resources include such things as bank accounts, stocks, and bonds. We do not count his house and car as resources.

Social Security has an easy-to-use online application that you can help complete for your dad. You can find it at www.socialsecurity.gov. Just select the link on the left of the page that says, "Get extra help with Medicare prescription drug costs." To apply by phone or have an application mailed to you, call Social Security at 1-800-772-1213 (TTY 1-800-325-0778) and ask for the Application for Help with Medicare Prescription Drug Plan Costs (SSA-1020). Or go to the nearest Social Security office.

Of course, the Extra Help is not just for fathers. Anyone who is entitled to Medicare and has limited income and resources may be eligible.

The Impact of Dying Without an Estate Plan



Most of us expect that tomorrow will be another day like any other. But, as Euripides said, "no one can confidently say that he will still be living tomorrow." In fact thousands of people die in the United States every single day. Some of them die of long-term illnesses. But, many of them die unexpectedly from accidents, heart attacks, and other tragedies.

Let's look at what would happen if you died without planning in advance. First, if your death were preceded by a period of incapacity, your family might not be able to access funds that were needed during

your illness. Without a Durable Power of Attorney for Property, financial institutions and other companies and organizations (Social Security Administration, utility companies, etc.) will not speak with anyone trying to assist you. Next, if you had not legally expressed your wishes with regard to your end-of-life care, your family might not be able to carry out your wishes. A Health Care Power of Attorney, Advance Health Care Directive, Health Care Proxy or Living Will would be needed to empower the person whom you designate to assist you.

After your death, the probate court would appoint an executor or administrator for your assets. In some states this can be a time-consuming and expensive process. Often, this process can be made less burdensome if you had planned with a Trust. But, in the absence of planning, there are no legal instructions with regard to the disposition of your assets. In other words, you were "intestate."

When you die intestate, the distribution of your assets is set by a pre-determined list for intestate succession that varies from state to state. Typically, it is some combination of your spouse, descendants, and family of origin. But, without a valid Will, you do not get to specify who gets how much. You have to rely on what your state has set as the default for distribution. This may be far from what you have in mind. For example, if you have an unmarried partner, he or she would get nothing.

Even more importantly, without a Will, you would have no input into who will raise your minor children or provide assistance for an adult child with special needs. State law and the judge will determine that for you. Of course, the judge would not be privy to your experiences and may make a different decision without the benefit of your guidance.

Unfortunately, the question is not if you will die, but when will you die. When you die, you can leave a plan to achieve your goals and care for your family or you can leave it to chance. Your family and your hard-earned assets are too important to pass without your direction. Contact a qualified estate planning attorney today.
