
FLAG DAY ~ JUNE 14

Each year on June 14 we celebrate the birthday of the Stars and Stripes, which came into being on June 14, 1777. At that time, the Second Continental Congress authorized a new flag to symbolize the new Nation, the United States of America.

The Stars and Stripes first flew in a Flag Day celebration in Hartford, Connecticut in 1861, during the first summer of the Civil War. The first national observance of Flag Day occurred June 14, 1877, the centennial of the original flag resolution.

In 1916 President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation calling for a nationwide observance of Flag Day on June 14. It was not until 1949 that Congress made this day a permanent observance by resolving "That the 14th day of June of each year is hereby designated as Flag Day....". The measure was signed into law by President Harry Truman.

Although Flag Day is not celebrated as a Federal holiday, Americans everywhere continue to honor the history and heritage it represents.



Rogers Park / West Ridge Historical Society Walking Tour: The Gangsters of West Ridge

Join us on June 23 for a walk through the Roaring Twenties

No one likes to hear about murder and mayhem in the daily news, but looking back ninety-plus years can be an entertaining way to spend a summer afternoon. Go back to the Roaring Twenties with Neighborhood Historians Glenna Eaves and Dona Vitale for a walk through the then-new bungalow developments of West Ridge to a time when Chicago's gangsters were both public enemies and nationally-known celebrities.

You'll learn the stories of notorious members of Prohibition Era crime syndicates who shared these peaceful streets with prosperous business owners, famous athletes, noted architects, creative artists and skilled craftsmen, and see how their criminal activities affected the neighborhood. It's a fascinating look at a sometimes-glamorized, sometimes-buried aspect of Chicago history.

Where: Tour begins with a 45-minute background presentation at Warren Park Field House, 6601 N. Western Avenue, followed by a 2-hour walking tour.

When: Sunday, June 23. Presentation starts at 1 p.m., walking tour follows.

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The History of Father's Day

Father's Day, contrary to popular misconception, was not established as a holiday in order to help greeting card manufacturers sell more cards.

In fact when a "father's day" was first proposed there were no Father's Day cards!

Mrs. John B. Dodd, of Washington, first proposed the idea of a "father's day" in 1909. Mrs. Dodd wanted a special day to honor her father, William Smart. William Smart, a Civil War veteran, was widowed when his wife (Mrs. Dodd's mother) died in childbirth with their sixth child. Mr. Smart was left to raise the newborn and his other five children by himself on a rural farm in eastern Washington state. It was after Mrs. Dodd became an adult that she realized the strength and selflessness her father had shown in raising his children as a single parent.

The first Father's Day was observed on June 19, 1910 in Spokane Washington.

At about the same time in various towns and cities across America other people were beginning to celebrate a "father's day".

In 1924 President Calvin Coolidge supported the idea of a national Father's Day. Finally in 1966 President Lyndon Johnson signed a presidential proclamation declaring the 3rd Sunday of June as Father's Day.

Father's Day has become a day to not only honor your father; but all-men who act as a father figure. Stepfathers, uncles, grandfathers, and adult male friends are all honored on Father's Day.

Lori E. Lightfoot Sworn in as 56th Mayor of Chicago

Lori E. Lightfoot today just before noon was sworn in as the 56th Mayor of Chicago with her wife, Amy Eshleman, and daughter, Vivian, at her side. Thousands of members of the public attended the inaugural ceremony at Wintrust Arena to participate and celebrate this momentous achievement in Chicago's history.

"To those who are alone, we are with you. To those who need a home, we will shelter you. For those who have little, we will do much. We see you. We hear you. We are your neighbors. And—so help me—we will not pass you by," said Mayor Lightfoot.

Mayor Lightfoot took the oath of office administered by the Honorable Susan E. Cox, Magistrate Judge, U.S. District Court of the Northern District of Illinois and long-time friend of the Mayor. Preceding Mayor Lightfoot taking the oath, Clerk Anna Valencia, all fifty City Council members (including 12 new members), and Treasurer Melissa Conyears-Ervin were also

sworn in.

The presentation of colors was given by the Phoenix Military Academy JROTC.

The Pledge of Allegiance was performed by 17-year old Arturo Ballesteros from Back of the Yards College Prep and the National Anthem was performed by Miguel Cervantes of Chicago's "Hamilton" accompanied by the Chicago Sinfonietta.

Musical entertainment included Chicago Gay Men's Chorus, Puerto Rican Arts Alliance, After School Matters Choir, Native Veterans Group of Trickster Art Gallery, Ribbon Town Drum from Pokagon Band of Potawatomi, Chicago Sinfonietta - Project Inclusion, Merit School of Music, Alfreda Burke & Rodrick Dixon accompanied by Fred Nelson III, Lizz Wright accompanied by Kenny Banks and Bagpipes & Drums of the Emerald Society of the Chicago Police Department.

Faith leaders participating in the program included Rev. Dr.

L. Bernard Jakes of West Point Missionary Baptist Church, Imam Tariq I. El-Amin of Masjid Al-Taqwa, Rev. Dr. Beth Brown of Lincoln Park Presbyterian Church, Rabbi Capers C. Funnye, Jr of Beth Shalom B'Nai Zaken Ethiopian Hebrew Congregation and Father Thomas J. Hurley of Old Saint Patrick's Church.

Steppenwolf Ensemble Member Amy Morton served as the Master of Ceremonies.

Following the inaugural ceremony, Mayor Lightfoot and First Lady Amy Eshleman will greet members of the public at City Hall during a public open house from 2-4pm.

Mayor Lightfoot is Chicago's first black female, and first openly gay mayor. Lightfoot is the second woman to be elected to the post in Chicago's history.

Peregrine Falcons to be Named and Banded by Experts from The Field Museum Inside Evanston Public Library

What: Mary Hennen, Assistant Collections Manager and Director of the Chicago Peregrine Program at The Field Museum, will band young peregrine falcons hatched in May at the Evanston Public Library nesting site. The babies will be removed from the nest, brought inside, and then returned to the nest after the banding is done. The baby falcons (eyasses) will also be named at the event which is free and open to the public. Hennen will answer questions. Falcon t-shirts will be available for purchase. Seating is available on a first come, first serve basis.

Also there's a contest! Individuals are invited to submit names for the baby falcons to jschacter@cityofevanston.org by midnight May 30, with reasons for choices accompanying the names. Contest winners will be offered two front row seats for the banding event.

More Details: This is the 16th consecutive year that a pair of peregrines has nested at the Evanston Public Library. Four eggs were laid; two hatched. Once on the Endangered Species list, with over 90% of the North American population lost, peregrine falcons have made a dramatic recovery. The banding process is a critical tactic in supporting the peregrine population.

While some bird species are sensitive to human disturbance at the nest, peregrines are able to handle it. The adults exhibit defensive behaviors such as yelling and flying at the intruders, but they are willing to accept the young when they are returned to the nest.

Jones, Jr., developments partners and members of the West Ridge community today to cut the ribbon on the new Northtown Apartments, one of three innovative affordable housing developments that also include a co-located Chicago Public Library (CPL) branch.

"When we unite the strengths of our neighborhood libraries with great housing that is affordable and accessible, it is truly the best of both worlds," said Former Mayor Emanuel. "Chicago is reimagining and redefining what world-class housing and libraries can look like, and staying at the cutting edge of creating shared spaces that bring communities together."

"This is an important day for West Ridge as we stand together to mark the completion of a development that will serve as a gateway to our community," said Alderman Debra L. Silverstein, 50th Ward. "I know that the new residents of this building join the library patrons in welcoming this important neighborhood anchor that has transformed this corner into a vibrant place to live and gather."

"Our goal is to expand affordable housing opportunities across Chicago while also delivering community assets that can benefit all residents," said CHA CEO Eugene Jones, Jr. "With the opening of Northtown Apartments, we are providing a community anchor that combines new housing options and a library that will serve residents of all ages from West Ridge."

Assessor Fritz Kaegi Announces Support For Bill Requiring Automatic Renewal Of Senior Citizen Homestead Exemption

Cook County Assessor Fritz Kaegi today reiterated his support for HB 833, a bill that requires the automatic renewal of the Senior Citizen Homestead Exemption. The bill's chief sponsor is Assistant Majority Leader Fred Crespo.

HB 833, which unanimously passed out of the House Revenue Committee Wednesday morning, would amend the Property Tax Code so that a person who has been granted a Senior Citizen Homestead Exemption would not need to reapply for the exemption every year, as is the case now.

"I'm grateful to Representative Crespo for his continued advocacy on this issue," said Assessor Kaegi. "Our office has worked in collaboration with him on the plan for its technological implementation and the safeguards necessary to prevent fraud while also making these annual exemptions more accessible for seniors. We have heard from many taxpayers during my countywide listening tour about the need for HB 833."

To allow for the automatic renewal and prevent fraud, the Illinois Dept. of Public Health would

be required to send the Cook County Assessor's Office (CCAO) death record information quarterly while the CCAO would access the Social Security Administration's Master Death List and exchange information with the Recorder of Deeds office on deed transactions of properties with a Senior Homestead Exemption.

The CCAO would be required to conduct an audit on every Senior Citizen Homestead Exemption at least once every three years.

"Local seniors shouldn't have to go through burdensome bureaucracy to receive necessary relief on their property taxes," Crespo said. "This is a commonsense reform that will make government more efficient and accessible while we work to provide greater relief to seniors and middle-class families across our state."

"We look forward to the General Assembly passing this bill, which will help modernize operations in the Assessor's Office and ease an unnecessary burden for seniors in Cook County," Assessor Kaegi said.

COLE SLAW – A SIMPLE SUMMER SALAD

First make the cooked dressing. By cooking or simmering the dressing, it allows the flavors to blend real well. You will need 1 cup water, 1/2 cup of white vinegar, ¼ cup Wesson oil, 2 tablespoons sugar, 1 tsp. salt, and pepper to taste. Combine all ingredients except the pepper in medium to large pot, stir to blend and melt the sugar and salt, then simmer it for about 5 minutes. Set aside to cool.

You’ll need one medium head of cabbage, one large carrot and one onion. Cut the head of cabbage in quarters and shred into a large bowl. If any of the outer leaves fall off, wash them and slice finely. Peel the carrot and shred, and peel and chop the onion. Add to the dressing, mix well, and refrigerate for at least six hours, stirring occasionally. Sprinkle with freshly-ground pepper when serving. This cole slaw keeps in the fridge for several days ... and it’s so healthy!

The Best Ways To Clean Windows

(From Good Housekeeping’s Website)

Washing your windows is a tedious chore — so you want to make sure you get it right the first time. To avoid having to redo your work, we tapped from Carolyn Forte, Director of the Good Housekeeping Institute Cleaning Lab to get her expert advice.

1. Choose a dry, cloudy day.

“Do this job in the blazing sun and the cleaner will dry onto the hot windows before you get to wipe it off, leaving hard-to-remove streaks,” Forte says. If the weather won’t cooperate, start on the shady side of the house.

2. Remove dirt and dust first.

Before you get started, sweep dirt from the window frame with a brush or vacuum it up with your machine’s dusting attachment. This will prevent dirt from turning into a muddy mess when mixed with a cleaner. If your window screen looks especially grimy, pop it out and wash with hot, sudsy water and a soft brush, then rinse and let dry before putting it back.

For quickly dusting shades and blinds, Forte recommends going over both sides with a microfiber duster or opening the slats and going over each one with a damp cloth and followed by a dry one.

You can also refresh your curtains at the same time by putting them in the dryer for 15 minutes on an “air-only” cycle and rehang quickly to prevent wrinkles.

3. Pick the right cleaner — and spritz generously.

Don’t hold back on the spray, especially if your windows look extra dirty. “You need plenty of

cleaner to dissolve and suspend the dirt so it can be completely wiped away — skimp and you’ll be seeing streaks,” Forte says.

Homemade Glass Cleaner - What you’ll need:

- 2 cups water
- 1/2 cup white or cider vinegar
- 1/4 cup rubbing alcohol 70% concentration

Combine the ingredients and pour them in a spray bottle. If you have kids or pets, write the ingredients on the outside of the bottle for safety.

4. Use a microfiber cloth.

Some folks like drying panes with newspaper, but you’re better off reusable microfiber cloths. “They are super absorbent, washable, and leave the glass shiny and streak-free,” Forte says.

5. Skip the squeegee.

“Professional window cleaners swear by them, but you have to know how to use them right,” Forte says. “You squeegee down and where does the water go? On the floor.”

Because of the potential mess and drip factor, she avoids using squeegees, especially for small panes, but they can be more helpful on bigger, picture windows.

6. Break it down.

You only need to clean your windows once or twice a year, Forte says, but it’s even easier if you divide the job up and do it room by room. When you’re cleaning, wipe one side of the window horizontally and the other vertically. If any streaks do form, you’ll easily know whether they’re on the outside or the inside.

What is the difference between the abbreviations i.e. and e.g.?

The most looked up abbreviations in our online dictionary are *i.e.* and *e.g.*, probably because they are often confused for one another.

Both of these are abbreviations of Latin expressions: *i.e.* stands for *id est*, which means “that is” in Latin. It introduces a rewording or a clarification of a statement that has just been made or of a word that has just been used, such as:

The cough may last for a short period of time—*i.e.*, three to five days.

E.g. stands for *exempli gratia* in Latin, which means “for example.” It introduces one or more examples that illustrate something stated, such as:

Submit a sample of academic writing—*e.g.*, a dissertation chapter.

Because their usage can seem similar, these abbreviations are often confused. One trick to keeping them straight is to remember that *i.e.* and *that is* both share an *i* and that *example* and *e.g.* both share an *e*.

You can also try substituting the English for the abbreviation to check:

The cough may last for a short period of time—that is three to five days.

Submit a sample of academic writing—for example, a dissertation chapter.

Another frequently seen Latin abbreviation is *et al.*, which means “and others.” It is usually styled with a period, because the Latin words that it stands for have different possible endings, and *et al.* is the root: *et alii* (masculine), *et aliae* (feminine), and *et alia* (neuter). Since English nouns don’t have grammatical gender, *et al.* makes for an all-inclusive version of “and others.”

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HOMEOWNERS’ ADVICE — Life With An HOA

If you’re buying a home in a community with a homeowners association (HOA), there are some things you need to know. The community provides you with shared amenities and services like front yard maintenance and security patrols. The HOA board collects a monthly or annual fee to maintain those amenities, protect the integrity and safety of the community and to enhance property values for the homeowners.

The main benefit of life with an HOA is that you can enjoy the amenities you want without having to pay for them by yourself. But, shared benefits means that your dues are used for two things —property maintenance and improvements and for building reserves. This can include future expenses like swimming pool resurfacing or unexpected expenses like fallen tree removal. It also means that the HOA may have some rules you may not like, such as no yard signs or flags on holidays.

That’s why you need to see the governing documents of the HOA, including the CC&Rs, -covenants, conditions, and restrictions. These are the rules of esthetics, conduct, maintenance, and security the homeowners voted to have, such as how many pets you can own or whether you can park your car on the street.

Keep in mind that HOA boards are composed of volunteer homeowners like yourself and that they’re not property managers. HOAs typically hire third-party property managers so board members can enjoy the community, too.

You can then make the decision whether this particular community is right for you.
