

C.A.R.E.'s New Pet Tag Project Adds Art & Shimmer to Adoption Center Entrance—And Helps Animals

At C.A.R.E.'s Adoption Center, an installation of silvery Pet Tags in the building's foyer offers people a way to honor special friends, family and pets.

Community Animal Rescue Effort's newly opened Adoption Center has added a dramatic art installation that doubles as a way of financially supporting the organization's animal rescue work. The installation, created by C.A.R.E. volunteer Karey Uhler, consists of an array of engravable discs, or Pet Tags. The silvery two-inch tags are securely attached to hooks and mounted in a grid on a matte-black wall. Every time the Adoption Center doors open, air movement causes the array to move and catch the light.

Engraved C.A.R.E. Pet Tags serve as a unique way to honor special people or animals. Businesses can use tags to show their support of animal rescue. And with the holidays drawing ever nearer, Pet Tags make the perfect gift for that hard-to-buy-for person.

A donation of \$250 is all it takes for your inscribed Pet Tag to be placed on permanent display at C.A.R.E.'s Adoption Center. To order, download an order form from our website, CAREnorthshore.org/pet-tags, fill it out and send in. You can also place an order online at the same site.

Funds raised by the Pet Tag Project go toward care of the rescued cats and dogs under C.A.R.E.'s charge.

Northwest Side Hunger Walk To Be Held Sunday, September 30, 2018



Members of the Resurrection Key Club and Celtic Club helped create the banner for the 2018 Northwest Side Hunger Walk. A leadership breakfast to spearhead the event was held on September 7, 2018, at Resurrection College Prep.

In the United States, over 16 million children, or 1 out of every 5 children, live in a household that struggles to put food on the table. In Illinois, over 25% of children, or 593,186 children under the age of 18, live with food insecurity. The month of September is National Hunger Action Month and the 2018 Northwest Side Hunger Walk will be held on Sunday, September 30, 2018, to raise awareness and funds in an effort to reduce hunger in the local community and throughout the world. The walk will begin and end at Resurrection College Prep High School at 7500 W. Talcott Avenue in Chicago. Participants do not need to register in advance. Sign-in will be at 1:00 pm on Sunday, September 30 in the Resurrection College Prep parking lot. Walkers will step off at 1:30 pm for the approximately 2.2 mile walk. All community members are welcome to participate. Information and a pledge sheet can be found at www.reshs.org or donations can be made the day of the walk.

The annual Northwest Side Hunger Walk is an ecumenical effort by local churches and the community and funds will be donated to the following organizations: New Hope Methodist Food Pantry, which serves neighborhood residents on the northwest side Chicago; Catholic Charities, which serves the Chicagoland area; and Heifer International which serves

the international community.

Each year, since 1985, hundreds of students, parishioners and neighbors have participated in the Northwest Side Hunger Walk. On Friday, September 7, 2018 the student leaders at Resurrection College Prep High School held an annual Leadership Breakfast to prepare for the annual hunger walk and had the opportunity to listen to speakers talk about the role of various agencies in helping to alleviate hunger and food scarcity. These speakers included the following members of the Northwest Side Hunger Walk Steering Committee: Reverend Marilyn Deering (Executive Director of the New Hope Community Food Pantry), Jim Lifton (Friendship Presbyterian Church in Norwood Park), and Mike Longo (Resurrection College Prep faculty member). Additional speakers included Kate LeFevour, Project Director of Special Events, Community Development and Outreach Services at Catholic Charities and members of the Resurrection administrative team. The Resurrection Key Club and Celtic Club are instrumental in organizing the event each year, creating the banner for the walk, and helping to rally support for the walk. 'Bike the Ridge' in Evanston September 30

Bicyclists of all ages are invited to pedal up and down Ridge Avenue during the City's annual "Bike the Ridge" event on Sunday, September 30.

Mayor Hagerty will officially kick off the free, non-competitive City-sponsored special event at 9 a.m. at the intersection of Ridge Avenue and Howard Street. Ridge Avenue will be closed to all vehicular traffic and open to bicycles from Howard to Church Streets until 1 p.m. Bicycles are not allowed on Ridge Avenue at any other time of the year.

Participants will enjoy live music from the Evanston School of Rock; a variety of food trucks; bike registration, repairs and decorating; and free bike helmets while supplies last. Most activities will take place at Ridgeville Park, 908 Seward St., and Alexander Park, Ridge Avenue at Grove Street.

Bike the Ridge is for those on non-motorized bicycles only; motorized bicycles or skateboards are not allowed. Children under age 18 are required to wear bike helmets per City of Evanston ordinance. Non-bicyclists can walk along Ridge Avenue sidewalks to support the bicyclists.

Residents along Ridge Avenue will not be able to use their driveways between 8 a.m. and 2 p.m. on September 30. Those planning to use their car during that time should park on a side street prior to 8 a.m. that morning.

We have dedicated this window to the exceptional Mexican artist Frida Kahlo who was feminist hero and an extraordinary painter of the twentieth century. Born 1907 and died in 1954.

She overcame many obstacles and set backs throughout her short life. She contracted polio at a young age and was in a bus accident at 18 years that almost killed her. Both of legs were broken along with many ribs, her collarbone and pelvic bone. She was in recovery for months and suffered greatly. She had over 30 surgeries throughout her life. The "gift" of that accident was that she taught herself to paint...and as they say "The rest is history!" She was influenced by indigenous Mexican culture and her own life experiences, dreams and nightmares.

She is a creative inspiration. Today she feels like a fearless fashion icon and we love them way she piled on the jewelry!


families subsequently founded Germantown, Pennsylvania, the first German settlement in the original thirteen American colonies, and organized the first petition in the English colonies to abolish slavery in 1688. Originally known under the rubric of "German Day", the holiday was celebrated for the first time in Philadelphia in 1883, on the occasion of the 200th anniversary of the arrival of the settlers from Krefeld; and similar celebrations developed later in other parts of the country. The custom died out during World War I as a result of the anti-German sentiment that prevailed at the time.^[1] The holiday was revived in 1983.

In 1983, President Ronald Reagan proclaimed October 6 as German-American Day to celebrate and honor the 300th anniversary of German American immigration and culture to the United States. On August 6, 1987, Congress approved S.J. Resolution 108, designating October 6, 1987, as German-American Day. It became Public Law 100-104 when President Reagan signed it on August 18. A proclamation (#5719) to this effect was issued October 2, 1987, by President Reagan in a formal ceremony in the White House Rose Garden, at which time the President called on Americans to observe the Day with appropriate ceremonies and activities.

Chasing Windmills is a Good Thing

Many people believe that the novel Don Quixote is one of the greatest works of fiction ever published. In 1605, Spanish writer Miguel de Cervantes introduced us to the old nobleman, who was so enamored of chivalry and ethics that he loses his sanity and sets off on a quest to restore honor and civility to the world. The local inns become castles, and the wenches are fair damsels that must be rescued from distress. And although he tries to fight the menacing giants, they turn out to just be windmills in the field.

For centuries, the story has inspired us to see the beauty in the commonplace, and to always fight for ideals, even if the foe is bigger than us.

In 1965, playwright Dale Wasserman turned the story into a musical. Instead of telling the story directly, he crafted it into a flashback told by a prisoner of the Spanish Inquisition awaiting trial. Featuring stirring classic songs including "The Impossible Dream," Man of La Mancha is a multi-Tony Award-winning theatrical masterpiece that, like the novel it's based on, is considered one of the finest pieces of the modern musical theatre.

MadKap Productions is bringing Man of La Mancha to life for twelve performances in September. Instead of taking place in a Spanish prison, the story will be told by the residents of a homeless shelter who are looking for hope and nobility in a world filled with despair.

Sean Caron takes on the dual role of Cervantes and Don Quixote, with Victoria Olivier by his side as his faithful squire, Sancho. Rachel

Carreras stars as Aldonza, the rough and tumble barmaid who he renames Dulcinea and in whose honor he dedicates his quests. The cast includes Mark Anderson, Andrew Buel, Brandon Campbell, Margaret Garofalo, Perry Georgopoulos, Garrett Wade Haley, Gretchen Kimmeth, Aimee Kleiman, Michael Rawls, Devi Reisenfeld, Jenny Rudnick, Matthew Schnitker, and Anita Silver.

The show is directed by Stephen M. Genovese, who directed previous productions of Funny Girl and The Drowsy Chaperone at Skokie Theatre. Music Direction is by Aaron Kaplan. Set Design is by Jeremy Hollis, Costume Design is by Beth Laske-Miller, with lighting by Andrew Vandebey.

Man of La Mancha performs from September 7 to September 30, 2018.

Fridays and Saturdays at 7:30 pm, Sundays at 2:00 pm, with a matinee on Wednesday, September 12 at 1:30 pm. Tickets are \$42 general admission, \$36 for seniors, and \$32 for students.

Mayor Emanuel Designates 2019 As The 'Year Of Chicago Theatre'



Mayor Rahm Emanuel, Department of Cultural Affairs and Special Events (DCASE) Commissioner Mark Kelly, League of Chicago Theatres Executive Director Deb Clapp, and many other civic, arts and theatre leaders today announced plans to designate 2019 as the 'Year of Chicago Theatre.' This citywide, year-long focus on theatre is the first of its kind in the U.S. The initiative will include theatre performances – including improv, dance, opera, puppetry and more – and special events for the public at hundreds of cultural venues, theaters, parks and neighborhood locations throughout the city.



Village Cooking Corner

With autumn's arrival, here's a delicious way to enjoy those fresh apples of any type.

Apple Streusel Cake

This recipe comes from Helga, one of the customers of the First Lady Beauty Salon on the NE corner of Western and Sunnyside in Chicago. She brought it along recently on a Thursday when she had her hair done, and I had a chance to enjoy a piece of the cake on Friday, which is when I have my hair done. Helga was kind enough to share her recipe with us.

Ingredients for the dough: 1 cup unsalted butter (2 sticks), 2 eggs and 1/2 cup milk, all at room temperature; 1 cup sugar, 4 cups plus 2 tbsp. flour, 2 tsp. baking powder. Sift flour and baking powder and set aside. Cream the butter with the sugar, and add eggs, one at a time, and beat in the milk. Combine with the flour mixture and spread into a greased 9" x 12" pan and top with the apple sauce. Use one cup of apple sauce for the 9" x 12" pan and at least 1-1/2 cups if you use the 15" x 10-1/2" pan.

Ingredients for the streusel topping: 2 cups plus 2 tbsp. flour, 1-1/2 cups sugar, 1 tsp. vanilla and 1 cup (2 sticks) of unsalted butter at room temperature. In the same bowl which you used for the dough, cream the butter, sugar and vanilla. Add the flour until well combined into a crumbly mixture and sprinkle evenly on top of the applesauce. Bake for 30 to 40 minutes in a 350 degree oven until evenly browned. Allow to cool and sprinkle with some powdered sugar. Cut into desired bars and serve. What a treat!

Apple Storage Techniques

Apples produce a gas that cause other types of fruits and vegetables to soften or spoil more quickly. For this reason, they should always be stored separately. Using thick layers of newspaper, line the bottoms of flat crates or drawers from an old chest-of-drawers, lay out the apples in them, and store them in the basement or garden shed. Check them often. Remove fruit showing brown spots immediately and use them.
