Container Gardening

Even if you live in a condo and only have a confined space like a balcony or a small deck, you can still experience a bit of nature with a container garden. A container garden is a collection of plants grown in a container or planter.

Whether you choose to buy a container which is already planted, or you decide to plant your own, there are a few things to remember.

First, realize that the size of the container will impact how frequently you will have to water. There is an old saying that “container gardening is container watering” implying that in a container, unlike the soil in the ground, you must supply all the water. I think larger containers are easier to care for over a long season.

Second, determine how much sun and shade your area has. This is very important because it will impact how your plants perform. If you put a sun loving plant in the shade it will not bloom as well as it should. Conversely shade loving plants may not be able to take the heat generated by the sun, and will struggle to live. You must determine the level of light over the course of a whole day from sun-up to sun down. With the information you will be able to select the right plants for your space.

Third, try to come up with a theme for your container. Your theme could be simple, symmetrical and elegant with a combination of something like geraniums and petunias or it could be more sophisticated with an asymmetrical blend of many different plants. Many people are copying the natural look best demonstrated by the public planters seen around the City of Chicago. On higher balconies, I would limit the use of really tall plants as one must consider the effect of the wind.

Fourth, you must maintain the planter. Any spent blooms should be discarded along with yellow leaves. Water the container when you see wilt in the plants or when the soil mix feels dry to the touch. Observe the weather - hot windy periods will always require more watering than rainy cooler periods.

The easiest way to keep your planter looking good is to fertilize the plants every two weeks with a well balance fertilize. There are many brands to choose from and they all get the job done. Follow the directions - don't fall in the trap of thinking if it says 1 scoop per gallon, then I'll really make my planter beautiful by using 2 scoops. This is wrong because too much fertilizer could make your planter perform as poorly as neglecting it would.

Fifth, enjoy your little slice of nature both visually and sensually with the various fragrances the plants give off.

Online Re-enrollment Now Available for City's Private Elm Tree Insurance Program

The City of Evanston's Environmental Services Bureau is pleased to announce the 34th consecutive year of its Private Elm Tree Insurance Program, covering the removal of elm trees on private property lost due to Dutch elm disease (DED).

New this year, participants re-enrolling in the program may do so online; first-time participants must complete a paper application. Both the online re-enrollment form and paper application are available at www.cityofevanston.org/elmininsurance. Application and payment must be received no later than Tuesday, May 31, 2016 in order for trees to qualify for insurance.

When DED infects a tree on private property, the homeowner bears the sometimes-staggering costs for removal, which can range from approximately \$1,000 to \$5,000. The City's Private Elm Tree Insurance Program covers the cost of removing infected elm trees, and also provides free testing of insured elms if DED symptoms appear. The insurance is for a one-year period, June 1, 2016 through May 31, 2017, and must be renewed annually prior to the Dutch elm disease season.

Evanston's five public swimming beaches open for the season Memorial Day weekend on Saturday, May 28, 2016.

A beach token, also known as a season pass, is valid from the time of purchase through Labor Day, Monday, September 5, 2016. Tokens will be sold at a discounted rate of \$26 for Evanston and Skokie residents and \$42 for nonresidents through Friday, June 3. On Saturday, June 4, the price for a beach token will increase to \$34 for Evanston and Skokie residents and \$58 for nonresidents.

Daily beach admission is also available, and may be purchased at beach entrances. Daily admission is \$6 for children age 1-11 years and \$8 for those 12 years and older. Admission for children under age 1 is free.

To ensure that everyone has access to Evanston's beautiful beaches, the Mayor's Super Summer Recreation Program includes free beach admission through a 10-punch pass for Evanston teens, age 13-18 years old. Teens may pick up their pass beginning Monday, May 16 at Evanston recreation community centers and the main Evanston Public Library, 1703 Orrington Ave. Please contact 311 for details.

There is a white drop-off box in the lobby of the Skokie Police Department, 7300 Niles Center Road, for residents to dispose of unwanted, unused and expired medication at any time. This location offers 24-hour secure monitoring, collection and delivery to medical waste facilities in accordance with federal regulations.

Accepted drugs include prescription medications, controlled substances, all over-the-counter medications (i.e. pain relievers, cold medication, etc.), medication samples, pet medications, vitamins and supplements, medicated ointments, lotions,

creams and oils, liquid medication in leak-proof containers and homeopathic remedies.

This program does not accept needles/sharps, syringes with needles, thermometers, IV bags, bloody or infectious waste, personal care products, empty containers and hydrogen peroxide.

Since May 2007, the Skokie Health Department, 5127 Oakton Street, has accepted medications and used syringes/needles in puncture-proof containers. The Skokie Health Department drop-off convenience is available from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. The Skokie Health Department is unable to accept controlled substances and non-prescription liquids.



As for class participants, she says, "We're like a little family. There are probably about 10 of us—we talk before and after the class. Everyone is welcome to join—we'll introduce ourselves to any newcomers, and explain the class. We help one another out."

My hat goes off to Kyle DeSantis and the Drury Lane Theatre for giving audiences a brand new musical entitled "Hazel" A Musical Maid in America.

The story is based on Ted Key's creation for the Saturday Evening Post. The show has a book by Lissa Levin with music by Ron Abel and lyrics by Chuck Steffan. It was a TV situation comedy starring Shirley Booth. The story takes place in 1960 when America was adjusting to several changes that included Russia and space.

It deals with the Baxter family who are Ken Clark as George and the beautiful Summer Naomi Smart as his wife, Dorothy. Their son, Harold, is played by Casey Lyons, a young actor of eleven. Casey has an outstanding voice as you'll see with his solo on "Space" number. Harold hangs out with three friends played by Tyler Martin, Ava Morse, and Rowan Moxley, all of whom believe that aliens have landed.

George snags a big client with hopes of a partnership and when his wife Dorothy goes back to work they hire a maid, Hazel, played by Klea Blackhurst. She knows how to belt out the songs and is an excellent actress. Remember her name as she has the talent to be around for a long time. A good role would be the lead in "Call Me Madam."

In the play Hazel asks the question, "Can a simple maid debone a turkey, save a marriage, uncover a matter of national security and lead a conga line?" ...but you'll see Hazel can.

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Chicago Brauhaus/Treffpunkt 1965-2016

Congratulations On A 50+ Year Tradition As "The Golden Standard" In Dining And Entertainment!

As their eagerly anticipated month-long Maifest celebration is about to begin on May 6th, everyone, far and near, seems to know this place, but does everyone know how it all began and continues to this day?

First, and most importantly,

Harry and Guenter Kempf are, of course, the Chicago Brauhaus. We know them as consummate business men and leaders of the community in Lincoln Square. Their contribution to the preservation of their ethnic heritage is appreciated by, not only their fellow German-Americans, but by all who relish in the diversity of Chicago's neighborhoods.

It wasn't always, however, the Chicago Brauhaus as we know it today and Harry and Guenter Kempf weren't always as well known and heralded as they are now. In fact, Lincoln Square was at one time, only an idea.

Since all great ideas require great people to make them a reality the Kempf brothers were the perfect people, in the perfect place, at the perfect time.

The Kempf family has had a long musical tradition. Their Father was a gifted, though no formally trained piano and bass player. Since the time of their youth, Harry, Guenter and their Dad played music together, mastering many different instruments along with singing.

Harry's journey to America began in 1956 when he was only 19 years old. He came to Chicago, bought a bass fiddle at Lyon and Healy, and used his talents by acquiring a job singing at Zum Deutchen Eck. He was soon playing his bass as well. He eventually formed a trio which performed at Little Hawaii at 5100 N. Western Avenue. He then went on to gather nine other musicians to play in a 10 piece band called The Continental Ensemble.

In 1963 Harry opened Zum Lieben Augustin next to the German Theatre (which is now the Davis) on Lincoln Avenue, and offered lunch, dinner and music, of course, to his patrons.

Guenter arrived in Chicago in 1965 leaving behind a prosperous job in an appliance manufacturing company in Stuttgart. After serving in the army into which he was drafted, he decided to spend a year in America with a promise from his old boss in Stuttgart that he was welcome to his previous job when he returned.

He, as we all know now, did not return to Germany, instead, joining his brother Harry to open Treffpunkt restaurant on Lincoln Avenue in 1965. There they played music, with Harry on his bass, Guenter on the drums and Max on the accordion. They served German traditional foods and developed quite a following.

In 1965 Lincoln Avenue consisted of Meyers Deli (now Gene's), the Treffpunkt and various storefronts. The street was unfinished and a bridge connected one side with the other. The Chamber of Commerce had an idea to create an ethnic center with businesses being established around that area, but with no streets and no businesses, the hope seemed distant.

Enter Harry and Guenter.

To bring the people there, Harry and Guenter decided to run an Oktoberfest. They had a tent set up from Lawrence Avenue to Giddings (on Lincoln Avenue) and on their own, orchestrated what has become an eagerly anticipated event which thrives to this day.

Even though it was mid-November by then, they decided to set a time for a Friday and Saturday, and hoped the weather would cooperate. Mrs. Ed Kelly invited all the senior citizens in the area for brats and coffee and Bingo on Saturday afternoon to kick off the Fest.

The evening on Saturday and all day Sunday were a rousing success. The temperature was 60 outside and inside the tent the warmth and fun made it seem even toastier. On Sunday night, after the party finished, a heavy rain began to fall - holding off just long enough for everyone to finish enjoying themselves.

The current German Day Fest is, of course, the offshoot of this original Oktoberfest and now is held every September in Lincoln Square at Leland and Western Avenues.

There are now many more tents, more people and more food and music and cultural activities and performances to delight young and old alike, and the senior citizens still kick off the festivities with a luncheon on Friday afternoon before the 2-day/3-night event begins.

As a result of all of the hard work and planning and hoping, people began to come back to Lincoln Square to shop, dine and congregate. The streets were finished and everything looked like it was only going to improve.

Then in 1985 there was a fire at Witzel's shoe store, right next door to the Treffpunkt restaurant. The area was once again in ruin.

As though they had a premonition, the year before Harry and Guenter had purchased Roehrich's furniture store just across Lincoln Avenue from the Kempf's Treffpunkt. They planned to remodel the building to eventually house banquets, weddings, and large events. When the fire hit, Treffpunkt was destroyed along with a lot of the area businesses.

Within 60 hours, the old Treffpunkt would become the current Chicago Brauhaus. Like a Phoenix, the Kempfs built their dream of a rendition of Munich's Hoffbrauhaus. Little by little, while still remaining open for business, they remodeled from the ground up.

The original lamps from Henrici's Restaurant still hang from the ceilings, and the bar stools from Rush Street are still in place.

Harry, who played music all the time at the Treffpunkt, now jumped in and became Chicago Brauhaus' chef. The nightly music still continued with Guenter at the helm.

Through these many years, Harry and Guenter Kempf have managed to remain an institution in Chicago. People still come from far and wide, and from just down the street,

to experience the togetherness and friendly ambience of this one-of-a-kind place. The family Kempf has always stuck together, continuing with Alfred (Freddie) Kempf, Harry's son, who represents the next generation. The basic, strong work ethic, talent and perseverance nurtured by their parents and upbringing, have made them a success in every way.

Generations of Chicagoans and visitors alike have been drawn to Chicago Brauhaus which has served as an anchor to the German-American culture and traditions. Just as the extraordinary staff and musicians have been there for what seems, always, so have the families who look to this icon as a place for special celebrations and events, or to join in anytime with festivities which are constantly going on. In one visit, you will feel a part of the Chicago Brauhaus family, all ages, always welcome, enjoying the good clean fun while dining on German traditional favorites, topped off with a beer, wine or cocktail.

Live music six days a week invite dancing on the central dance floor or listening and enjoyment of German and English

standards. You will see couples, children or groups dancing to German and American favorites including the chicken dance.

Seasons bring the special events which have become a tradition for the generation of families who have been enjoying Brauhaus hospitality. There is always a party going on, whether it's Oktoberfest in September/October, a 5-week long celebration of fun, music, food and drinks, or Maifest which runs for 4 weeks in April/May, or special bands and entertainers from Europe make Chicago Brauhaus a yearly stop.

In 2000, the City of Chicago honored Harry and Guenter Kempf by naming Giddings Plaza the "Kempf Plaza." The plaza, which sits directly across the street from Brauhaus, hosts band concerts in the warm weather and is a lovely spot for sitting and relaxing in front of the fountain. It is a true European setting which befits its location and deserves the respected name it so proudly bears.

A little extra note:

A friend recently returned to Chicago after being away for quite a few years. One of the very first outings she had with her Family was to Chicago Brauhaus. She remarked that it was "like truly coming home again". Everything was as she remembered; the same wonderful food, the same lively and fun entertainment and the same contagious feeling of warmth that has continued for, now generations of families, old and new.

Grandchildren Of Chiune-Sempo Sugihara, The Man Who Helped 6,000 Jews During World War II, To Meet Grandchild Of Sugihara Survivor

Chiune-Sempo Sugihara was a Japanese diplomat who served as Vice-Consul for the Empire of Japan in Lithuania. During World War II, he risked his career and his family's lives to help 6,000 Jews leave the country by issuing transit visas so that they could travel to Japanese territory. The Jews who escaped were refugees from German-occupied Western Poland or Russian-occupied Eastern Poland, as well as residents of Lithuania. In 1985, Israel named him to the Righteous Among the Nations for his actions, the only Japanese national to be so honored.

Chiune-Sempo is also listed on the Museum's Fountain of the Righteous and the Museum's Karkomi Holocaust Exhibition includes a list of 2,139 refugees who received Sugihara transit visas to Japan (c. 1940).

On Friday, May 6, 2016, Sugihara's grandchildren, Mr. Chihiro Sugihara, and Ms. Madoka Sugihara met Ms. Arielle Salomon. Arielle's grandfather Abram Salomon was one of the many Jews who were saved by Chiune-Sempo Sugihara.

The group visited the Museum to view artifacts and memorabilia related to Chiune-Sempo Sugihara and his heroic efforts in the Museum's Karkomi Holocaust Exhibition.

Shaboom! Online Series on Jewish Values to Premiere this Spring

"Shaboom!"— an innovative animated web series premiering this spring from non-profit BimBam (formerly G-dcast) — combines the best elements of children's television with wisdom from the Jewish tradition to teach everyday values to children through magic, comedy and silly songs. Each of the ten children's episodes is accompanied by a separate video for parents that delves into each episode's value, explaining "what's Jewish" and instilling in parents the knowledge and confidence to model the values for their children. The 10-part series launches April 6, 2016 with the theme of "Hachnasat Orchim" — Welcoming Guests.

"We are bringing what we love about great kids' entertainment to Jewish education," says Sarah Lefton, Executive Director of BimBam. "We listened to parents when they told us that they want Judaism that goes beyond the holidays—what they care about is getting through the everyday and raising mensches—great people. Shaboom! shares strategies for bringing the family closer together, and for promoting courage, kindness, gratitude and other social and emotional learning that is key in early child development."

Each episode of Shaboom! features the "magical sparks" Gabi & Rafael who work to fix the world, while focusing on that episode's theme. After episode one, other themes include "Hakarat Hatov" — Gratitude, "Kavod" — Honor or Respect, "Bal Tashchit" — Taking Care of Nature, and "Ometz Lev" — Courage of the Heart, among others.

"Shaboom! is a jolt of energy into Jewish family education, and it's an especially major step forward for Jewish media content," says Cathy Rolland, Director of Engaging Families with Young Children at the Union for Reform Judaism (URJ), which is helping to promote Shaboom! through its strong network of Early Childhood Professionals who will be sharing it across hundreds of ECE centers throughout North America. "This is a phenomenal vehicle to reach our youngest learners and their families and positively influence their behaviors and attitudes."

Along with the URJ, other major partners from the Jewish world include the United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism (USCJ), JCC Association, Harold Grinspoon Foundation and the PJ Library Alliance, and InterfaithFamily, among many others. They are all helping to share and build upon the series. BimBam also is working with Jewish organizations around the country to organize local screenings of Shaboom! episodes for families.

"Shaboom! meets families where they are, and draws them into the joy of Jewish life," adds Maxine Handelman, USCJ Early Childhood Education Specialist. "The videos give kids a cool, fun entry into being Jewish in their everyday life, and they give parents the foundation to make the experience richer for the entire family."

The videos for children and the matching clips for their parents were designed in consultation with individuals from leading children's education and tech organizations and companies including Sesame Workshop, Amazon Studios, Electronic Arts et al, Pixar, and experts from the research and academic

world who study learning and media.

Throughout a 40 year career at Sesame Street, Dr. Lewis Bernstein has led efforts to improve the intellectual, social, emotional, and moral lives of children through media. His approach has been to entertain children while educating them, so that their attention can be captured with joy.

"Shaboom! is doing the same," Bernstein says, "making timeless Jewish values new again, engaging, and fun for children and their parents alike. Shaboom! is designed as a learning adventure for the entire family. There are imaginative episodes for kids and corresponding resources like videos, downloads and curated follow-up reading for parents. And when parents and children co-engage in learning, virtually and long after the screen dims, the impact is always greater."

Shaboom! is written by kids' TV veteran Robert Pincombe and directed by staffer Jeremy Shuback. It was inspired by impactful, research-backed shows like Daniel Tiger's Neighborhood Super WHY! and Sesame Street. The series was tested by children's media evaluators Rockman Et Al to help shape the programming to most effectively achieve learning and engagement outcomes with families.

BimBam recently began focusing on entry-level materials for kids, families and adults. Shaboom! is the centerpiece for families, especially those raising Jewish children ages 0-8. Since its founding, the nonprofit has created over 200 animated videos and apps tailored to meet the interests of people curious about the basics of Judaism. Accessible for free on platforms like Youtube, iTunes and Facebook, BimBam's goal is to create a comprehensive free multimedia introduction to Judaism with zero barriers to entry.

Adds Lefton, "Shaboom! is as entertaining as something you'd see on Nick Jr or PBS Kids, but it's packed with Jewish ideas rather than math or reading help. This is where our biggest impact is - bringing people in the door that they're hanging out in front of anyway, aka, their smartphones."

The Shaboom! early childhood initiative has been generously funded by leading Jewish philanthropists and foundations, including Peleh Fund, two anonymous foundations, the Harold Grinspoon Foundation and the PJ Library Alliance, Bernstein Family Foundation (DC), and the Jewish Federation of Silicon Valley. As part of this initiative, the Lippman Kanfer Foundation for Living Torah is supporting the Shaboom! parent videos.

Lefton, who founded the organization in 2008, is a recipient of the Joshua Venture Group fellowship for Jewish social entrepreneurs. She was named a 2012 recipient of the Pomegranate Prize for exceptional young Jewish educators and was named one of the "Forward 50" most influential Jews by the Forward newspaper. Prior to founding G-dcast, Lefton produced projects for The New York Times on the Web, the Village Voice, Princess Cruises, and several robotics companies; she also started the brand JewishFashionConspiracy.com, best known for the YO SEMITE tee shirt.

Avoid Family Conflict Later By Communication Now

When leaving behind a legacy for children or loved ones, parents hope that it will bring joy to the recipient. Although nothing can mitigate the sorrow after a death occurs, an inheritance can sometimes alleviate financial worries. Of course, it is not just the money that matters. For as many as 74 percent of Americans, keeping their family history alive is what's most important after a death.

Unfortunately, problems can arise and disputes can occur over financial assets or family heirlooms. According to the New York Times, a full 84 percent of parents responding to a recent survey believe it is important for the transfer of their money to their children to go smoothly, and 66 percent want to ensure that their death does not create bad feelings among siblings when the estate is divided. However,

unless you have talked to your children or other beneficiaries, there could still be bad feelings and conflicts if the terms of your Will or Trust come as a surprise.

The good news about estate planning, according to the New York Times, is that around 83 percent of parents have created a Will. The bad news... only around half have talked to their kids about their last wishes and just 34 percent have actually told their children what their assets are. Parents with estates both large and small have kept mum on what their children can expect in the future, with 55 percent of people with more than \$1 million talking to their kids about an inheritance and 53 percent of parents with less than \$1 million having that conversation.

Most potential beneficiaries are afraid to bring up the discussion of an inheritance, in large part because they worry they'll be seen as greedy or viewed as hoping for a untimely death and a big check. This leaves it to parents and others leaving behind a legacy to talk to those who are going to receive a bequest after death.

Unless you can talk to your loved ones in advance, heirs may find for the first time when the Will is probated that they haven't been left what they expect. This can create hard feelings, conflict among families, and in a worst case scenario it can lead to the Will being contested (which Bank Rate.com suggests could cost around 40 percent of the value of the estate). Fights over Wills can sometimes turn ugly, as the Hollywood Reporter illustrates, sharing the story of how Disney's estate has left grandchildren accusing each other of kidnapping, financial misconduct, mental incompetence, and other crimes.

Advanced discussion can stop these problems before they start. Including family members in the estate planning process is one option, but if this is too stressful you can still talk to your beneficiaries about what you have planned. At a minimum you should ensure that you:

- Discuss any responsibilities you are assigning. This means that if you want someone to serve as an executor or Trustee, you should let them know this in advance before your death.
- Talk with your kids or other close relatives about what should happen to a family business or family farm, so everyone has a clear understanding of what you plan for these important assets.
- Explain your reasoning behind the legacy you are leaving). For example, if you are leaving some money in a Trust, your family members may not like it. Explain why you've made this choice.

It is natural to struggle with what and when to tell your kids or loved ones about your plans for after death. However, the reality is that having these difficult conversations sooner rather than later will help to avoid any disputes over your wishes and the terms of your inheritance after you pass.

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Eikona Performs Concert At St Demetrios Greek Orthodox Church In Elmhurst

Eikona, a three sister ensemble, held a fundraiser concert tonight hosted by St Demetrios Greek Orthodox Church in Elmhurst, Illinois. Over 140 attended the event with proceeds from the fundraiser going to St Nicholas National Shrine in New York City, New York.

Eikona, whom have childhood ties to Chicago, consists of sisters Presvytera Stacey Dorrance, Presvytera Marika Brown, and Chrysanthy Therianos. The groups mission is to inspire more people to express their Faith through the magnificent hymns of our church. For 23 years since formerly establishing themselves as Eikona, the sisters have released 10 CDs, with hymns in Greek and English, releasing one every few years. Over the years, they have performed in over a dozen states, giving concerts, workshops and directing various choirs. This year in November they will be assisting at the Church Music Conference in Southampton, NY.

St Nicholas National Shrine in New York City, New York, is currently under construction. Directly across the street from the National 9/11 Twin Towers Memorial in Downtown Manhattan, the National Shrine will stand in memory of the former St Nicholas Greek Orthodox Church which was destroyed on 9/11 by the collapse of it's gigantic neighbor – the former South Tower of the Twin Towers.

The only church destroyed by the events of 9/11, some of the last witnesses to view St Nicholas Greek Orthodox Church reported the landing gear of one of the planes that struck the Twin Towers was on the roof of the church before the Twin Towers collapsed. Many if the Holy Relics within the church would never be recovered, including the relics of St Nicholas, St Catherine, and St Sabbas the Sanctified, which had been donated to the church by Emperor Saint Nicholas II, the last czar of Imperial Russia.

The new St Nicholas National Shrine will not only serve as a parochial Greek Orthodox Church but additional as a nondenominational bereavement center and memorial shrine. The \$35 million domed structure to the south of the memorial will glow at night through a veneer of white Pentelic marble, from the same vein in Greece that was quarried to construct the Parthenon.

The Greek Orthodox Metropolis of Chicago is lead by Metropolitan Iakovos of Chicago and oversees all Greek Orthodox parishes within Illinois, Iowa, Wisconsin, and Minnesota, as well as large portions of Missouri and Indiana.

Village Cooking Corner

TWO BEAN CASSEROLE

1 lb fresh green beans	Salt and Pepper to taste
1 (15.5 oz can) Eden's Butter Beans- no salt added	1/4 cup Parsley - chopped
1/2 of a Vidalia Sweet Onion, chopped	2 Tbsp. Dried Oregano
1/2 of an (8 oz) no salt added Hunt's Tomato Sauce	1 Garlic Clove, chopped
1 can of Hunt's Stewed Tomatoes	2 Tbsp. Olive Oil

Wash and cut the fresh green beans in half. Chop onion and garlic and saute until soft not browned. Add the green beans and the stewed tomatoes and tomato sauce and simmer for about 20 minutes. Place in a 10 x 7 casserole baking dish. Rinse the butter beans and mix with green beans in the casserole dish. Sprinkle with salt, pepper, parsley and oregano and add the Olive Oil. Place in a preheated 350F oven for approximately 1-1/2 hours. Add small amount of water if needed.

For variety, instead of the butter beans you may use 2 small zucchini that have been cut in rounds and potatoes cut in small pieces and follow the same procedure of seasoning and baking as above. This is a great side dish for chicken, steak or fish regardless of the season.


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
